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YOUNG PEOPLE IN CONFERENCE AT BOSWELL SPRINGS

Forty-two Delegates Are Registered for Southern Oregon Church Meeting.

Presbyterian Leaders Direct Sessions; Coos Bay Districts Are Well Represented.

BOSWELL SPRINGS, Yoncalla, June 19.—(Special)—Forty-two have enrolled as delegates for the Presbyterian Young Peoples' conference being held at Boswell Springs from June 17 to 23.

This is the third year of the conference for Presbyterian young people in Southern Oregon and the enrollment is more than double that of previous years. Of the communities registered Roseburg and Eugene lead with nine each, Roseburg has as delegates: Bernice Duncan, Vivian Williams, Esther Meyers, Ruth Partin, Margaret McGeer, Elmer Shook, Eugene Uiter, Emory Williams, Phillips Scheiffe. Other churches registered are Reedport, Ashland, Medford and Phoenix 4, Oakland, Jacksonville and Klamath Falls one each. It is likely that the number will increase before the week is over.

As this is the first time the conference has been held this far north for the southern Oregon groups, it is also expected that delegates may come from the Willamette valley and from the Coos Bay district. This year the delegates from this district have been drawn to Boswell Springs as was planned by those in charge.

Rev. Craig G. Whitsett, university pastor for the University of Washington, is dean of the conference. Mr. Whitsett has spent many years working among young people and finds that he can also be of help to these persons from 5 to

23 who are present at the local meeting.

In addition to Mr. Whitsett on the faculty are Miss Ruth Lee, Newberg, who teaches Bible courses; Mrs. Drury V. Haight, of Klamath Falls, formerly a missionary in China; Rev. Albert Saunders, pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church of Eugene; Rev. Roy Acton, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Roseburg, and Rev. Hugh T. Mitchelmore, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Ashland. Class work began yesterday morning at 8:45.

A full program of study, worship and recreation is planned for each day, under leaders who are well trained for the work. Lawrence Mitchelmore of Ashland is in charge of all the sports and recreation.

During the week the full facilities of the resort at Boswell Springs are being turned over to the Presbyterian leaders and young people. This includes the fine swimming pool, ball grounds, hotel, cottages and all. Everything is arranged so as to make delegates comfortable and able to gain the most from the conference.

The large number of boys registered as delegates is an added feature, as in the past the boys have not been present in large numbers. There are at present 18 in attendance. The large number of Presbyterian churches in the district represented is also an encouragement to the leaders in charge.

Vivian Williams and Eugene Uiter of Roseburg were named members of the recreation committee of the student body, at an election held Tuesday evening.

Other members of the recreation committee are Genevieve Hallin, Eugene; Emily Taylor, Ashland; and Joseph Hartley of Phoenix. This group supervises all recreational activities for the forty students in attendance, from all parts of southern Oregon. All delegates are members of the various Presbyterian groups in this southern district.

Young people forming the student council, student control group include: Marie Prescott, Ashland; Flora McMath, Medford; Lorraine Sparr, Ashland, and John E. Caswell, Eugene. This latter organization works out regulations and helps work out the conference with the aid of Rev. Craig Whitsett, student pastor at the University of Washington, who is acting as dean at the Boswell Springs meeting.

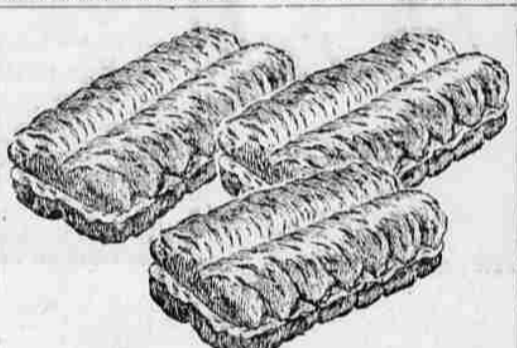

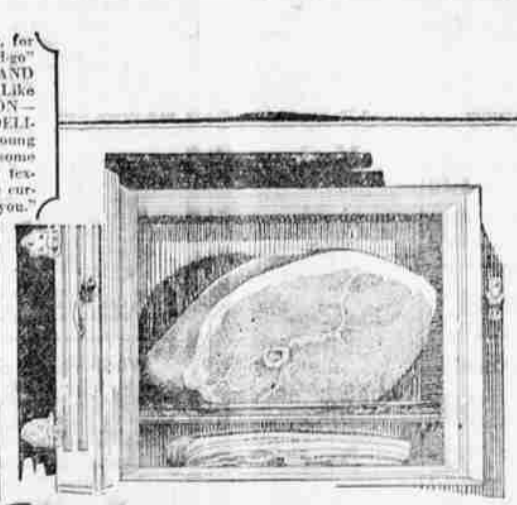
