The home team behind the plate, started out for Glendale but Bishop was hit on the wrist by a pitched ball in the second inning so that Bill Nelson did the twisting for Glendale for the remainder of the game.

SAMUEL C. MARTIN DIES AT GLENDALE

GLENDAL, June 24.—Samuel C. Martin, 76, died Saturday, June 23, following an extended illness. Mr. Martin was born in Allegheny county, Penn., April 27, 1853. He was married there in 1885 to Hatie Stevenson, who survives him. Five children were born to them, four of whom are living and are residents of Glendale. They are Mrs. M. A. Frow, Mrs. K. E. Kell, Mrs. Lory Miller and Howard Martin. Another son, Lawrence Martin, was accidentally killed several years ago while hunting. A brother, Robert Martin, and two sisters, Mrs. Luc Johnson and Mrs. Nettie Gallagher, all residing in Pennsylvania, are also left to mourn him.

Mr. Martin moved from Pennsylvania to Glendale in 1901, taking up a homestead just north of town, where his family made their home for many years.

Mr. Martin was an industrious, hard-working man, a good father and a good neighbor.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon from the Presbyterian church, Rev. J. K. Howard officiating, with interment at the Masonic cemetery.

ERRORS COSTLY TO JUNIOR LEAGUERS IN MEDFORD GAME

The Douglas county junior league baseball team, after playing whirlwind baseball all season, defeating several good adult teams, staged a grand blowup at Medford Saturday afternoon in the district elimination match and lost the best game by a score of 15 to 14. It was not a question of which team was the better, but a question of which team was not the worse.

The Medford team had stage fright during the opening part of the game, while the Douglas county boys played fairly good ball, taking a lead of 8 to 1 in the first three innings. Roseburg's runs were nearly all earned, as the Medford pitcher was picked for 8 hits, 3 errors, 3 walks and 2 batters hit with the ball.

But in the last half of the fourth inning the local team staged a blowup and Medford scored 8 runs on 2 hits, 3 errors, 3 walks and 2 batters hit with the ball.

The local boys came back into the lead again in the 6th inning, with 5 runs on 5 hits, one of the hits being a three-bagger by Welmer. Medford answered 2 runs in the 7th on 2 hits and 2 errors.

This left the Douglas county team still in the lead, but the fatal 7th came along with the local boys still carrying the jinx. Medford scored 4 runs on 1 hit and 4 errors, giving them the lead 15 to 12.

The Douglas county boys had a chance to tie in the 9th, one runner getting on base and being sacrificed to second. He tried to stretch the run to third and was thrown out. The next two batters got hits, scoring one run, but the last man fanned out, giving Medford the game 15 to 14, and the right to play Marshfield for the district championship.

Adamson, the Douglas county catcher, was the only player on the local team without an error to his credit, the boys making 13 errors to Medford's 5. The local boys were hitting consistently and batted out 17 hits to Medford's 10, but three of the game away on errors. Every player on the team had one or more hits.

Pete Romaniuk of Glendale started on the mound for the local team and was relieved by Entler in the 4th. Jack Caldwell pitched the entire game for Medford.

The county is making no alibi for the poor showing. It was just an "off day". The boys have played wonderful ball up to this time, and in every game have played almost errorless ball, but for some unexplainable reason they went entirely to pieces in the Medford game, and the fielding, which has heretofore been excellent, was terrible. The boys, however, were in fine fighting form, and except for their errors would have won by a wide margin.

The former held that farmers should recognize that however high tariff rates might be made on a commodity of which there is a surplus, they cannot aid its producers. He also said the present law gave farm products only 1.1 per cent actual protection and that the house bill would increase this to only 1.3 per cent, "compared with an effective rate on other industries of 35.8 per cent."

Hall charged that "minister and selfish forces dominated the house tariff proceedings, and unless the people bestir themselves they will likewise dominate the senate."

"Agriculture," he said, "for the ninety-ninth time is to be hoodwinked and humbugged by profligate promises of effective tariffs that are a fraud and a swindle, save as to certain minor specialties."

Fog Envelopes Halifax

HALIFAX, N. S., June 24.—A close watch was being kept today by wireless stations along the Canadian coast for word of the Spanish fliers. Ships were asked for information.

Radio stations along the New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Labrador coasts, controlled by the Canadian government report to the superintendent in Halifax, who today announced that there was nothing new.

The weather off the Nova Scotia coast was unfavorable for flying with a thick fog prevailing.

The Spanish consular agent at Halifax, who had been asked to arrange for the possible refueling of the plane at Halifax, stated that he had received no advice of the movements of the plane or its present location.

Non-Stop Theory

NEW YORK, June 24.—A steamship's report of the sighting of a plane, believed to be an airplane, 400 miles south of Cape Race, Newfoundland, Sunday morning, caused curiosity today as to whether the Spanish trans-Atlantic fliers attempted to cross to the American continent without first stopping at the Azores.

Since more than enough time had elapsed since the sighting of the supposed flier for the Spanish plane, the Jupiter, to reach Halifax, or New York, it was presumed that if the plane had made such an attempt it was down in the western Atlantic or in an isolated spot in the east Atlantic seaboard.

Prior to Major Franco's departure from Spain, he was purported to have told a writer that he had a surprise for everybody, and that if all went well he would be in New York by 1 a. m. Sunday morning.

Hawks Tries for Record

LOS ANGELES, June 24.—Captain Frank Hawks took off here at 1 a. m. today for New York City, where he proposes to start a one-stop round trip from New York to Los Angeles and return, beginning at 4 a. m. eastern daylight time.

The pilot was accompanied in his Lockheed-Vought monoplane by Peter Clauson, mechanic, who will condition the plane before its return trip. Hawks took 340 gallons of gasoline, sufficient, he believed, to carry him to Parks field, East St. Louis, Ill., where he hoped to arrive at 2 p. m., central standard time.

There he expected to refuel the plane and continue the journey eastward, landing at near New York as possible before nightfall. He hoped to continue to Roosevelt field early Tuesday.

Under present plans Captain Hawks expected to take off with 500 gallons of gasoline early Wednesday, with the hope of reaching Los Angeles some time between 6 p. m. and 8 p. m. Pacific coast time.

Schoenheiser Crashes

DUBOIS, Pa., June 24.—Thwarted by bad weather and an accident, Lee Schoenheiser, west coast pilot was surviving repairs to his plane today in preparation for another attempt to set a transcontinental non-stop flight record.

His plane was damaged yesterday when he tried to take off from Roosevelt field, N. Y., after having been forced down here by thunderstorms and falling oil pressure.

He arrived here from Cleveland where he had been forced down by fog Saturday night after a flight of 14 hours and nine minutes from Los Angeles, at an average of 176 miles an hour. He took off from Cleveland at 11:20 a. m. landing here an hour later.

When the weather cleared he attempted to take off again but the plane crashed, tearing off the landing gear and damaging the fuselage. He suffered minor injuries.
