## U. S. ENVOYS NOT FORCED TO GO DRY IN FOREIGN POSTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, June 25.—Of officials of the state department said today that any action Ambassador Dawes or any other American diplomat abroad might take to dry up his embassy was entirely within his own discretion.

The question of serving intoxicating beverages in American missions to foreign countries has long been a debated one and many letters of inquiry have been received at the state department from dry law advocates on the subject.

Charles Evans Hughes, when secretary of state, stated in a letter to a United States senator that he considered the privilege of liquors being served in American missions abroad to be one within the rights of the diplomats.

Mr. Hughes argued that the Volstead act did not prohibit the use of intoxicating liquors legally acquired. Since liquors which are served in American embassies and legations are legally acquired, their use, he contended, could not rightfully be prohibited by this government.

The state department in responding to letters from private individuals since that time has followed a similar trend. The department also has pointed to the case of the Cunard Steamship Company, Limited, vs. Mellon in 1923 in which the supreme court of the United States held that the term "territory" in the phrase of the dry act meant "the regional areas—of land and adjacent waters over

which the United States claims and exercises dominion and control as a sovereign power."

## HENRY MASON DAY JOINS SINCLAIR TO SERVE JAIL TERM

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, June 25.—Friends and companions of long standing, Harry F. Sinclair, millionaire oil man, and Henry Mason Day, of New York, vice-president of the Sinclair Exploration company, shared imprisonment today in the Washington asylum and jail.

Day was just entering upon the routine of the jail experience, already familiar to his friend and employer, who went through that phase a month and a half ago. Both were serving sentences for contempt of court because of the shadowing of jurors during the Sinclair-Rail conspiracy trial, while Sinclair was at the same time awaiting out the latter half of his 90-day sentence for contempt of the senate for refusal to answer questions during its investigation of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve lease.

The New York man, facing a four months term, as compared with the six months imposed on Sinclair, arrived at the jail, alone in a truck last night, and cheerfully entered.

"I say now, as I said then, that I am not conscious of having committed any wrongful act," he declared. "I emphatically deny that anything I did in connection with the trial of Mr. Harry F. Sinclair was done with improper, much less criminal, intent."

## FORMER MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY PREXY SUES FOR DIVORCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) ANN ARBOR, Mich., June 25.—Dr. Clarence Cook Little, retiring president of the University of Michigan, last week filed suit in circuit court here for divorce from Mrs. Katherine Andrews Little, it became known last night.

Delay in learning of the suit was caused by a court order suppressing the plea until the date set for its hearing, August 20. The order also made it impossible to ascertain certainly the allegations upon which President Little's action is based. From good authority, however, it was learned the principal item was "incompatibility of temperament."

Dr. Little realized about two months ago under pressure from a board of regents, which did not sympathize with his views or plans.

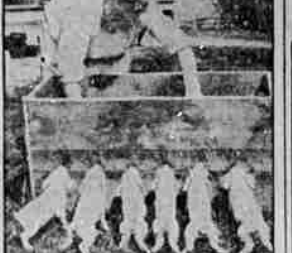
