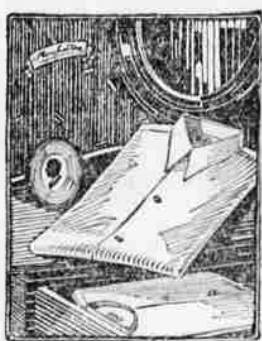
To Return to City—
