SOVIET RUSSIA LAUNCHES ARMY AGAINST CHINA

vague section of northern China contiguous to Siberia—might be considered diplomatically the ally of Russia.

The Nanking government was said to have been notified by its consuls in Russia that the consulates were surrounded by Russian troops.

Reports from Frontiers
SHANGHAI, June 14—A Chinese press dispatch from Harbin quoted unusually well informed sources said soviet authorities had increased their military force on the Siberian border opposite Manchouli to 15,000 men. The force included 5,000 cavalry.

Another report from the same source said Russians had ousted 50 Chinese merchants living within Russian territory close to the Siberian-Manchurian border.

Reports to the Metal Exchange said dispatches received from Harbin stated Russian troops were moving down the Chinese Eastern railway from Manchouli toward Tielihar, on the Xonot river, 550 miles within Manchuria.

The reports were doubted here. Bandits Slay 100, Destroy Village AMOY, Fukien, China, June 14—Refugees arriving here today from Hweian-Haien, 60 miles inland, said bandits had almost destroyed their village by fire, had killed 100 residents and were holding prominent citizens for ransom.

The bandits were said to be in control of the entire countryside from Chuanchow north to Amoy, with refugees flocking to safety. Missionary society representatives here are much concerned for the safety of their representatives at Hweian-Haien.

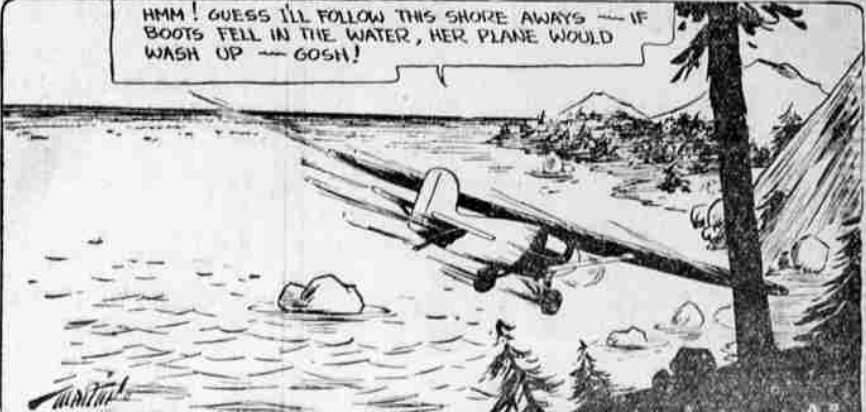
