PORTLAND, June 25.—Short supplies kept prices higher at the dairy exchange today. Standard extras went up one cent to 24 and standard firsts half a cent to 33.

Medium extras were more plentiful and declined one cent to 34. Current receipts were in good demand and went up two cents to 33. Medium firsts were unchanged at 30.

No change was made in butter prices.

The Dalles is shipping in some excellent cucumbers, green beans and summer squash. The cucumbers are priced \$1.75 in 2 dozen boxes, the beans and squash 10 cents a pound.

Raspberry supplies have increased and the price has dropped to \$2.25 to \$3 a crate of 24 boxes. A fine crop is in sight.

Strawberries were lower, not because of demand or increased supplies, but because of poor quality. They ranged from \$1 to \$1.50 a crate.

Cantaloupes are getting scarcer and with lemons, were expected to undergo several advances in the near future.

Vatcoms were half a cent cheaper at four cents.

ADVENTISTS HEAR VIGOROUS ADDRESS BY GEO. SELTZER

Mr. Seltzer is a live wire and rushes about the platform swinging both arms vigorously as he declares that infidels, drunkards, harlots, and sinners of all kinds would pray some time, but their prayers would probably be too late. He gave a very vivid description of the sinking of the Titanic and how the band changed the character of the music from that of the jazz and two-step to "Nearer My God to Thee" as the ship went down.

It was announced that Mr. Seltzer would speak again tonight at the 7:30 hour.

RED SPIDERS ARE DOING DAMAGE TO COUNTY ORCHARDS

Red spiders are becoming rather numerous in many orchards of Douglas county according to J. C. Leedy, county agent, and Roland Parker, county fruit inspector, who have been making investigation of the damage during the past few days.

Red spiders are mites which are so small that they are not seen with the naked eye except after the closest observation. They are very persistent pests and are more injurious than most growers are aware. They are so small that their presence is usually unnoticed until considerable damage is done.

Reduced yields, due to these pests, may be as great as 25 per cent. In addition to this, the size and quality of the remaining fruit may be materially reduced, and there is a corresponding injury to the buds that will produce next year's crop.

These spider mites cause more serious injury on prunes and cherries where no spray program is regularly applied, and of late years on pears, where the ordinary time-sprayer has been discontinued for the reason that it roughens the tender-skinned varieties.

Late dormant sprays of lime sulphur or oil will control two of the three spider mites usually found in the northwest. Mr. Leedy says a summer spray, however, is necessary to control the mite common-

by found in this county. Lime sulphur, 1 to 11 gallons, plus 5 pounds of wettable or atomic sulphur to 100 gallons of water, is the standard spray for mites, or 8 lbs. of superfine sulphur and 4 lbs. of hydrated lime mixed together with 2 qts. of milk and stirred into a smooth paste (water may be added in addition to the milk in making the paste), may be substituted for the 5 lbs. of wettable sulphur.

Summer oils have given good results on pears when used at 1 to 12 gallons to 100 gallons of water. The smaller amount is recommended for prunes where two or more applications may be necessary.

Care should be taken to secure the highly refined white summer oils as the dormant oils will burn the foliage. The trees should be thoroughly sprayed.

Finely ground sulphur, 50 to 100 lbs. per acre, will also give good control for those growers who are equipped for dusting, as this section with its light wind and moderate humidity is very favorable for dusting.

CANONIZATION OF NUN QUESTION AT CATHOLIC TRIAL

OMAHA, June 25.—The canonization trial of Mother Mary Magdalen Bentivoglio, Poor Clare nun who founded the Poor Clare order in the United States, was called today, with the Rev. Jeremiah Buckley of Omaha sitting as judge.

The trial is one of a series of inquiries to determine whether the late Mother Bentivoglio, an Italian noblewoman, "practiced virtues to an heroic degree," as many aver, and thus was deserving of recognition as a saint.

The Very Rev. Albert Kolver of St. Meinrad's Abbey, Evansville, Ill., has been named "vice postulator" to present the case for Mother Mary Magdalen. The Rev. Peter Gannon of Omaha is prosecutor, or "devil's advocate."

Father Kiever said the first tribunal to determine the question of sainthood was held in the diocese of Indianapolis last summer. Another tribunal in New Orleans has just adjourned. The basis for sainthood, he explained, lies in sanctity or "self-conquest" which he defined as "bringing one's self in line with the will of God."
