ATHLETICS, WITH EIGHT-GAME LEAD, CAN SEE PENNANT

Standing About Like That of Yanks at This Time in 1928—National Race Guesswork.

The first third of the way has been traveled, but for the Athletics it has been anything but the hardest. Even though Cleveland outscored the Mackmen by 10 to 5 in Cleveland yesterday as the Yankees were sinking the Tigers by 11 to 7 for the third time in four days, the Philadelphiaans passed the 500 mark with 59 victories and only 12 defeats for a percentage of .765 and a lead of eight games over the Yankees.

This record is two games below the figure reached by the Athletics in 1928, but in five games better than the mark of the 1927 Yankees, who set an American League record with 110 victories and a percentage of .714. The Yankees in 1929, the first year of their current reign, showed 57 victories and 14 defeats in their first 71 games.

If precedent holds good, the advantage of the Mackmen will prove sufficient. From this point to the finish, they can play .500 baseball and cause the season with 95 victories and 46 defeats. To beat such a mark, the Yankees would have to win 95 and lose only 47, a .641 clip as compared to their current .605. The grade seems not quite so steep as it might when the recent hard hitting of the champions is considered, but it is still enough to suit Miller Huggins.

Washington defeated Chicago 5 to 3 and St. Louis turned back Boston by 5 to 2 in remaining American League fixtures.

Cardinals Lose Two

The National League Donnybrook became even warmer through the theme of the games yesterday. The Braves, who were supposed to supply an alternate of coin for the Cardinals, so far forgot themselves as to win two one-run decisions from the league champions, 6 to 5 and 5 to 3. Billy Southworth risked his second line of pitching defense in the opener, but the Braves routed no less a person than Jess Haines in the nightcap. Much the same thing happened at Cincinnati. Donie Bush got away with the first game by 8 to 2 while employing Young Meigs against Adolfo Luque and others, but the Reds amazed all hands in the second game by knocking Darrel Grimes from the box and giving him his first defeat of the season. He has ten victories. The score was 8 to 1, with Pete Donohue officiating for the Reds.

Cubs Lose, Giants Win

The Cubs meanwhile were taking a 7 to 2 jolt from the Phillies while the Giants were flattening the Robins in Flatbush, 11 to 4, behind the fine pitching of Carl Hubbell. Hege fanned 13 Cubs just to make his triumph the more impressive.

These various results left the Cardinals still leading, but only by the skin of their teeth, with the Phillies barely ahead of the third-place Cubs. The Cards, with 618, were three points ahead of the Buccaneers, who in turn were three points in front of the Brains. The Giants were only three and one-half games from the lead when the battle smoke cleared.

At midnight last night, the dead line on major league trades was reached, assuring the fans of the exact makeup of the teams which will battle down to the wire, three and one-half months away.

SALO WINS PILE DERBY AND \$25,000 IN PRIZE MONEY

LOS ANGELES, June 17.—Bronco of skin, harness of race and won to the point of exhaustion, but with the sturdy cunning heart of a son of Finland, Johnny Salo, 36, today had conquered 7,555 mountains, to win the C. C. Pyle bunton derby and the \$25,000 first prize of the continental spinning race.

By a margin of but two minutes and 47 seconds Salo triumphed in the gruelling trial from New York City. That slim head he held over Pete Gavazzi, 115-pound Italian, in the total elapsed time standing when the transcontinental event came to an end here last night.

It was in the final hours of the lengthy journey that Salo, a Finn, N. J., policeman, blazed his trail to victory. He came from behind to snatch the winner's laurels from the hands of the wiry Gavazzi in the last 20 miles, 255 yards of the derby. Gavazzi made a desperate attempt to head off the flying Finn and in falling lost \$15,000, the difference between first and second place money.

The total running time for the two leaders had been the story. Salo crossed the continent in 525 hours,
