ATHLETICS—YANKS BATTLE TODAY IN CRUCIAL SERIES

(Associated Press Special Wire) The impending battle between the American League teams tended somewhat to dim the fury of the National League battle yesterday, and caused the auxiliary campaign in the American league to miss all but passing attention.

For all of this fact the rejuvenated Cubs showed Greater Cleveland, Alexander and others sufficiently to shade the Cardinals by 7 to 6 for the fourth straight Chicago triumph. The Giants whaled the Phillies by 11 to 6 and the Braves won another from the Robins, 4 to 2, in remaining National League fixtures. The Pirates and the Reds were idle.

Results in the National League gave the Cubs a somewhat more comfortable margin over the Athletics, and dropped the champion Cardinals further into the mire of third place. The gain of the Giants, except in regard to their immediate designs upon third place, was negligible.

The American league campaign yesterday consisted of victories for Boston, Detroit and Chicago. The Athletics and the Yankees, of course, were idle. The Red Sox rallied to pull out a 6 to 4 decision against Ad Lusia and Brown in Washington as MacFayden checked the Senators' attack at night last.

Young Ed Walsh pitched four hit ball against St. Louis to win by 5 to 3, and the Detroit Tigers bit hard to win by 8 to 4 over the Indians in Cleveland. Farm Notes

By C. L. Leedy, County Agent. Brown rot is developing in a number of prune orchards of the county and may become a serious menace if the present moist weather continues.

However, it is probable that more favorable weather will soon prevail, making control measures unnecessary at this time. Brown rot germs are nearly always in orchards ready to infect fruit when conditions become right. Dense growth of the trees, heavily laden with fruit, combined with the high humidity of the air, and moisture on the fruit, are ideal conditions for the development of brown rot.
