BOY SCOUTS ARE HAVING FINE TIME ON CALIFORNIA TRIP

The Douglas and Coos county Boy Scouts taken on the California trip by E. A. Britton, Scout executive, and Oliver Johnson, a member of the council, are having a wonderful time, according to a letter received this morning from Mr. Britton. The boys are camped in Honeycreeper's Dell, an auto camp in San Francisco, where they have four cabins for the eighteen members of the party. The letter written Sunday states that the boys went to Stanford University Sunday, expecting to attend the chapel service there, but found the baccalaureate service in progress and no space available.

They made 200 miles each day on the trip south. Monday night they were guests of Sheriff Green and Mr. Whitaker at Scribble Beach resort at Crescent City, and Tuesday night stopped at the Redwood Flat auto camp north of Eureka. Wednesday found the party having a good deal of car trouble, but they managed to get this fixed and continued on into Santa Rosa.

The party is receiving the best of treatment everywhere. Mr. Britton reports, and the boys are getting some real benefit from the trip. The boys are allowed to go out in small groups, and are not being tied down in camp, the only requirement being that they must be in bed by certain hours. So far every regulation has been obeyed.

Mr. Britton states, except when a couple of Marshfield boys were misdirected by street car conductors and rode over most of the town before they finally secured information from a policeman and secured the right car-line to return to their camp.

Saturday, the 15th, they were taken on a trip through Chinatown by one of the Chinese scout masters, getting a much better view than obtained from commercial guides.

Monday they went to Mare Island and visited the navy yards. They will stop at Sacramento and other cities on the return trip this week. There has been no sickness in the party.

As soon as Mr. Britton returns he will complete arrangements for the Wolf Creek camp. There is still plenty of room in the second camp, he reports, and applications may be addressed to his home or left at the Economy grocery.

BRITISH PRESS PLEASSED WITH DAWES' SPEECH

may be hard at times but it certainly will be glorious and if both governments can count on that fall national support for which Mr. MacDonald appeals, success should be assured.

The Daily News, liberal dealing especially with the president's proposed visit to Washington, remarked: "There is a vast amount of work to be done before he goes but when he goes he will carry with him the best wishes and highest hopes of every nation and the love of peace throughout the world."

Paris Writer Cynical. PARIS, June 18.—The French press received the speeches of Ambassador Dawes and Premier MacDonald last night with divided opinion. All displayed the stories with great prominence, emphasizing particularly that while the British premier suggested as a point of departure an understanding between Great Britain and America, Ambassador Dawes insisted on the necessity of an accord sanctioned by the entire world. "Portinax," in the Echo de Paris, took a hearty cynical laugh at the whole business. "To get an idea of what comedy is," he said, "one has but to notice that M. Dawes opened his naval reduction plan by a 'threat' with which he reminded England if she did not come to an understanding, then America would start cruiser building with a \$1,170,000,000 outlay."

Petit Parisien said the speeches marked new orientation in British policy and a certain evolution in American policy.

Berlin Not Stirred. BERLIN, June 18.—Berlin morning papers displayed the Dawes and MacDonald speeches in Great Britain last night most prominently. There was no editorial comment, although the "headlines" gave some indication of the reception.

Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung captioned its story "New Era in Anglo-American Relations."

Deutsche Tagesblatt used the line: "Statesmen, Not Admirals. Must Look After Disarmament." Berliner Boersen-Zeitung used the somewhat ironical head, "MacDonald Dawes Agree—In Principle."

rectly to the heat. There were numerous prostrations.

Water Destroys Town. BOGOTA, Colombia, June 19.—Forty persons are believed to have been drowned and more than 100 injured in practically total destruction of the town of Sevilla by floods from the Quilacay river, after a landslide from a hill into the river caused it to change its course.

Sevilla, which is in the department of Cauca, has about 6,000 inhabitants.

Hundreds Lose Lives. SILCHAR, Assam, Cameroons, West Equatorial Africa, June 19.—Hundreds of people are reported to have perished throughout this district as a result of unprecedented floods after heavy monsoon rains.

Ninety per cent of the cattle in the district have been destroyed and half the houses washed away. This town is under water except for the cantonment where 15,000 people have taken refuge.

Anzacs Again Shaken. WELLINGTON, New Zealand, June 19.—Severe earthquakes were felt today in Murchison and Takaka counties, both of which were hard hit in the tremors of earlier in the week.

Considerable anxiety was felt as to the fate of the town of Lyell, containing 2,000 inhabitants, which was reported greatly damaged and from which no news was available in any source.

Airplanes tried in vain to sight the town, due to bad visibility. All

roads leading to it were blocked. There were rumors it had been wiped out, but these were discarded.

Volcanoes' Toll Sought. TOKYO, Japan, June 19.—Searching parties ventured near the crater of the volcano Komagatake today seeking trace of large number of persons reported missing in the eruption of the past two days. The volcano was rapidly becoming quiescent.

During its violent phase Monday villages throughout were covered a foot thick with ash and stones and shaken as though by an earthquake. More than 8,000 refugees were gathered today at such larger places as Hakodate, Mori and Yamanote, most of them still fearful of returning to their homes.

Rainmaking Try Fails. HONGKONG, June 19.—Army aviators today carried out rain-making experiments above Honkong, dropping a powdered chemical known as "deolin" on the clouds. The experiments were not successful.

Seven flights were made above the clouds and 100 pounds of deolin dropped. The chemical theoretically has a refrigerating effect on clouds, causing greater condensation and subsequent rainfall.

Hongkong is suffering from severe water famine, necessitating drastic action to replenish its supplies.

Diamond lake will yield a take of eight million rainbow trout eggs for the hatchery department of the state game commission, this season, according to Matt Ryckman, superintendent, who has just returned from central Oregon. The number falls far short of that taken last season, but the unusually large yield from Crane Prairie and Spencer creek makes

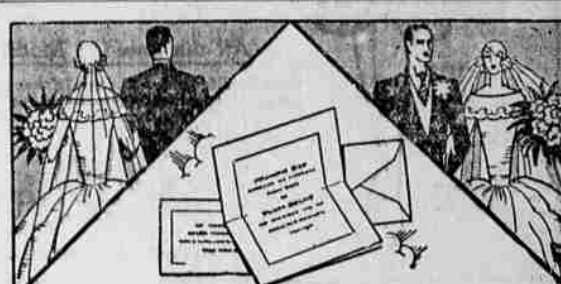
the total take in excess of that of 1928. "Diamond lake was frozen over to a depth of three feet and as a consequence many of the fish spawned near the shore line," said Mr. Ryckman. "The ice was three times as thick this season as it was last year, and that accounts for the shortage of rainbow eggs."
