U. S. GOES 50-50 WITH OREGON FOR SURVEY
SALEM, Ore., June 26.—Secretary of State Hoss was informed today that the federal bureau of mines has allocated \$25,000 to cooperate with the Oregon mining board in making a mineral survey of the state. The Oregon legislature last winter appropriated \$30,000 for the survey, \$25,000 being the net amount available, so the government money is in the nature of a match fund. The total amount of \$55,000 will be expended under federal supervision between June 1, this year, and June 30, 1931.

Professor Submits Winning Plan For Giving Away \$10,000,000

NEW YORK, June 26.—A few weeks ago, through the News-Paper Enterprise association, of which this paper is a member, an announcement was made throughout the country that a New York millionaire wanted to give away \$10,000,000—and that he would pay \$1,000 for the best plan to dispose of it for the benefit of mankind.

One hundred and sixteen thousand persons submitted ideas worthy of consideration. Other thousands of letters were received from cranks and persons seeking charitable donations. Every possible scheme for spending money was advanced, from founding homes for aged seamstresses to financing a plan for the manufacture of garfish traps.

C. Harold Smith, the "carbon king," was responsible for the flood of letters. After making his will, in which he amply provided for relatives and friends, he found he had \$10,000,000 that he didn't know what to do with. He was opposed to ordinary methods of philanthropy, as ultimately harmful.

So he appointed a committee to select a plan for disposing of his surplus fortune and went off to Europe. The committee, composed of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Frederick Coudert, Jr., Emory Buckner, Dr. Alfred Adler, Theodore Dreiser and Dr. S. Perkin Cadman, selected a plan submitted by Henry E. Garrett, assistant professor of psychology at Columbia university. Here it is:

"If Mr. Smith is broadly interested in human welfare, I am sure he could put his wealth to no better account than to use it in an attempt to stem the rising tide of mental illness which bids fair to engulf us in the next few generations. To put the situation briefly:

"1. He could establish the C. Harold Smith Institute for Mental Hygiene, with a staff composed of physicians, psychiatrists, psychologists and social workers, modeled after the splendid Institute for Juvenile Research in Chicago, but on a somewhat broader scale. To such an institute, parents could come for advice and guidance. Truancies, delinquencies and juvenile crimes could be investigated by trained workers. This would inevitably short-circuit much advice and treatment could be saved from charlatans and sent to competent practitioners. Lectures could be trained and sent out, and a general program of education in mental hygiene instituted.

"2. C. Harold Smith lectureships in mental hygiene could be established in our universities. In these courses, men and women might be trained specifically to handle the problems of the unadjusted school child and the college student. The psychiatrists and psychologists appointed to such posts would also look after the mental health of the students and supervise the work of trained assistants.

"3. Most important of all, research into the causes of the neuroses and the insanities could be fostered. About many nervous and mental diseases next to nothing is known. There is a crying need for careful investigation in this field, and he who promotes it will be a benefactor indeed."

NORMAL SCHOOLS DROP CHILDREN'S HOME, CORVALLIS

SALEM, Ore., June 26.—Normal schools voted today to drop the children's farm home near Corvallis as one of the teachers' training centers for the Monmouth normal school. This was on recommendation of President J. S. Landers of the Monmouth normal.

One reason for the recommendation was that the superintendent of the farm home was said to exercise too great freedom in withdrawing inmates of the home from school whenever it is desired to have them work in the fields. Another reason given was that living quarters for the student teachers are not adequate at the farm home.

The action of the board in dropping the farm home was over the protest of Regent J. S. Miller of Albany. Miller admitted that the superintendent of the farm home has not worked in harmony with the normal school, but declared that if the home were dropped the education of its inmates would suffer.

In place of the farm home, the board accepted Greenwood school in Polk county as a training center. The board voted that a diploma from the Monmouth normal be granted William Lee McCaleb of Heppner, who was a student at the school about 20 years ago, and who was prevented from graduation by illness when he almost completed the course. It was said that McCaleb does not wish to teach on the diploma granted today.

The meeting today is probably the last before the board disburses for accreditation into the new state board of higher education.

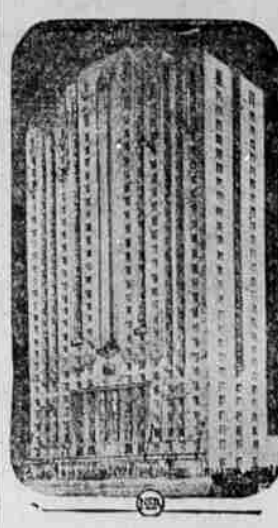

CHANCE VOTED IN TWO EGG CLASSIFICATIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—By a vote of nine to three, members of the dairy exchange have decided to change the grading classification of two of the egg divisions. Fresh extras of mixed colors will be quoted in place of standards, which may or may not be fresh, and fresh medium extras of mixed colors will replace medium firsts.

Members say the substitutions were made in order to improve the standard type of egg traded in on the board by prohibiting the delivery of washed eggs or eggs other than fresh. It is contended that this will raise egg grades to a higher standard than that required by the state law.

Quotations on the new grades will become effective Monday.
