SCHOOL OFFICERS ARE SELECTED AT RIDDLE ELECTION

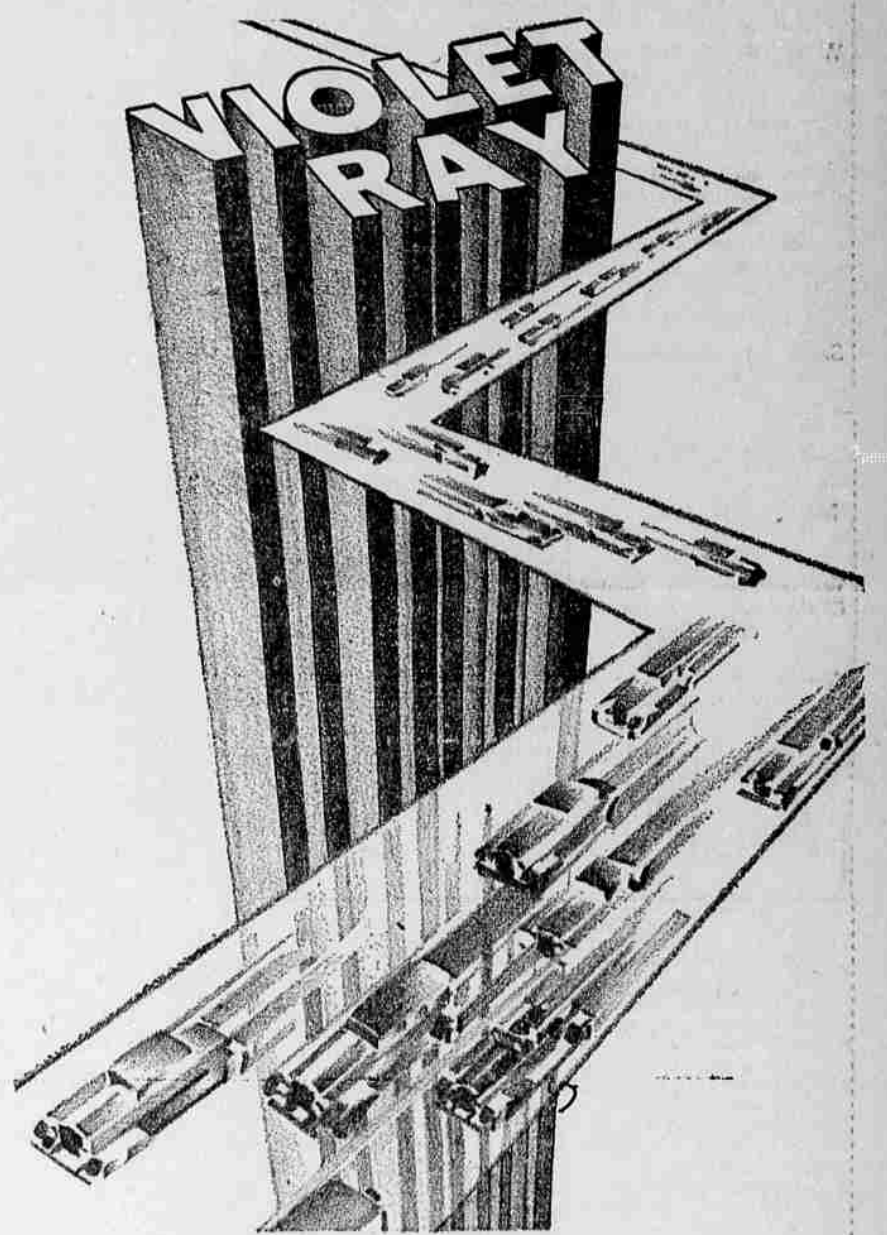
