PETITION ASKS COUNCIL TO NOT BUY EQUIPMENT

ly necessary for the preservation of the streets.

John Hunter, local contractor, declared the purchase of a street roller to be unnecessary, claiming that the council could rent a roller much more economically. He spoke at great length on the reason for the poor condition of the streets, declaring that the city was robbed by poor construction work when the pavements were first laid.

A. J. Hoenradel, a member of the budget committee, declared that the committee had investigated the reports of the street committee and engineer and found that there was a decided need for street repair work, and so included in the budget the sum of \$7,500 for the purchase of equipment and supplies, believing that it is the best policy to keep the streets in repair at a small cost, than to allow them to break down completely necessitating a large expenditure for replacement.

Mr. Hoenradel and Mr. Hunter had a very heated argument over their respective opinions.

No action was taken on the report, which was ordered placed on file.

Objects to Sign—The council heard another hot argument between C. G. Ambrose, North Side barber, and members of the Lions club. Mr. Ambrose declares that the sign erected by the club in the triangular parking to call attention to the North Umpqua district, interferes with a view of his place of business, and will cut into his trade. The club members, on the other hand, declared that the sign did not obstruct vision sufficiently to interfere with Mr. Ambrose's business, while, on the other hand, it will be an important factor in diverting and holding tourist travel. The matter was held over until next meeting.

A petition was received asking for the closing of Second Avenue South, and was referred to the street committee.

C. W. Horner requested the council to force construction of a sidewalk on the east side of North Rose street.

An application of Fred Royce for night fire truck driver was referred to the fire department.

The ordinance providing for increased licenses on transient trades, peddlers and shows, was passed after the third reading.

Several other minor matters of business came up for attention and were referred to the council committees.

complete strength of the opposition ticket.

Incumbents Experienced—The overwhelming majority by which the former directors were re-elected is ample evidence of the confidence of the school patrons in their ability to faithfully serve the district, and the directors are greatly encouraged by the result.

All three of the men are experienced in school affairs, and have a deep personal interest in the work that has been assigned to them by vote of the people.

Dr. G. C. Finlay has served two terms as school director, giving six years altogether into the work. During his entire residence in this city he has been deeply interested in school affairs, particularly the athletic activities, and has given much time into assisting in the athletic work. For a number of years he was coach of the high school basketball team, turning out the first championship team in Roseburg ever had. Since the schools have employed regular coaches, he has cooperated and assisted in every possible way, and twice rejected the chairmanship of the board of directors in order to be free to give his time to the athletic side of the school activities.

Dr. B. R. Shoemaker has completed one term of three years. During that time he has been very active in the work, and has given much attention to the position. For the past year he has served as chairman of the board.

Jack Wharton has had one year as a director. He was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of A. J. Geddies, who was elected last July but immediately resigned to take the office of school clerk. Mr. Wharton, of course, came up for election for two years, the law providing that an appointment can be made only until the following election, and so was chosen to complete the term.

Tomatoes were lower at \$3.75. New white potatoes were getting plentiful. The price dropped to five cents.

The strawberry market was easier with the best fruit quoted at \$1.50. No one seems willing to predict what will happen to the berry market in the next day or two. The weather holds the key. Poultry and fresh meats were unchanged.

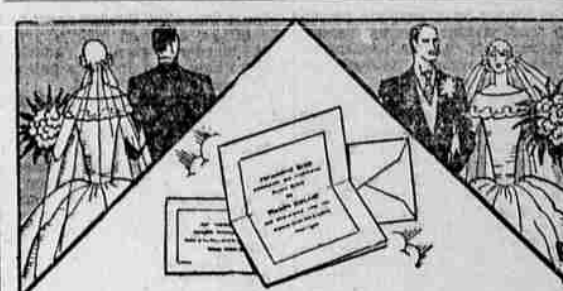
