COOLER WEATHER EXPERIENCED IN MOST OF OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—Slightly cooler weather prevailed in most sections of Oregon today after a three-day period of high temperature.

The mercury soared to 102 degrees in Pendleton yesterday, with a minimum for the night of 63 degrees. The first forest fire of the season broke out in the Unatilla national forest and burned over half an acre in the Gardane section. The fire was under control today, and a breeze from the north was keeping the temperature moderate.

Aswot today reported slightly cooler weather over the Rogue River valley. Yesterday's maximum was 93 degrees.

Roseburg yesterday had a maximum of 92 degrees and a minimum of 49 during the night. Cooler weather was forecast for today.

La Grande yesterday experienced the hottest day of the summer, when a temperature of 92 degrees was reached. The minimum during the night was 61. At 7:30 a. m. today the thermometer stood at the 70-degree mark and was climbing rapidly, indicating that yesterday's mark would be eclipsed.

Grants Pass, too, expected the third hot day in succession. Yesterday's maximum of 100 degrees equalled the Sunday mark.

Other Oregon thermometer readings yesterday were: Baker 86, Marshfield 79, Portland 88, Wolf Creek 94, Eugene 90, Albany 90, and Salem 84.

district than now proposed was suggested, the highway commission felt that the opposition organized by agencies holding a large part of the tax cannot exceed 5 mills even justify an election.

At the last session of the legislature changes were made in the law to remove the objections formerly raised. It was contended by the opposition that under the old law the directors of the district had almost unlimited authority in imposing taxes upon the district. The proponents of the project claimed that such authority did not exist, but at the last session of the legislature the law was changed, specifically limiting the amount of tax that can be voted to 5 mills. This tax can be levied over a period of years or all in one year, but it can never exceed 5 mills even though voted for a term of several years. After the first levy has been raised and expended the people can vote an additional levy of 5 mills if they desire, but such tax cannot be imposed without a direct vote.

Cooperation Expected

It is believed that cooperation can be secured for the construction of the road. It has been estimated that the portion of the road now under construction can be completed upon the same standards as the work already done at a cost of not more than \$250,000. The district, under the proposed plan, would raise \$50,000 of this amount, to be matched by the county. The state and federal government will be expected to match the district and county funds and it is believed that when such cooperation is secured there will be enough money provided to get the road opened through the Diamond lake.

Only 22 miles of road remain unfinished. That section is between Steamboat and Big Camas, and by closing this gap a through road from Roseburg to Diamond lake and eastern Oregon will be provided.

"We are confident that cooperation from the county, state and federal government can be secured," A. C. Marsters, president of the Umpqua Highway association, declared today. "But before we can ask for assistance we must be in a position to state what we are willing to do ourselves. If we can go to the state and federal highway officials and show them that we have \$50,000 to be used on this project, I do not anticipate any trouble in securing their cooperation, but we must make the first move, for we cannot go to them and ask for their aid until we are willing to show that we have done something of a definite nature."

The first step in putting the project into action is the creation of a road improvement district. The boundaries proposed by the association include a much smaller territory than previously suggested, taking in only the direct North Umpqua watershed.

The boundary line, starting at the east junction with Klamath county, follows the line between the Umpqua national forest and the Crater lake national park, then north for about six miles and directly west, passing about through Buck Fork. It swings south to take in the Booth ranch below Dillard, west as far as Brockway, then north, touching the east line of Lookingglass valley, up to Cleveland, then east, crossing the highway about two miles north of Wil-



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
