HOUSE VOTES NEARLY 3RD OF ALLOTTED SUM

**\$151,500,000 Enough
For Federal Board
Now, Opinion of
the President.**

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Responding quickly to the recommendation of President Hoover, the house today passed a bill to appropriate \$151,500,000 of the \$500,000,000 authorized for the federal farm board by the farm relief act.

The money would constitute the initial outlay of the \$500,000,000 appropriation authorized by the new act. Expenditure of the money would be made by the members of the federal farm board created under the new law.

Selection of the board membership now is being considered by Mr. Hoover. Chairman Wood of the appropriations committee, in offering the bill, explained that \$150,000,000 was the initial amount of the half billion dollar revolving fund and the \$150,000,000 was for the expense of the board.

Representative Garner of Texas, the democratic leader, asked why the whole amount of \$500,000,000 was not appropriated. Wood said the president felt it would not be necessary to appropriate the whole amount.

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FLORIDANS ALSO SCORE NEGRESS AT WHITE HOUSE TEA

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., June 17.—The Florida house of representatives today adopted by a vote of 71 to 13 a resolution condemning what the resolution termed "certain social policies of the administration in entertaining negroes in the White House on a party with white ladies."

The resolution was prompted by the entertainment at the White House tea last week of the wife of a negro congressman. Priest, of Illinois, last Saturday by the state senate of Texas.

The resolution, before the vote was taken, had been amended so as to "eliminate language which would have protected the act of Mr. Herbert Hoover in entertaining the wife of Oscar De Priest, negro congressman from Illinois," at the White House and the criticism was directed at the White House in general terms.

The resolution called on Glenn R. Skipper, republican national committee-man from Florida, to "convey to the president of the United States the earnest protest of the house of representatives and that he use his influence with the president to the end that incidents hereinafter alluded to be discontinued."

JAPANESE VOLCANO ROUTS VILLAGERS

OTARU, Japan, June 17.—The volcano Komagatake, north of Hakodate, which has been quiescent for a decade, erupted today, the lava flow firing forests on the mountain side. The ashes fell in nearby villages three to five inches in depth, inhabitants deserting their homes.

The eruption was accompanied by earth tremors. No casualties were reported but it was feared the damage was considerable.

Stowaway Has To Go 50-50 on Sale of Story

PARIS, June 17.—Three French trans-Atlantic birdmen were plunged today into a long program of receptions, dinners and celebrations. Although Paris seemed blue to ocean flights, there was no disposition anywhere to let the foot of Jean Assolant, Rene Le Fevre and Armand Lott pass without recognition.

The grinning, garrulous stowaway of the Yellow Bird, Arthur Schreiber, sure of a harvest of greenbacks for the story of his first stolen ride over the ocean, gave his first thoughts of the day to getting spruced up for his stay in Paris. Colonel Lindbergh after his arrival here, contented himself for a while with a suit loaned by one of the footmen at the American embassy, but Schreiber, whose home is in Portland, Maine, said quite plainly that he wanted "some presentable clothes."

Lott revealed that shortly after the discovery of Schreiber aboard the plane he made him sign a contract, guaranteeing 50 per cent of his earnings, from writing about his flight, to Assolant and Le Fevre. Lott himself is independently wealthy. A syndicate offered the young American \$20,000 for his narrative.

To most Frenchmen the young American remained a great puzzle today with the French morning press giving him a great deal of space but largely as a curiosity. His talkativeness in his own language, his incessant repetition of three French words, "vive la France," his waving of an American flag and his general demeanor were quite inexplicable to the logical French mind.

The French newspapers have dubbed him with the word applied by the three Frenchmen who were infuriated at finding him aboard the plane last Thursday but later befriended him, the word being, "le polisson," which in its mildest form may be translated "the rascal."

BEER RUNNER SLAIN BY BORDER PATROL MEN IN NEW YORK

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GO-ED'S DEATH PLACED AGAINST DR. J. H. SNOOK

University Instructor to
Face Ohio Grand Jury
as Alleged Slayer
of Theora Hix.

Investigation Reveals Tell-
Tale Blood Stains and
Intimate Relations
With Victim.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 17.—John J. Chester, Jr., county prosecutor, announced today that he will lay the killing of Theora Hix, Ohio state university co-ed, before the county grand jury late today and that he "probably would seek a first degree murder charge" against Dr. James H. Snook, university professor, held for investigation in connection with the slaying.

Stains have been found on the door jamb of the automobile driven by Dr. Snook.

Miss Hix's right hand revealed a severe injury when the body was found Friday on a rifle range near here. Working on the theory that she might have been injured by a slammed automobile door, detectives examined the attachments on the doors of four machines today and announced that the marks of the injury fitted the jamb on Dr. Snook's car.

Dawes and McDonald Will Sound New Call to World Powers for Naval Junking

LONDON, June 17.—America's new ambassador, Charles G. Dawes, and Great Britain's new prime minister, Ramsay MacDonald, have launched a new movement toward broad naval disarmament, in a luncheon at the little town of Forres, Scotland, yesterday. General Dawes and Mr. MacDonald, arrived at an understanding which will prove the basis and beginning of negotiations for their two governments, joined by the other naval powers.

The prime minister, with his own hand, wrote out the summary of the conversation with the new ambassador. He said:

"We have had a conversation regarding the present position of the question of disarmament as between the United States and Great Britain. It has been informal and general, and most satisfactory."

"His excellency, General Dawes, proposes to refer to the subject at the Pilgrims' dinner on Tuesday night, and I shall do the same at Lonsdalehouse and that is intended to be the beginning of the negotiations. We both wish to make it clear that other naval powers are expected to co-operate in these negotiations, upon the successful consummation of which the face of the world depends."

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PLANE CRASH KILLS SEVEN

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STORM WRECKS FREIGHTER ON COLUMBIA SPIT

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HAL HOSS HERE FOR INSPECTION OF MODEL FARM

ASTORIA, Ore., June 17.—The coast guard station here announced today that the seaman who lost his life in the wreck of the freighter Laurel at the mouth of the Columbia river was Russell Smith, 19, of Worcester, Mass.

Norman Dahous, 29, of San Pedro, Calif., was in a critical condition in a hospital here, where three other crewmen were taken.

The coast guard cutter Redwing reached Astoria this morning with eighteen survivors which the cutter had taken off another rescue craft after it had become disabled and was drifting to sea.

Among the men in the hospital here was Bernard Berenson, 21, mess boy, 494 Harrison street, Portland.

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SCHOOL ELECTION IS BEING HELD THIS AFTERNOON

GRANGEVILLE, Idaho, June 17.—Dynamite was exploded in a deliberate attempt to wreck the Hickeyson building in the main business section here last night and the lives of fifty persons sleeping in apartments on the upper floor were imperiled.

The explosive was placed directly under the ice machine in the butler shop of John Hanks and wrecked the rear end of his establishment with property damage of \$500. Occupants of the upper floor were in many cases thrown from their beds.

The explosion came at 11:45 and by midnight the place was filled with volunteer firemen, who soon discovered a second charge of powder, fuse attached and fire kindled. Had this charge exploded death inevitably would have resulted.

Entrance to the building was effected through an opening in a room under repair. The J. C. Penney store occupies the central portion of the building, which is one of the largest in Grangeville.

Authorities have the fuse and powder with good chances of tracing the explosive to the purchaser.

TRAIN-COUPÉ CRASH KILLS 2 NEAR CURTIN

Victims Of Collision
At Crossing Are
L. Stigers, 18,
L. Clark, 21.

Auto Plunging Off North
Umpqua Road Crushes
Life From Gene
Durland, 18.

Two accidents, resulting in three fatalities, all of the victims being young men, occurred Sunday. Leslie Clark, 21, and Louis Stigers, 18, residents of Curtin and Anlauf, in the extreme north portion of Douglas county, were killed in the early afternoon at the Bear Creek railroad crossing, near Curtin, when their Ford coupe was struck by southbound Shasta, No. 11. Gene Durland, 18, of West Roseburg, a member of this year's graduating class of the Senior high school, was killed near Honey Creek on the North Umpqua road, late yesterday afternoon when the car which he was driving, plunged over the grade, crushing out his life against a tree that broke the car's fall. His companion, Jack Gibbs, escaped with only minor injuries. As a peculiar coincidence all of the victims were young men and all died from fractured skulls.

The first accident happened about 12:45 p. m. while Stigers and Clark were driving from Anlauf to Curtin.

The railroad parallels the highway at that point at a distance of about 100 yards. The boys had turned off on the county road, which crosses the tracks at what is known as the Bear Creek crossing. Violation at that point is obstructed by a building near the tracks, and apparently the occupants of the car did not hear the approaching train.

Their car, traveling at a fairly fast rate of speed, ran onto the tracks directly in front of the passenger train and was hit squarely by the pilot of the locomotive. The car was smashed into kindling wood and both occupants sustained

EARTHLY WOES OF MANKIND'S FRIEND AT END

HADLEY WOOD, England, June 17.—Covered with a Salvation Army banner, the body of General William Bramwell Booth lay in his home here today. His passing last night was unrecognized by any outward sign of mourning either officially or among the rank and file of the Salvation Army, which he headed so long until he died recently.

Not a flag was lowered at the international headquarters in Queen Victoria street. "We keep our standard flying high," said a high official. "For General Booth is not dead—he has passed to glory."

But though the army tradition does not admit loss there was in evidence everywhere among the Salvationists a deep sense of personal loss that they felt at the 73-year-old general's death, so quietly and suddenly last night after final months of life which had been filled with the agony of ill health, distasteful conflict and defeat.

One effect of the general's death it was believed, would be to put an end to all further litigation connected with the army's leadership, thus saving the surviving leaders anxiety and the army itself considerable expense. It was believed distress he felt at deposition as head of the army had an adverse effect upon his physical condition and may have shortened his life somewhat.

TRAIN HITS AUTO AT SALEM; THREE PERSONS INJURED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—A woman was injured, possibly fatally, and two other persons were badly hurt at Salem yesterday when a Southern Pacific West Coast Limited struck their automobile driven by Ward Howe of Mills City. Mrs. Charlotte Hardy of Medford, visiting at the Howe home in Mills City, was not expected to live. Howe's head was crushed and physicians said he might have received internal injuries.

Mrs. Ruth Randy, 18, of Mills City, suffered severe lacerations and bruises.

Mrs. Theresa Andrews, 72, of Oakland, Calif., was killed here Sunday when a car driven by Ray Coolidge, 26, of Glenwood, Wash., crashed into her automobile. Coolidge was arrested on a charge of involuntary manslaughter. Police say he failed to stop at a through street, and that he was driving 40 miles an hour.

FIRE WIPES OUT RESORT IN TEXAS
