44 CONVICTS IN BREAK AT STATE FARM IN TEXAS

possession to pursue the convicts.
Three of the convicts came upon
a negro at Kink's ferry, a few
miles away. They forced the negro
from his car, took five shots at
him and started down the road.
The negro ran to the home of a
citizen named Hinkle, who
armed himself with a shotgun and
joined the chase. A few miles
down the road he came upon the
stalled car with the convicts try-
ing to fix it. He opened fire on
them and wounded two, recaptur-
ing them.
The third man to be recaptured
was caught by the bloodhounds in
a cornfield near the prison farm
where he was hiding.

Guards Liberated

The three guards that were
forced to accompany the men were
taken about 10 or 15 miles from
the farm and one of them was
forced to change clothes with a
convict. The guards later made
their way back to the prison farm.
Every town within a radius of
100 miles was notified of the break
and many of them sent posse to
aid in the man hunt.
Several Houston officers, armed

with rifles, left early today for the
farm, which is about sixty miles
from Houston.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June
20. -- R. E. Warnke, 47, foreman of
the laundry in the federal prison
here, was killed today by a flat
iron in the hands of a prisoner.

extended into the southwest with
105 at Phoenix; 94 at Oklahoma

lovelied.

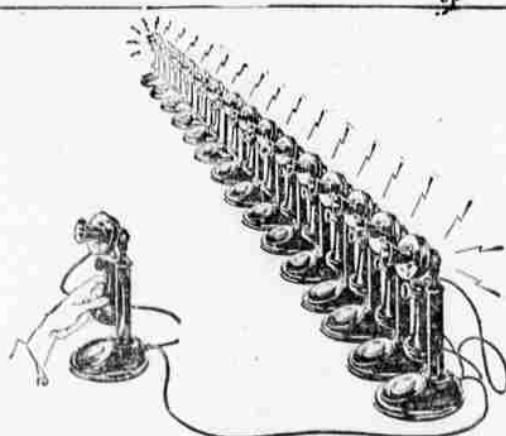
