TRAIN-COUPÉ CRASH KILLS 2 NEAR CURTIN

fractured skulls.

Brought to Roseburg the train crew reached them, and they were immediately placed on board the train and started for Roseburg. Stigers died almost immediately and Clark passed away a few minutes later, so that both were dead by the time the train reached this city.

The train was in charge of Engineer G. E. McBride, Fireman H. H. Darroch and Conductor L. C. Johnson.

"We were using every precaution," Mr. McBride stated. "I gave the usual whistle signals at the station a mile away, and whistled again at the crossing post, then sounded an additional blast, not called for in regulations, just before reaching the crossing. The bell on the locomotive was also ringing, but apparently the drivers of the car did not hear any of the signals, for they dashed out directly in front of the engine and there was no possible way to avoid meeting them."

Boys Both Natives

Both of the boys were natives of this county. Louis Stigers was born February 17, 1922, at Ashland, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Stigers. During the past few months he has been employed by the Pioneer Lumber company. Besides his parents he leaves two brothers, John and Walter and three sisters, Ida, Pearl and Mrs. Martha Brown all residing at Curtin and Ashland. Clark was 21 years of age, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Clark. He was employed as a logger in the Black Butte district. He leaves his parents, three sisters, Gertrude, Clara and Fay, and three brothers, Clifford, Alva and Merle, all of Curtin.

The bodies were taken to the Douglas Funeral Home, where arrangements will be made for funeral services.

To Hold Inquest

Coroner H. C. Stearns, who made an investigation of the accident, announced this morning that an inquest will be held probably tomorrow or Wednesday. A jury was drawn and will go to the scene of the wreck late this evening or tomorrow, after which the testimony of witnesses will be taken.

Durand on Fishing Trip

Gene Durand, who was killed late in the afternoon, was returning from a fishing trip up the North Umpqua. He and Jack Gibbs, a close friend, left early in the morning in Gibbs' car and went up as far as Susan Creek. On the way back they had some trouble with their machine and were delayed for a short time, but finally adjusted the mechanical difficulties and started home.

They were a short distance west of Honey Creek when the car went

off the road on a slight turn. Tracks showed that the machine, which Durand was driving, traveled along the extreme edge of the road for about 40 feet, gradually working out toward the edge, until it finally struck a split rail and plunged down the bank directly at a large tree.

Gibbs Thrown Clear

Gibbs was thrown out as the car turned over, and rolled down the bank with a part of the wreckage, and suffered minor bruises. When he climbed back to the car, according to his statement, he found Durand wedged between the automobile and the tree. He was still alive but unconscious. Gibbs tried to pry the machine off the body of his friend, but was unable to do so. He then ran for about a mile and a half back to Hogback Creek, where he knew there was a group of fishermen, and secured aid from three men there. These three, however, were still unable to move the car, and had to secure additional help. Durand was dead by the time Gibbs returned with the fishermen he had summoned to aid.

Durand graduated this year from the Senior high school. He was a star member of the Senior high school football team and was one of the most popular students of the local school.

He is the son of Mrs. Margaret Durand, and leaves, besides his mother, three brothers and four sisters.

The body was taken to the Roseburg Undertaking parlors.

The accident was investigated by Coroner H. C. Stearns and Deputy Sheriff Wm. Boone. It has not yet been decided whether an inquest will be held.

New Debuture Try

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The export debuture plan was introduced in the senate today as an amendment to the tariff bill by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska.

This move is in line with long standing plans of the debuture group to seek incorporation of the proposition in the tariff bill in the event it were eliminated from the farm measure as was the case.

Both Asks Limit

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Debate on the resolution to limit tariff revision to agricultural and related products got under way in the senate today with an opening statement by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, author of the proposal, that the house had exceeded the republican platform promises in the bill it passed.

"I look upon the tariff revision," Borah said, "as part of the program of farm relief which this special session was called to consider."

"My only purpose in offering this resolution is to have an understanding whether we are to undertake a revision as part of the relief program or whether we are to undertake a general revision."

He said he wanted to determine whether the senate would treat revision in good faith as a prime element of farm relief or merely make a show of it.

Dry Prowler Nabbed

WINDSOR, Ont., June 17.—Police at La Salle, Ont., a river export point, have discovered that United States prohibition agents are operating on the Canadian side of the Detroit river.

Chief of Police Henry Langlois of La Salle said that Canadian customs men brought a man to his office whom they had found prowling on private property. He had a spy-glass.

The man identified himself as F. Martin, an undercover agent for the United States prohibition en-

forcement service. He said he had recently been transferred to the Detroit area from Richmond, Va., and had been sent over to the Canadian side with other agents.

Chief Langlois said United States agents were free to make all the investigations they chose in his community, but warned them to keep off private property.

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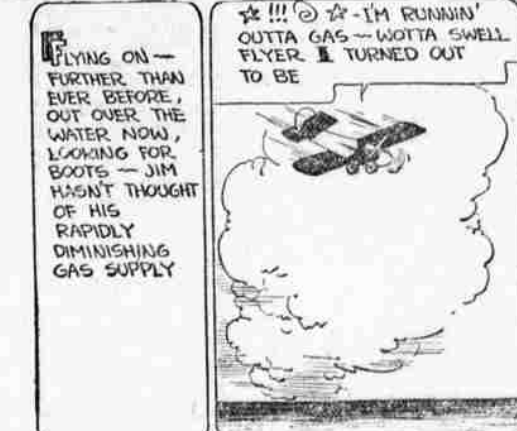

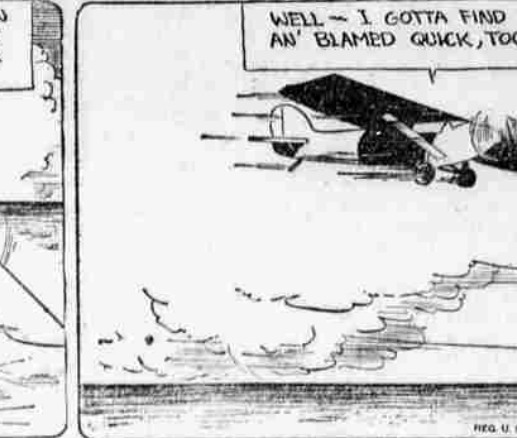
