

## BORDER AREAS ASKED TO HELP IN LIQUOR WAR

will be determined by the orderly proceedings of the department and the courts. I hope that the communities along the border will do their best to help the treasury and the systematic war that is being carried on by international criminals against the laws of the United States. It is these activities that are at the root of all our difficulties."

### Rum Runners Swarm Border

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Assistant Secretary Lowman announced today that confidential reports from treasury agents indicated an unprecedented gathering of bootleggers and smugglers along the Canadian border from Vancouver to the Atlantic seaboard to smuggle liquor into the United States.

Because of this, he said, the customs border patrol along the entire country had been strengthened.

Lowman also said President Hoover had not asked for any report concerning the smuggling or prohibition enforcement situation and that he had not conferred or made any report to the executive.

### Protests Pour In

The White House, he said, had transmitted to him a telegram from Minnesota citizens protesting against the killing of Henry Virnkola by customs border patrolmen.

Besides this 150 other telegrams both protesting against and approving the treasury stand, he added, had been received on this case.

Lowman declared there was nothing that could be done at this time about the protest and that the case would be allowed to take its usual course in the courts.

Instructions to all collectors of customs along the Canadian border to confine the armament of the border patrol men to the service pistol were issued yesterday by the treasury. Heretofore the customs border patrol have in some cases been armed with rifles and shotguns.

The killing by a customs patrolman of Arthur Gordon above Plattsburgh, N. Y., was declared by Assistant Secretary Lowman to have been accidental.

### Speed Boat Is Target

DETROIT, June 18.—Charges that a United States coast guard cutter turned a machine gun on two men and a woman in a speed boat on the Detroit river were sent to the Canadian government at Ottawa today by Chief of Police James Proctor of Sandwich, Ontario. The woman was said to be "Mrs. Johnson" of Sandwich.

The men in the boat, Carl Raymond of Monroe and James O'Connor of Newport, Mich., told Chief Proctor that the windshield of their boat was shattered by the coast guard fire. They and Mrs. Johnson escaped injury.

Police and residents of Sandwich

said repeated bursts from the machine gun were audible ashore for several seconds. Both men in the boat said they were not challenged before the coast guardmen opened fire.

They could not say whether they were in American or Canadian water at the time, being near the middle of the river.

Chief Proctor addressed his protest to the dominion department of external affairs and said: "While I appreciate the very difficult duties that the American officers are trying to perform, I feel that a matter of this kind should be brought to your attention before more serious trouble ensues."

### Mob Threatens Deputy

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 18.—Deputy Sheriff George Johnson, charged with murder in the slaying of Glenn Quay, 22, at Newport, Ark., was held today in the state penitentiary here after his removal from two jails yesterday in fear of mob violence.

Quay was shot through the back by Johnson as he broke away from the officer after arrested on a charge of intoxication. The youth's dash for liberty was made near the police station door and the fatal shot was fired as he darted into an alley.

Johnson first was removed to the county jail at Batesville after a crowd of men, incensed at what they described as unwarranted use of a pistol by an officer, gathered about the local jail. Later Sheriff D. L. Nance said he had heard reports that the Batesville jail was about to be stormed and advised that the prisoner be removed to the penitentiary.

The deputy sheriff was brought here in the custody of Chief of Police G. C. Martin of Newport and several other officers.

### Claims Accident

At first he refused to discuss the slaying but later told penitentiary officials the youth suddenly struck him as they entered the jail at Newport and ran. "I then drew my pistol," Johnson said, "intending to shoot only to frighten him, but I stabbed my toe and the weapon was discharged accidentally." He said he had arrested Quay for being intoxicated.

Johnson's statement affirmed an explanation of the shooting given yesterday by Chief Martin.

Quay was shot Sunday night and the officer arrested and charged with murder yesterday. Johnson will be held here until his preliminary hearing is arranged.

The deputy sheriff is the father of 10 children.

## NO MATTER WHERE THE G. O. P. WAS BORN, HERE'S THE MAN WHO NAMED IT

PONTIAC, Mich., June 17.—Although two cities are at present arguing over the honor of having been the birthplace of the republican party, historians who have delved back into the political past have at least discovered to their satisfaction the identity of the man who gave the party its name.

In Ripon, Wis., and Jackson, Mich., plans are being made for celebration of the 75th anniversary of the party's birth. And in Pontiac it has been learned that the man who applied the name "republican" to the new party that was born in 1854 was Zephaniah B. Knight, then editor of the Pontiac Gazette and later a citizen of Omaha, Neb.

According to the historians, the part played by Knight and Free Soil editors in forming the new party never has been given its proper place in history. Without the aid of these editors, it is said, it might have been impossible to weld the political factions of the anti-slavery groups into a compact, harmonious party.

### Acted After Whig Defeat

The movement for the formation of a new party followed the crushing defeat of the Whigs in 1852. Letters from the National Intelligencer, the Albany Journal and other Whig papers were sent to Whig editors in all parts of the country asking what was to be done.

These letters induced some of the leading Whig editors in Michigan to hold a conference at Jackson in 1854.

The editors met and adopted a policy looking toward the consolidation of all anti-slavery elements. Henry Barnes of the Detroit Tribune, George H. Fitch of the Kalamazoo Telegraph and Mr. Knight were appointed to attend the Free Soil party state convention, called for Feb. 22, 1854, and submit a consolidation proposal to the leaders of that party. It was at the Jackson meeting that the name republican was first suggested by Mr. Knight.

The minutes of that meeting were preserved by Colonel Charles V. DeLand, who in his report has this to say about the party's name:

"Considerable has been written and many claims made as to who is entitled to the honor of naming

the republican party. The call for the July convention was mailed to a number of men of national reputation. Among them were William H. Seward, Thurlow Weed, Horace Greeley, Silas Wright and D. S. Dickinson of New York, Senator Collamer of Vermont, Senator Hamlin of Maine, David Wilcott of Pennsylvania, Henry Wilson of Massachusetts, Benjamin Wade and S. P. Chase of Ohio, J. W. Grimes of Iowa and Governor Bissell of Illinois.

### Had Many Suggestions

"Several of these gentlemen wrote letters endorsing the action and suggesting that action be taken. Nearly all suggested some combination name. Senator Seward mentioned the 'American Union Party'; Horace Greeley, the 'Democratic-Republican Union Party'; Benjamin Wade, any name but 'Pro-Slavery Democrat'; Salmon P. Chase, 'Anti-Slavery Union'; Silas Wright wrote: 'Let us go back to Thomas Jefferson's appellation, when he antagonized the Federalists, and re-establish the old Democratic-Republican Party.'

"These letters were all placed at the disposal of the committee on resolutions, and when the time came to fill the blank for a name Zephaniah B. Knight, a member of the committee and editor of the Pontiac Gazette, made a motion to fill it with the single word, 'Republican.' Mr. Knight's motion was adopted and to him belongs the honor of suggesting the name that has become so conspicuous and historic among the names of the political parties in this country."

clutched to broken masts and railings of the broken freighter. Great waves at times swept over the ship and the coast guard looked upon this promontory had difficulty in seeing the wreckage through the foam and mist.

When the seas subsided temporarily, however, the master of the Laurel could be seen either crawling across the slanting deck or holding onto the ship's fastenings in the teeth of the freshening gale. He wore a life belt.

### Force May Be Used

Informed the Captain Johnson was holding the ship for her owners, the operators of the vessel sent word here that the captain be instructed to leave the ship at once.

If he refused, the owners said, the rescuers were to use force. As yet, however, it has been impossible for a rescue expedition to approach the vessel and the message of the owners of the craft is undelivered.
