The law, it is explained, does not permit granting of temporary licenses before the regular license would become effective, so that no such applications can be granted.

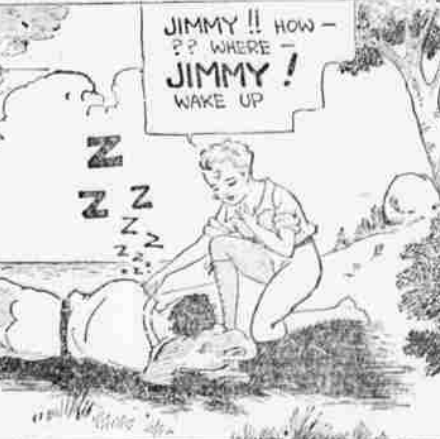
