MISSOURI RIVER SWERVES PERILING HOME AND RAILWAY

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, June 26.—More than 40 acres of valuable land owned by William Tyson, north of Council Bluffs, has been washed away within the past month by the Missouri river, which is now less than 25 feet from the Tyson house. The house once stood 300 feet from the stream.

The Illinois Central railroad is fighting to check the river's erosion at this point and save 3,000 feet of roadbed.

Government attempts to halt the river from eating into the bank, by the installation this spring of \$10,000 worth of anchored stone and willow matting, have proved futile, as it has all been torn away.

MISSING HENCHMAN OF CAPONE FOUND SLAIN

CHICAGO, June 26.—Police believe they have found the body of the man who a month ago was kidnapped from a taxi cab at the point of a gun and whose last words were: "Ernie, please don't shoot." The body was found in a strawberry patch near Crete, Ill., last night.

The man had been dead about four weeks. A belt was drawn tight around the neck. There was a deep gash in the back of the head.

The body answered the description of the kidnapped man. The "Ernie," police believe, may be Ernie Rossi, alleged with the Al Capone forces.

NEW X-RAY MAKES OPERATIONS SAFER

LONDON.—A new X-ray machine, which photographs in three dimensions, has been introduced by a London scientist and is said to eliminate most of the uncertainty in operations.

This machine photographs patients' interiors in the "round" as well as length and breadth and will thus enable a physician to know within the fraction of an inch how deep he has to cut.

In the case of a patient lying on his back, to obtain a photograph of his spine it is not necessary to turn him over. A reverse view is obtained by merely pressing a switch.

"We shall use the apparatus a great deal in tuberculosis," says A. T. K. Moir, inventor of the machine. "Where the ordinary ray shows only the dark spots on the lungs, this machine will show the depth of the cavities."

ELKS MAGAZINE CAR ON GOOD WILL TOUR VISITS ROSEBURG

The Elks Magazine Car No. 1 on a good will tour across the United States, arrived in Roseburg this morning at 10:30 o'clock driven by Robert E. Chitt, western manager for the magazine. There are four of these cars which left New York May 19 on a nationwide good will tour in advance of the Elks grand lodge convention to be held in Los Angeles. The cars are new Studebaker President Eight roadsters, brilliantly lacquered in the purple and white colors of the order. Each car took a different route.

Lodges along the route are meeting the representatives and an account of the trip, with pictures taken at each stop, are to be used in the magazine.

A group of local Elks including Edward Kohlhaugen, exalted ruler, Walter Fisher and Dean Bubar, past exalted rulers, Joe Dunn and other officers of the lodge, met the car at Winchester and escorted it to the Elks Temple in this city, where a reception committee was on hand. BISHOP CANNON'S ACCOUNT IN STOCK DEALS DESCRIBED

NEW YORK, June 26.—The trading account of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, was described as speculative in testimony on record today in the bankruptcy hearing of Kable and company.

C. W. Kable, who lent his name to the brokerage concern while he did clerical work for \$25 a week, was examined at length yesterday concerning the relations of the southern churchman with the firm. He was shown photostatic copies of ledger sheets bearing entries of the bishop's deals.

"Don't you see from that account that the stocks were not held and that it was really a speculative account?" he was asked "Yes," replied Kable.

Harry L. Goldburst, who employed Kable, testified Monday that Bishop Cannon bought stocks through his firm on a part payment plan. The bishop recently said in Washington that he had dealings with the company had been part payment stock purchases for investment.

Kable said Goldburst had full charge of Bishop Cannon's account and that he was nothing more than an office boy to the bishop.

He said the bishop kept in close touch with the stock market and once when he made a trip to South America left with Goldburst a list of places where he could be reached.

Both Kable and Goldburst are under federal indictment for fraudulent use of the mails as the result of a raid on their company as a racketeer shortly after a petition in bankruptcy was filed.

Although there was a partnership account, Kable said, it never was enforced and he only signed checks in blank for Goldburst.

HOOVER SIGNS BILL TAKING HUGE AREA FROM N. P. RAILWAY

WASHINGTON, June 26.—A bill removing 2,800,000 acres of national forest land claimed by the Northern Pacific railway from operation under the land grant acts was signed today by President Hoover.

Under the act, the United States retains the title to the lands in question. All unsatisfied indemnity selection rights, if any exist, claimed by the company, together with all claims of additional lands by virtue of grants made to the railroad, are declared forfeited.

The act, however, has no effect upon the present title of the railway to the right-of-way acquired under the grant or lands used for the company in the operation of its roads, or such as lands used for depots, station buildings, work shops, machine shops and for similar purposes.

Under the act the attorney general is directed to institute proceedings to make secure the aim of the legislation which is to reserve a large amount of forest land claimed by the railway to the government on the theory that it can not be used by the railway for the purposes for which it was given.

DIVER HAS THREE AIR BUBBLES AFTER BATTLE FOR LIFE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 26.—Details of a hurried trip to the Coronado islands to render aid to a stricken deep sea diver suffering from "bends," incurred when he was hauled too rapidly to the surface from a 115-foot depth by a crew aboard the San Diego-based submarine V-4, were learned yesterday upon the arrival here of the submarine rescue ship Ortolan.

The endangered man, who now is declared to be practically none the worse for having had three air bubbles in his veins, is George Peck, quartermaster, first class, attached to the V-4.

The pain experienced by Peck during the time he was waiting for the Ortolan's rescue crew to arrive at the V-4 is described as being "terrific," with an air bubble in his forehead, any of one which momentarily might reach a "vital spot" and cause instantaneous death. Peck was in such torture that the touch of a companion's hand on any part of his body caused him to scream with pain.

Peck incurred the "bends" when an attempt was being made to prevent his drowning. While being slowly pulled to the surface on a submerged raft on which he was working under sea, he discovered a slight tear in one arm of his diving suit and gave the distress signal to the crew on board, who hauled him to the surface.

Reinstatement Sought

RIVER FOREST, Ill., June 26.—An Omaha Lutheran church, which was suspended from the Nebraska district for allowing communion to parishioners who belonged to the secret fraternal organizations, will seek reinstatement at the 34th triennial conference of the Evangelical Lutheran synod of Missouri.

Delegates to the conference yesterday revealed the status of the Omaha church—the Immanuel Lutheran—pointing out that while newly converted members are allowed a certain amount of time to sever any secret fraternal affiliations they may have, the Omaha church was found to have granted excessive time to such members.

Organizations included in the banned class are those whose ritual avoids reference to the trinity when speaking of the supreme being and to Jesus Christ in required prayers, and which substitute redemption through moral effort for Christianity, it was explained by Prof. Theodore Grabner of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

NEW YORK, June 26.—The Lutheran churches of the world, which opened their second world convention in Copenhagen today, have a total strength of 81,000,000 members, Rev. G. L. Kleffer, statistician of the National Lutheran council announced. This number is nearly half of all Protestantism, he estimated.

The Lutheran churches of the United States and Canada have 11,855 ministers and 15,587 congregations with 4,234,908 baptized members, 2,802,779 confirmed members, and 2,297,886 communicant members. They have 10,756 Sunday schools with 121,758 officers and teachers and 1,281,675 pupils. The value of congregations' property is \$329,977,011.
