

### LOCAL RIFLE TEAM WINS FIRST PLACE IN STATE MATCHES

The Roseburg Rifle and Pistol club has been informed by the state rifle association that the team entered by the local club in the state matches for this spring took first place in each match.

The first match fired was the gallery team match and was won by a 52 point margin over any other team entered. The Portland Rifle club took second place and the Rock Quarry team took third place.

The local club will receive a trophy from the Oregon State Rifle association for winning this match.

The second match was the state small bore match. The local team won this match by only five points. The Portland Rifle club took second in this match and the Sellwood Rifle team of Portland took third. Each member of the local team will receive a gold medal.

In the third match the local team scored on the Lapine Rifle club team by only two points for first place. The Portland Rifle club took third in this match. A gold medal will be awarded to each member of the local team.

The first two matches were shot with .22 calibre rifles and the third with the Springfield .39 calibre rifle.

The members of the local club placed well in the state individual matches also. Hugh Pearson was second in the state in the gallery individual match and Hugh Harrison placed fourth. In the small bore from eight matches L. L. Poirer placed second in the state with Hugh Harrison fourth, and Hugh Pearson fifth. Steve and Hugh Pearson placed fourth and fifth in the small bore, any sight, individual match. All of these parties will receive medals from the Oregon State Rifle association.

The rifle clubs over the state are in practice for the matches to be shot in August from which the Camp Perry team will be picked to represent Oregon in the national matches at Camp Perry, Ohio. The local club had three members on this team last year and are expecting to put at least that many of the team this year. Any one that is interested in the shooting game is invited to attend the meetings of the local club on the first and third Tuesday of each month at Harrison's garage.

### Kidnapers of Lieutenant Governor Kinne of Idaho Enter Pleas of Guilty and Await Prison Sentences



Northern Idaho authorities gave relentless prosecution after Lieut. Gov. W. P. Kinne (below) and others were kidnaped near Orofino, and as a result the five men shown manacled together were jailed at Lewiston. The man on the extreme right is an officer having them in charge.

At Lewiston June 18, four of the men pleaded guilty to abduction. They will be sentenced Thursday. The fifth member of the gang, George Norman, will be tried in Clearwater county on charges of being an accessory to robbery, police said. The others said he was their leader in a projected safe robbery which he was planning when they attacked Kinne.

As soon as the lieutenant-governor reported that he had been attacked, thousands of possemen and police who had sought him, began a man hunt and for two days the heavy timber around Orofino, where the attack occurred, swarmed with gun-toting searchers. The prisoners were found at Juliaetta, Idaho, after they had been driven madly across country trying to escape in an automobile stolen from W. L. Tribbey, who became involved in the affair when he and Paul Klidge tried to rescue the lieutenant-governor from the men who held him prisoner.

Defeating the Washington Senators yesterday, 7 to 6, for the thirteenth time out of fourteen starts this season, the Athletics gained a half game over the Yankees, who now trail by eight full games again. The champions got no better than an even break against the Red Sox, despite the presence of Babe Ruth in the flesh—on the bench. Freddy Helmsch exercised his customary spell over the Bostonians in the opener, to win by 9 to 0, but cyprian, Zachary and Sherid shot the chutes in the nightcap, which Boston won by 7 to 4. Lou Gehrig got his eighteenth home run in the opener, holding his tie with Hafey of the Cardinals, who broke out with a round trip blow at Chicago. Other teams in the American league were idle.
