LONG STRUGGLE OVER FARM BILL NEARING FINISH

any time during the long contest for farm relief.

"The advocates of the debenture plan have not delayed this legislation longer than to secure a fair consideration. They have performed a duty by insisting that the house vote on the debenture plan."

Robinson said passage of the bill would end the long struggle for farm relief as "no further farm legislation can be expected until the measure has been fully tried out."

"We are now ending the long struggle," Robinson added, "with action which many sincerely believe is inadequate and ineffective."

"The action is not on its face a redemption of the republican pledge to put agriculture on an equality with other industries."

Voting Change Asked
WASHINGTON, June 14.—A resolution, proposing an amendment to the constitution which would abolish the present system of voting by electoral college, and would provide for the election of president and vice-president by "the people of the several states," was introduced in the house yesterday by Representative Clarence F. Lea, California.

The resolution would provide for the retention of the present system of election by electoral vote, but would revise the manner of casting these votes.

POLICEMAN FAILS TO TALK MAN OUT OF SUICIDE TRY

MILWAUKEE, June 14.—Hundreds of persons watched Police-man Raleigh Falbe argue yesterday with a man atop a bridge against suicide—and then saw the man leap.

"Let's be sensible," the policeman said to the man on the bridge, Edward Kluge, 56. "Why not talk it over?"

"Never mind, just stay away," said Kluge.

For 20 minutes they argued. In the meantime word had been sent to the fire department. When the fire alarm sounded, Kluge shouted: "They won't catch me in any net," and leaped 45 feet to a dry creek bed. He was not killed, but was so badly injured he may not live.

PORTLAND'S NEW SHORTSTOP PROVES WINNER WITH BAT

Joe Hassler, shortstop, recently acquired by Portland from the Philadelphia Athletics, slammed out a homer in the eighth inning to break a tie and win the battle from the Hollywood Stars 6 to 5 in the southern metropolis yesterday. Hassler scored another four-base hit in the first inning and a double and single in two other trips to the plate. Cleo Carlyle put Hollywood in the lead in the seventh inning with a home run while two were on. Buzz Wetzel, Star pitcher, failed to hold the Ducks in the next frame, and Roy Mahaffey, Ducks' twirler, hit one into the bleachers to even up the score.

The league leading San Francisco Mission Reds, facing the crux of the coast league mid-season, rapidly pulled further ahead of the pack, with the added impetus gained from defeat of the second place San Francisco Seals by the Sacramento Senators.

Harry Krause, veteran southpaw ballplayer of the Reds, got off to a bad start, but he quickly recovered with the help of his mates at bat defeated Seattle 7 to 5.

Louis Vinel, Sacramento Italian southpaw, stopped the Seals' winning streak with his handy hurling. He shut out the visitors to the capital city 4 to 0.

Pete Daglia, star twirler of the Oakland aggregation, turned in his eleventh pitching victory of the season at Emeryville, defeating the Los Angeles Angels for the third consecutive time this week to the tune of 5 to 1.
