WORLD MEETING OF LUTHERANS ON IN DENMARK

**Membership of 81 Million,
Nearly One Half of All
Protestant Faiths,
Represented.**

**Archbishop Praises Works
of Founder—Church in
Omaha Is Seeking
Reinstatement.**

COPENHAGEN, June 26.—The second Lutheran world convention opened here today in the presence of thousands of delegates and visitors from all parts of the world, and of King Christian of Denmark.

Divine service was held in the Copenhagen cathedral with a sermon by Bishop Oestfeldt of Copenhagen.

The Very Rev. Nathan Soderblom of Upsala, archbishop of Sweden, opened the regular sessions with an address to the delegates and visitors, among whom were hundreds of Americans from all over the United States and Canada.

The archbishop declared that when Martin Luther nailed his ninety-five theses on the church door at Wittenberg, he had not the intention of forming a new church or advocating separation from the church of Rome, but was later forced into it by the ban placed upon him and his teachings.

Instead, Luther considered himself as an evangelist proclaiming the ancient faith taught by Christ and the early church fathers.

Archbishop Soderblom said the illustrious founder of the Lutheran church preached a message to the entire Christian world, the influence of which was moving outward in ever widening circles in every age. This was particularly true of the small catechism of Luther, which had gained recognition during the past four centuries as the greatest book for the common people ever written, with the exception of the Bible.

"No book of any church has ever been so widely known and diligently used among common people," he said. "Even overstepping the bounds of Lutheranism, the evangelical and Catholic Christians, which is there set forth with admirable clearness and power, bears the promise of the future. Maybe the small catechism is destined in the coming history of the church to gain an amended importance."

Modernity Upsetting Fundamentals Social Worker Cites Two Dangers

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—The world is passing through the "meddling age"—an era during which everything from the radio to the fundamentals of life are continually and consistently "monkeyed with"—so Dr. Samuel C. Kohn, executive director of the federation of Jewish charities of Brooklyn, N. Y., declared today in his address to the National Association of Social Work, at the Palace hotel.

"A curious manipulative humanity now populates this earth," Dr. Kohn said. "We monkey with everything. In music, in plastic and graphic arts, in literature, in business and economic spheres we take all sorts of liberties with standards. Finally in the realm of life itself, the present age is monkeying with every accepted fundamental. This spirit has definitely reflected itself in the fields of social work and child guidance."

Two dangers may be specifically designated—that of standardization of human beings and that of forcing the acceptance of the doctrine that to control, curb or repress tendencies to behavior is likely to result in damage to one's self and to society."

Dawes Going To British Court Like American

LONDON, June 26.—Ambassador Dawes will abandon the example set by certain of his predecessors, and will not wear silk breeches and patent leather shoes with silver buckles at his presentation to Queen Mary at the third Saint James court tonight.

Instead, the American, a former general sometimes called affectionately "Hell 'n' Maria" Dawes, will wear plain swallow tail evening dress. Both former ambassadors, George Harvey and Alanson Houghton, donned knee breeches for court functions.

No reason was assigned by the source revealing the former vice-president's intention, which was in defiance of the convention laid down by the lord chamberlain's office. In the cases of Ambassadors Harvey and Houghton their compliance with the old world formality occasioned considerable comment in America.

The ambassador and his wife met both Queen Mary and King George when General Dawes presented his credentials recently, and tonight's attendance at the court will be merely in compliance with formality.

Mrs. Dawes will first be presented to Queen Mary, Senora de Merry del Val, wife of the Spanish ambassador, and doryen of the London diplomatic corps, acting as her sponsor. Mrs. Dawes will then turn sponsor herself and introduce eight American debutantes and young matrons to Queen Mary.

BOY SCOUTS TO GIVE ASSISTANCE IN CLEANUP WORK

Scout Executive E. A. Britton volunteered the cooperation of the boy scouts in the clean-up and beautification campaign at the regular meeting of the committee last night and it was decided to launch immediately a survey of the city of Roseburg with the boy scouts doing the actual house to house canvass. It will be the purpose of the survey to determine what work is necessary and also to have a means of checking the effectiveness of the campaign as it progresses.

Leon McCintock, was elected secretary of the committee to take the place of R. L. Whipple who is unable to serve. Meetings were declared limited to one hour by Chairman Maurice Newland and will be held every other week.

Plans were discussed for a parade to be held within the next two weeks for the purpose of further stimulating the interest of Roseburg people in the beautification campaign. Contact is being made with people in all parts of the county and there is a county wide interest in the project. It was the opinion of Chairman Newland and the committee that the work should be carried to all parts of the county as rapidly as possible.

Reports from all of the standing committees were heard and excellent progress is being made. The publicity committee requested that representatives of all organizations urge the members of their organizations to phone news items of building, remodeling, painting and painting activity to the News-Review. Such items appearing frequently will tend to make people realize that the campaign is well under way.

ATLANTIC STILL YIELDS NO SIGNS OF LOST FLYERS

**Little Hope Remains That
Captain Franco and His
Three Companions
Are Alive.**

**Air Forces of 4 Countries
Continue Ocean Search
—American Airmen
Set New Record.**

MADRID, June 26.—Hope fast was waning today that Major Ramon Franco and his three companions would ever be found alive. Belief grew that their plane, a Dornier-Wahl 16, crashed or made a forced landing somewhere between Spain and the Azores and had been unable to survive the tempestuousness of the Atlantic.

Spain, Italy, England and Portugal mobilized sea and air forces nevertheless to scan the seas for traces of the missing aviators, who left Alcazar Friday afternoon for New York intending to stop enroute at the Azores for refueling.

There was some feeling in Spain that Major Franco may have overstepped the Azores, either intentionally or unwittingly, and have come down much farther along his route to New York. His statement to friends prior to departure that he would "surprise" them tended to support this theory.

Those most hopeful that the four men would be found alive believed they had alighted at some remote island off the Azores archipelago, and would be picked up shortly.

Varied clues, purporting to locate the seaplane or its wreckage, thus far all appeared to have been false.

Captain Pirie of the British steamer Gredon, interviewed today, said that reports he had sighted a derelict airplane 120 miles from the Azores, were untrue.

New Record Claimed

MINNEAPOLIS, June 26.—A world's record for continuous flight by an airplane over a set course was claimed today by sponsors of the "Miss Minneapolis" endurance plane which has been flown 5,000 miles.

The Miss Minneapolis, which started from here at 5 a. m. Sunday on an endurance refueling flight, is in charge of Thorwald "Thunder" Johnson and Owen Hauglin, of Minneapolis.

They are flying over an eighty-mile course between Minneapolis, Northfield and Hastings, Minn., and are being checked here by Captain P. L. Critchton of the National Aeronautic association.

Stanley Partridge of Minneapolis, president of the local chapter of the association, said he received a telegram last night from national headquarters of the association.

BULLETS FLY AT PORTLAND PARTY; MAN IN HOSPITAL

PORTLAND, June 26.—Critically injured, Wakefield Eubanks, 29, a longshoreman, was in a hospital here today near death with a bullet wound in his back and another in his abdomen. The wounds, police declared, were received during a drinking bout. Jack Rhoades, 26, was being questioned by police in connection with the shooting.

Called by a telephone message, a doctor found Eubanks alone in a Cherry street house owned by Rhoades and injured by Eubanks. There was evidence of a liquor party and a drunken fight.

Police found Rhoades next door. He said he had attended the "party," that the shots frightened him and that he ran from the place after calling a doctor.

DRY FORCES RAID MEMPHIS AND OVER 70 ARRESTS MADE

DRUNKEN SHOOTER IN CHURCH WOUNDS MAN AND HIMSELF

CHICAGO, June 26.—Fifty early morning worshippers were thrown into panic as a drunken man tottered down the aisle of Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic church today and fired three pistol shots toward the priest as he administered communion.

The third shot struck a kneeling parishioner in the hip. The man then turned the weapon upon himself, the fourth bullet grazing his scalp. The priest saved himself by dropping to the floor as the shooting began.

The assailant, Charles O. Foster, 45, was arrested. Redfused by blood, he thought himself mortally wounded.

"I wanted to finish him and finish myself," he muttered. "I'm not a Catholic, but you can give me the sacraments if you want to."

Foster's wife said he had been drinking heavily. She could offer no explanation for the act.

The communicants saw the drunken man stagger toward the altar, but no one moved toward him. Then he took a seat in a pew, sat there a moment and as the priest, the Rev. Father A. E. Keenan, began to attend the communicants he drew a pistol and fired two shots in quick succession. Then a third shot was fired, wounding Richard Murphy. The priest and most of the parishioners had dropped to the floor, and as Foster pointed his weapon at his own head an occupant of the same pew grappled with him and disarmed him.

Father Keenan said he had never seen Foster before.

EPWORTH LEAGUE INSTITUTE TO BE HELD JULY 8-14

Preparations Being Made at
Little River Camp Site
for Coming of Young
People.

The annual Epworth League institute on Little River is to start Monday, July 8, and will continue until the 14th. This is the institute for the southern Oregon district and a large attendance is anticipated.

The Epworth League camp has established last year, the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce having purchased the grounds, which are ideally situated. The young people have constructed a large kitchen and open air dining room and have cleared the grounds. Permanent cabins are to be started this year. It being the plan to expend about \$15,000 in improvements during the coming few years.

Cabins, to provide quarters for the delegates, auditorium and enclosed dining room, are the permanent improvements contemplated. A water system has also been constructed.

The camp is located about 20 miles east of Roseburg on Little River, which is becoming quite famous for its recreational facilities. The league camp is only a short distance above the Boy Scout camp at Wolf creek, and is also above the tract recently applied for as a county park.

The delegates are due to arrive Sunday and Monday, July 7 and 8. Caravans will leave Roseburg at 10:30 a. m. on July 7 and 8. Cars are being furnished by local church members.

The delegates will have their own tents and bedding, but the meals will be cooked in the permanent kitchen and served in the dining hall, a charge of 36 being made for meals during the institute.

J. A. Linn, of Lebanon, is manager of the camp, and will be assisted by a large group of church officers.

The daily program starts with reveille at 6 a. m. and classes from 8:30 to 12:30. Recreation is provided from 2:30 to 5 p. m. The program affords ample facilities for bathing and fishing, while the grounds afford a baseball diamond, volleyball and tennis courts, horse shoe, swings, etc. The evening is to be given over to campfire songs, service, inspiration hour, lectures, songs, etc.

The religious conferences will be in charge of some of the leading church officers of the state.

RELEASE FROM JAIL SOUGHT BY CAPONE

PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—A petition for a writ of error was filed in the municipal court today for the purpose of having "Scarface" Al Capone, Chicago gangster, released from the Holmesburg county jail, where he is serving a one year's sentence for carrying a loaded pistol.

A hearing on the writ will be held Saturday before Judge John E. Walsh, who sentenced Capone and his bodyguard, Frank Kline, as a Chicago gangster. Kline was not included in the attempt to have Capone released.

UMPUQA VALLEY PRODUCTS FIND WIDER MARKET

**Big Chain Grocers Place
Fifty Thousand Dollar
Order With Norton
Canneries.**

**Contract Allows Extension
of Packing Facilities
and Sales Area; More
Money Locally.**

Contracts for approximately \$50,000 worth of the products of the Norton canneries at Roseburg, and Sutherlin have been signed by the MacMarr and S. K. & S. Safeway stores. These two big orders will result in the placing of Umpqua valley canned goods in all of the stores operated by those firms in this district, and also in some of their more distant stores where the goods may be shipped advantageously.

Heretofore the output of the local canneries, while acknowledged to be above the average in quality, has found little sale of the local market, due to the fact that local merchants, buying through jobbers, were not willing to break into their lines.

The two large chain stores, however, operating a group of branch stores in this district, and handling a large output of canned goods, has arranged for delivery of local canned products in large quantities and will market these lines throughout the territory.

Back to Be Extended

The contract, according to Mr. Norton, will be of great aid to the canneries in their operation of this year. The pack is to be extended to include several lines of vegetables heretofore handled on a very small scale, so that the volume of business for the season will be considerably enlarged.

The canners will start operation next week on cherries, and will continue during the greater part of the summer packing vegetables, pears, prunes and apples will also be packed on a larger scale than ever before, particularly pears and prunes, as the local canneries' product is obtaining a wide reputation for quality.

The contracts will also be of considerable importance economically in this locality. Heretofore, in buying products from foreign canneries, the major portion of the money received from the consumer has gone out of the county. This new business deal means that the \$50,000, heretofore going out of the county, will, for the most part, be put back into local circulation.

FAKE SOLICITOR CLAIMS EMPLOYED BY LOCAL FIRMS

Word has been received by the News-Review office that a solicitor is working throughout the county representing himself to be an employee of Roseburg job printing shops. In some manner, it is reported, he has secured samples of work done by local shops, and is soliciting orders. He is equipped with a small, portable stenciling machine with which he prints the cards for such patrons as he is able to secure. It is also understood that he has endeavored to have some of his expenses charged to the firms he claims to represent.

The man is not employed by Roseburg printing firms, and any representations that he may make in that regard are false. The News-Review has only one field representative, Mr. J. R. Griffith, who is fully authorized to transact any business for the News-Review company. Mr. Griffith is the only News-Review solicitor working outside of Roseburg.

DYNAMITE KILLS 4 COOS COUNTY MEN

COQUILLE, Ore., June 26.—A premature explosion of dynamite fatally injured four men near here yesterday as they were clearing a piece of ground of stumps.

Those killed were: Charles Christian, logging contractor; Russell Yeakins, 25; Ralph Thomas, 24; and Floyd Skinner, 36.

Christian was in charge of the group. He had a contract to take out 1,500,000 feet of cedar belonging to the Evans Auto Loading company at their Sandy creek camp.

The men were clearing a turning space for trucks. Details of the explosion were not known today although an investigation was being made.

World Output Of Motor Cars At New Mark

WASHINGTON, June 26.—World automobile production set a new record in 1928.

The department of commerce announced today that the total production last year was 5,203,173 machines, an increase of 1,004,173 over the 1927 figure.

Combined output of the United States and Canada was 4,601,141, an increase of 1,020,761. Decreases were reported for England, Spain and Denmark.

This indicated that the industry is approaching what might be termed a stabilized condition, that is, each year an increasing percentage of production is being absorbed in the form of replacements. United States and Canadian exports alone, totaling 585,498, almost equal the combined production of the balance of the world which numbered 801,988.

The production of passenger cars, trucks and buses in the United States and Canada during 1928, which was the highest ever recorded, amounted to 4,601,141. While this was a gain of 1,020,761 over 1927, the 1928 production was only 95,280 in excess of 1926.

DOUGLAS COUNTY LAMBS BOUGHT FOR EASTERN MARKET

25 Carloads Destined for
Chicago Yards Bring
Aggregate Price
of \$29,000.

The first trainload of lambs ever shipped from Douglas county direct to the Chicago market left here last night. Eleven cars of the trainload were made up in Roseburg, the rest were gathered in the county north and south of Roseburg, a portion of the train being made up at Drain and Oakland, while other cars were loaded at Dillard.

The Chicago buyers bargained for fifty carloads of high grade lambs, but due to the fact that the lambs have been late in maturing this year, due to poor early range and late spring weather, not enough high grade animals could be found to fill the order at this time, although there will be more, suitable for market, later in the season.

Twenty-five carloads composed the train, which represents about \$29,000 to the growers. The lambs averaged slightly over 75 pounds each, and the growers were paid on a basis of 11 cents per pound. There were about 3,600 lambs in the shipment.

Heretofore the bulk of the lambs from the county have been marketed on the coast, and added from a few scattering cars there have never been any large eastern shipment. The trainload sent out last night sets a new record for the lamb industry of the Umpqua valley, and undoubtedly will lead to repeat orders in the future, opening up one of the country's greatest markets to the sheepmen of the county.

Lambs this year are not expected to bring such great returns as last season, which set a complete new record. The animals are not as large, nor do they grade as high as last year, while the number is also considerably less. The price, however, is somewhat stronger, buyers now paying 11 cents per pound as compared with 10 cents last season.

SON OF ALLEGED GRAFTER DIES IN AIRPLANE CRASH

ROOSEVELT FIELD, New York, June 26.—Francis Phillips, 21-year-old son of the late John P. Phillips, reputed to have made millions in graft as head of the so-called Queens sewer pipe ring, was burned to death this afternoon when his plane overturned in landing and caught fire.

Henry Goldsmith, 21, of Freeport, N. Y., whom Phillips had taken up as a passenger, was critically injured and burned in the crash and fire.

The plane had taken off for a short flight when its engine failed about 35 feet from the ground. Phillips apparently attempted to turn the plane to make a landing on the field and it dived into the ground, overturned and burst into flames.

FUNERAL AT MYRTLE POINT

Word has been received here that the funeral services for Charles M. Christian will be held Thursday at 1 p. m. at Myrtle Point, with interment at Wythe the same day.

JAPAN RATIFIES KELLOGG PACT TO BANISH WAR

**Last of 15 Nations to Act
on Treaty; Envoy Quits
for Usurpation of
Ruler's Power.**

**Movement for World Peace
Started Two Years Ago
Nearing Fruition;
U. S. Elated.**

TOKYO, June 26.—In an unusually strained atmosphere the privy council, presided over by the emperor, today finally approved the Kellogg anti-war pact.

The approval was given without reservations but an interpretative declaration was attached regarding the hotly contested phrase, "in the name of their respective peoples" which according to many members of the privy council violated the emperor's constitutional prerogative.

It was understood Count Uchida, who signed the pact in Paris, strongly contended the necessity of attaching either reservation of interpretative declaration but he was overruled.

Count Uchida then resigned from the privy council.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—News of the approval of the Japanese privy council of the Kellogg treaty for the renunciation of war was received in American government circles with a spirit of rejoicing.

Japan is the last of the 15 original signatory powers to ratify the pact and the document will come into full force as soon as the Japanese instrument of ratification is deposited in the archives of the Japanese instrument of ratification state department here as prescribed in the treaty itself.

The pact embraces action, or intended action, by virtually every nation of the world to renounce war as a national policy. Only Argentina and Brazil have not signified their intention to adhere to the pact out of all of the nations which were invited to do so.

Peace Dream Comes True

This new move toward world peace now promises to become an actual fact in a little more than two years after the first suggestion for the renunciation of war was made by Foreign Minister Briand of France in a message sent through the Associated Press to the American people April 6, 1927, on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of the entrance of the United States into the World War.

Frank B. Kellogg, the then secretary of state, foresaw in the suggestion of Briand the beginning of a new era.

FIRE WIPES OUT BUSINESS AREA OF RANDSBURG, CALIF.

RANDBURG, Calif., June 26.—A fire which started in a heap of rubbish in a pool hall here early today destroyed the business section of this mining town and was extinguished only after several buildings in the path of the flames had been dynamited.

The loss was estimated between \$25,000 and \$40,000. No one was injured. The town has a population of about 1,500.

Twenty-two buildings, including both of the town's hotels, were razed. It was believed a firestorm thrown in the rubbish caused the outbreak.

Handicapped by a lack of water, which is at a high premium here, fire fighters were forced to explode several structures as the flames threatened to wipe out the entire town, most of the buildings of which were of wooden construction.

IDAH0 KIDNAPERS THOUGHT MEN WHO ROBBED IOWA BANK

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 26.—Three men sentenced to prison for kidnaping W. B. Kline, lieutenant governor of Idaho, are believed by Iowa officials to be members of a gang which robbed the Gilmore City Exchange bank of \$5,000 May 13, after keeping H. H. Van Alstine, one of the owners, and his family prisoners over night.

H. V. Vickey, state agent, was notified yesterday that the men, giving their names as August Becker, 25, of Sumner, Iowa, Donald Melvin, 21, and Roy Salmon, both of Livermore, Iowa, had been identified by finger-print records taken at Gilmore City.

Officials today were negotiating with Idaho authorities for possible extradition of the men to Iowa to stand trial for bank robbery.
