EGG PACKING PLANT IS PROMISED WHEN CONDITIONS MET

Hundred Thousand Hens Signed Up Requirement of Poultrymen's Association.

No Danger of Overproduction, Dixon Tells Large Group at Meeting in City Hall.

An egg packing plant will be placed in Roseburg as soon as 100,000 producing hens are signed up with the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, E. J. Dixon, manager, assured a large group of poultrymen at a meeting held in the city hall here yesterday. Mr. Dixon stated that the association is anxious to have a packing station in Roseburg, as eggs of better quality may be secured, but it has been found necessary to have at least 100,000 hens contributing to the station before the plant can be operated profitably, and for that reason the association has set that figure as a goal to be reached before the association will be justified in putting in a Roseburg branch.

The packing plant eliminates a great deal of damage to quality occasioned by present transportation methods. In handling eggs by truck they are subject to more or less vibration for several hours, Mr. Dixon says, and this affects the lasting quality. Tests have proven, he said, that eggs brought immediately to a packing station keep longer than those trucked for a long distance.

Quintly he stated is the prime factor today. Oregon eggs have built up such a reputation for quality that they bring top price in the New York market, and even though 12 to 15 days old when they reach New York are sold in competition with choice New Jersey whites.

WIFE, LIKE OTHER DEFENDANT, FREED OF MURDER CHARGE

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, June 22.—A jury in district court here today returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Mrs. Gonda Merrick, charged with first degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of her husband, Bert Merrick, at their fox farm near St. Anthony last October 9.

The defense contended the shooting was done by Julius Jordan, 20-year-old Pocatello resident, who Mrs. Merrick declared fired the fatal shots during an argument over articles he was accused of having stolen.

Jordan was tried last winter and acquitted, and in Mrs. Merrick's trial he testified the shots were fired a few minutes after he had left the Merrick home at Merrick's request.

point were the bandits ordered him to stop, and was forced to back the train to where it was covered by the machine gun.

While one bandit held the train crew at bay, the other systematically rifled the mail sacks of all registered letters, and took everything of value from the express packages.

The two men coolly drove off in their automobile after the robbery was completed. It had not been ascertained by sheriff's deputies whether they bothered the passengers on board.

The machine gun, Southern Pacific officials reported, was mounted on the rear of one of the automobiles. They said the second car may or may not have belonged to the bandits, and pointed out there may have been other accomplices waiting for them.

F. A. Hyecker, rear brakeman of the train attempted to argue with the two men, it was said, and consequently, the train ran 700 feet past the spot where the cars and machine gun were located.

Lost May Be Heavy.

While no detailed estimate has been made of the amount of mail the bandits obtained, it was said by officials that the "haul" might run over \$100,000. The registered mail was in five separate packages, which they loaded in the automobile.

The bandit car was said to have been headed over Willow pass for Concord. Armed posses were immediately set out on all roads the two men were expected to travel.

Barnes, the engineer, was in a Pittsburgh hospital. His wound was said to be not serious. It was when the two men ordered him to back the train that he was shot, having refused to comply with the order.

The ambassador considers the letters only the work of cranks. Questions of newspapermen as to whether they worried him he dismissed with only a smile.

Generally speaking the ambassador's popularity has been increased many times by the hand he had taken in the church negotiations. He was referred to here today on every side as one of the world's greatest diplomats. Many Catholics are inclined to credit him with the final success in the negotiations, stating that they had not been for his mediation the conferences would have been broken down.

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ACTOR "CRASHES GATE" TO TALK IT OVER WITH WIFE

NEW YORK, June 22.—Aboard the liner Majestic enroute to Europe today was Norman Kerry, motion picture actor, without ticket, passport or baggage, in an attempt to effect a reconciliation with his divorced wife.

Mrs. Kerry sailed aboard the ship to visit their 12-year-old daughter in a London school. Kerry, arriving as the liner was about to sail, was prevented from ascending the gangplank but boarded the ship astride a wardrobe trunk on an elevator which conveyed luggage into the hold.

The presence aboard the ship of her husband came as a surprise to Mrs. Kerry who shortly before the ship sailed said she did not expect to see him. She declared a reconciliation was possible, "but only possible."

VOLSTEAD ACT AND KILLINGS HIT BY LUTHERAN HEAD

RIVER FOREST, Ill., June 22.—The Lutheran church here yesterday was described by Dr. W. C. Kohn, president of Concordia college here and an official in the Missouri synod, as being not sympathetic to the Volstead law and vigorously opposed to "the absolutely criminal practices of prohibition officers in shooting down innocent citizens."

"Members of the Missouri synod of the Lutheran church believe that since the Volstead laws are in effect they should be personally observed," his statement said. "But we do not agree with the absolutely criminal practices of prohibition officers in shooting down innocent citizens. Nor do we believe in the principles that underlie the Volstead laws."

The Lutheran church believes all just laws should be obeyed, Dr. Kohn declared, if the enforcement is legal in itself.

"Dry shootings are sheer murder," he said. "Killing transgressors of the Volstead act without fair trial is unchristian, un-American and uncivilized. Such unlawful killings are equal to murder. It is a criminal act to execute a man without a hearing."
