## CAR CRUSHES LEGS OF FLYING CLOUD. MARATHON WINNER

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 22.—Flying Cloud, famous among coast Indians as a runner, and winner of the 1928 Redwood highway Indian marathon, was lying on a hospital cot here today seriously injured, the result of an automobile accident. Flying Cloud, whose real name is Henry Thomas, was hurt last night on the Klamath river highway, a few miles from his home at Happy Camp. His legs were badly crushed and it was believed he suffered internal injuries. Flying Cloud had expected to start training next month for the 1929 Indian marathon.

## WIFE POISONER SPIRITED AWAY FROM TEXAS MOB

NEW HOUSTON, Texas, June 22.—Ocie Nix, 22, who confessed to putting poison in food which caused the death of his seventeen-year-old wife, was held in an unannounced jail today. His removal here following threats of mob violence. District Attorney R. G. Waters announced in Texas last night he had procured the confession and that a murder charge had been placed against Nix. He said the youth gave no cause for the act. Mrs. Nix died of convulsions in the presence of several neighbors Tuesday morning. Her body was exhumed a short time after burial upon reports of the neighbors that she previously had discussed with them alleged attempts of Nix to poison her. News of the confession spread fast and a crowd gathered about the jail. Fearing violence after threats were reported to him, Sheriff D. H. Brooks and his deputies spirited Nix away in an automobile, refusing to give their destination.

## In Queer Kansas Death Mystery

Cales, although members of the girl's family say they believe he is innocent, is charged with murder and will be given preliminary hearing on June 27.

## CHEMISTS DESCRIBE METHOD OF REMOVING STAINS FROM FABRICS

"The kind of fabric which has been stained should be known and a method chosen which will not affect the fabric in question. On silk and cotton mixtures no chemical should be used which would injure the most delicate silk fibres. DELICATE MATERIALS (Silk, Satin, Crepe, etc.):  
Brush the material first. Place face down on a pad of cloth. Evenly but lightly moisten a clean cloth with cleaning fluid. Do not saturate cloth.  
Apply cleaning fluid to the reverse side of fabric, working from the outer edges of the spot toward the center. Change the cloth pad as it soils and finish up wiping spotted part with a swinging motion, from left to right; lightening the pressure at the ends of the stroke.  
HEAVY MATERIALS (Serge, Cheviot, Homespun, Broadcloth, etc.):  
Brush the material first. Dampen a clean white cloth with cleaning fluid and rub lightly but thoroughly into the spot. Auto or Furniture Upholstery, Rugs, etc.:  
Brush or vacuum first. If there is an annual collection of grease, scrape off with a blunt knife. Wet a clean cloth with cleaning fluid and thoroughly rub into the spot.  
If chewing gum has matted or hardened, apply a generous amount of cleaning fluid directly to the spot, allowing it to loosen. Lift with a knife and remove the remaining traces with a cleaning fluid moistened cloth.  
GLOVES (SBK or Fabric):  
Put some cleaning fluid in a bowl and immerse gloves several times. Hang up to dry. The cleaning fluid can be used again; after the soil has settled, strain through cloth and pour back into bottle or can.  
(Kid or Suede):  
Put gloves on hands. Wet a clean cloth with cleaning fluid and apply to both gloves. Rub hands together, going over backs, palms and fingers. Hang up to dry. If badly soiled, dip in cleaning fluid.  
SATIN OR SUEDE SLIPPERS:  
Brush free of dust. Take a clean white cloth moistened with cleaning fluid and rub thoroughly over entire slipper, rubbing spotted part a little more until all trace of soil has disappeared.  
SATIN, SILK, FELT HATS:  
Thoroughly brush hat first. Lightly moisten a clean cloth with cleaning fluid and wipe over entire hat, rubbing spotted part a little more than rest.  
SWEATBANDS IN MEN'S HATS:  
Oily deposits from hair and forehead may be removed from sweatbands of hats by wiping over with cleaning fluid.  
TIES:  
Renew your old ties, make them clean as new with cleaning fluid. Lay ties flat, lightly moisten a clean rag with cleaning fluid and

## ATTORNEYS WILL FORCE DR. SNOOK TO STAND TRIAL

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 22.—A first degree murder indictment today stood against Dr. James H. Snook, dismissed Ohio State University professor, as he awaited trial for the confessed slaying of his co-ed paramour, Theora Hix, 23-year-old student of medicine. Snook's attorneys announced they would not permit him to plead guilty to the indictment, as he had indicated he would, forcing the state to prepare for a trial by jury. Despite his written confession that he slew the girl in a jealous quarrel, Mrs. Snook today declared she believed her 49-year-old husband innocent, and asserted she would support him through the trial.

"It is impossible for me to realize or believe that Dr. Snook committed this crime," the wife of the former professor of veterinary said. "He could not have done such a thing. For seven years he has been a thoughtful husband, and I will go to him as soon as I am permitted."  
Snook admitted after a 24-hour session with police and Prosecutor Chester that he slew the girl a week ago Thursday night on a lonely rifle range near here because she had threatened to kill his wife and two-year-old daughter if he took them out of town over the week-end. He beat her into unconsciousness with a hammer and then slit her throat with his pocket knife "to end her suffering," he said.  
A plea of temporary derangement was under consideration by defense attorneys. It was indicated in their comments on the case. They also hinted at a possible defense plea. Snook said in his confession that the girl was reaching into her bag, where she sometimes carried a pistol, when she left his car just before the slaying. The indictment specifically charges premeditated murder.  
Electrocution is the penalty for a conviction returned without recommendation of mercy.
