## STRIPED BASS ARE REPORTED IN UMPQUA RIVER

The first reported catch of a striped bass from the waters of the Umpqua river was made Monday by D. O. Weaver of East Gardiner, according to the reports filed with local fishermen's headquarters, says the Port Umpqua Courier. The catch was of a 7-pound bass, a small one, according to the average size reported caught in other rivers to the south.

An interesting phase of the history of the striped bass shows that it is gradually working northward. Five years ago, the first report of the bass was made in Coos river and now the major catches are of the striped bass. Twenty-five years ago, the bass was imported from Japan and planted in the waters of the Sacramento river.

It is presumed that within two or three years that a greater number of the striped bass will be reported as caught in the waters of the Umpqua river, judging from the record of the Coos river.

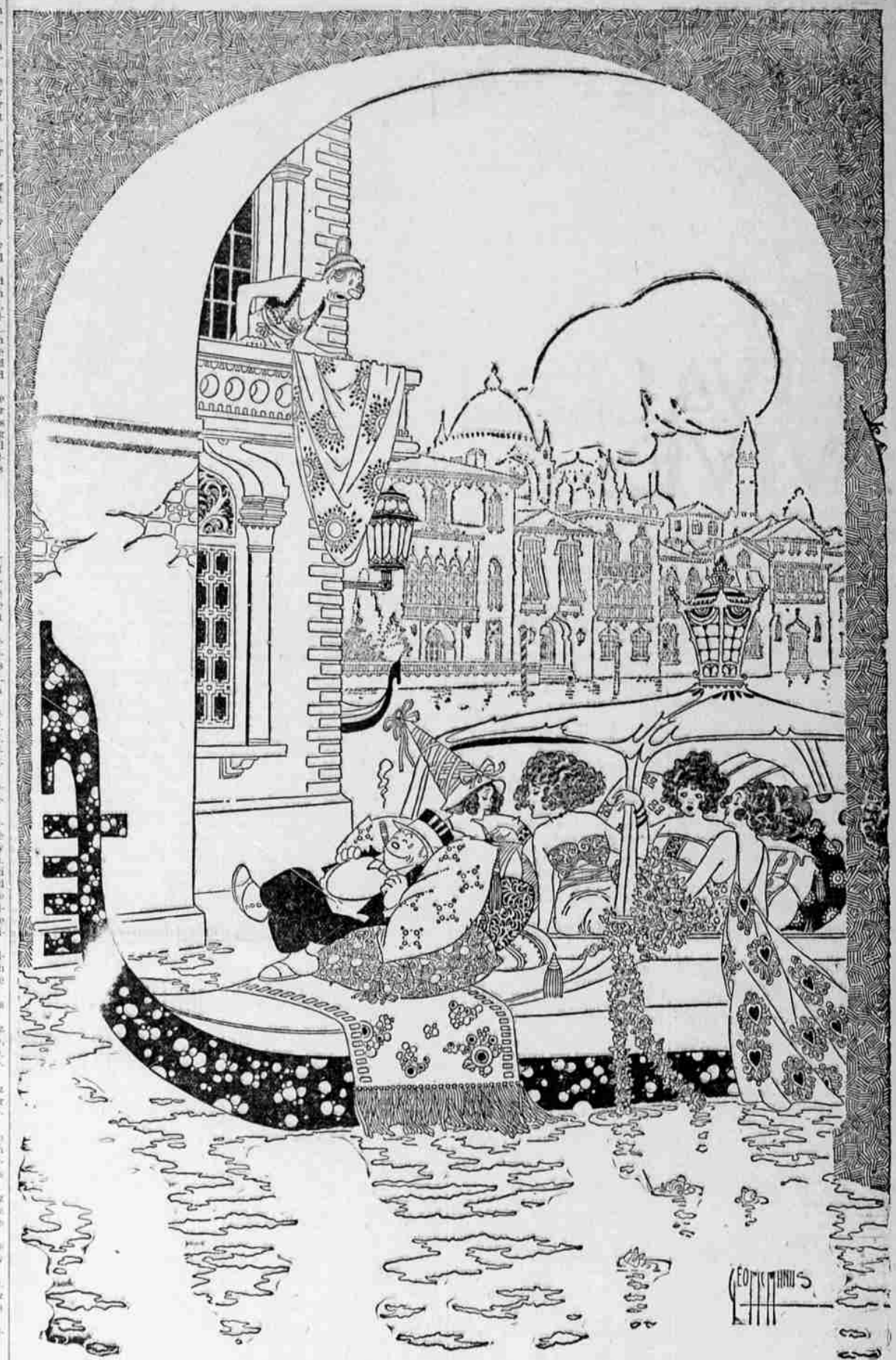
