TRIBAL LAW PREVAILS IN SEMINOLE'S TRIAL

FORT MYERS, Fla., June 20.—Before a court of his own people, at the annual dance of green corn today, Josie Billy, Seminole Indian medicine man, without the aid of alienist or psychiatrist, will answer a charge of slaying Nat Che, widowed squaw, with a plea that he was temporarily insane while under the influence of liquor. Deep in the Everglades, the tribe has gathered to celebrate this festival and to try the medicine man who in the past has sat in judgment upon his fellows. Whatever the verdict—and it may be death or trial by fire—it will be executed summarily, and without interference from the white men for the courts have taken no action in the case. Seminole law has long taken precedence over Florida jurisdiction, for prosecutors have found the tribal language and customs an insurmountable barrier. Billy Billy, also known as Johnny Billy, must likewise answer to the assembled tribesmen for a slaying which resulted from an argument over liquor. Charley Lee was killed during the argument.

ANOTHER WIN PUTS SEALS WITHIN ONE GAME OF MISSIONS

Hard luck continued to pour down on the league leading Mission Reds yesterday as the San Francisco Seals continued their advance, and the Oakland Oaks pressed forward in third place. As a result of yesterday's victory, the Seals were only one game behind the Reds, with three straight in their rack.

Gussie Suhr, home run king of the coast league, clouted out a circuit rounder in the ninth inning, two out and a man on base, to give the Seals a 6 to 4 victory. Dutch Reuther of the Missions, was pitted against Vernon Gomez in a pitching duel. Both are left handers. The Seals now have won 53 games and lost 25, against 52 wins and 39 losses for the Missions. The battle was fierce and the weather was hot.

The Seattle Indians met defeat at the hands of the Oaklanders, due to a bad first inning, when the Oaks scored three runs on as many hits. The final score was 5 to 2. Sacramento required ten innings to defeat the Portland Ducks, 7 to 5, in the camp of the Quack-Quacks. It was a red hot game. Ray French's double to deep left center in the final inning with two on and two out, scored both runners and turned the tide for the Senators after Portland had tied it with a two-run rally in the ninth at 5-4. The Los Angeles Angels with the aid of Clyde Barlow, masterful hurler, put an end to their losing streak by pounding out a 12 to 2 margin over the Hollywood Stars.

LUTHERANS SCORE MARRIAGE LAXITY, DIVORCE GROWTH

RIVER FOREST, Ill., June 20.—Compensating marriage, increase in divorce, decrease in marriage, and birth control, have been condemned at the triennial convention of the evangelical Lutheran Missouri synod. It was pointed out that at the present rate of increase divorces in the United States would end one-fourth of all marriages by 1950 and by 1999 the rate would be one-half. "The Lutheran church calls for a halt in the social breakdown a matter of mere convenience to be discarded at will and for a Bible," declared Rev. Paul Lindemann, St. Paul, editor of The Lutheran American. Dependence of women was ascribed by the Rev. Martin Walker of Buffalo, as the outstanding external factor in the decrease marriage rate and the increased divorce rate. "The chief factor is the loss of

religion," he said. In remedying conditions, the Rev. Mr. Walker recommended greater uniformity in marriage and divorce laws and more strictness in issuing marriage licenses by a decreasing birth rate, strict methods of birth control and point to broken lives, shattered homes, blasted hopes and score of physical and spiritual complications which follow in the wake of such unnatural practices.

NEGRO LAWMAKER SAYS NO SOCIAL PARITY SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Representative Oscar De Priest, negro of Illinois, issued a statement today declaring that no question of social equality was involved in the attendance of his wife at a White House tea recently. "It's all a lot of moonshine for any one to suggest that a question of social equality was involved in my wife's going to a White House tea," he said. "My wife was invited not because she was white or black, republican or democrat. She was invited because she happened to be the wife of a man who was a member of congress."

PORTLAND HOTEL MAN SUICIDES ON PARK BENCH

PORTLAND, June 20.—Edward Kolman, hotel man, shot himself through the temple while sitting on a bench at the entrance of Washington park, shortly after noon yesterday. W. H. Beal, Long Beach, Cal., who was walking nearby, heard the shot and found the body. He leaves a wife, Ida. In an envelope, found near the body, was a note addressed to funeral directors. It read: "Please hold my body until further instructions. Please tell my wife, 71 Lucetta place."

NOTORIOUS IMPOSTOR GOES SUICIDE ROUTE

BRUSSELS, Belgium, June 20.—Otto Debeney, known throughout Europe as an adventurer and impersonator, ended his career today by jumping from the third floor of a small lodging house. He was dead when picked up. Debeney passed himself at various times as a son of the late King Leopold, a son of Maurice Mayerlinck and nephew of a cardinal. One of his most notorious stunts was to decorate an American general with the Rhine forces after the war in the name of the king of the Belgians, and the American troops were paraded in his honor. The fraud was not discovered for a long time.
