

PRUNE BUYERS APPEAR EARLY IN LOCAL FIELD

approval of the proposed pool price. Growers for the most part approved the price for early sale. In their answers to the questionnaire, but indicate that they will sell only enough of their fruit to protect themselves on their actual cost and expense of cultivation and harvesting, and will hold whatever fruit they have left in the belief that higher prices will be realized.

South Douglas Pool Sold
The South Douglas Pool, located at Myrtle Creek, has already contracted for the sale of 500,000 pounds of this year's crop for export. This pool will control from two and a half to three million pounds of prunes, so that the part sold is only a small portion. Due to the policy of the concern, the directors declined to announce the price paid by the purchasers.

Bumper Crop This Year
Douglas county, according to present indications, will have the largest crop of prunes ever harvested in this section of the state. Estimates on the probable tonnage vary greatly, ranging from fifteen to twenty million pounds. County Agent J. C. Leedy, who has endeavored to make a very accurate survey, predicts more than seven million pounds for the county. The estimated yield for the northwest is about sixty million pounds, so that Douglas county will have at least 25 per cent of the prune crop of the northwest. California, this year, it is reported, has not more than a 50 per cent crop, so that Douglas county prunes are going to be in great demand. It is believed by those who are studying the market situation.

Buyers Selling Short
Information has been received that several large exporting companies have already contracted for delivery of export prunes at low prices, which accounts for the early alarm in an effort to buy as cheaply as possible.

Buyers insist that the price will not go higher, at least to any appreciable degree, while growers, on the other hand, are looking for a better schedule than is now being offered. Solicitors so far, according to estimates, have not contracted for more than 10 per cent of the crop.

A good many growers, according to their statements, plan to sell only enough on the early market to cover the expenditures they make in cultivating and harvesting. The rest of the fruit will be held for higher prices.

Tree Are Breaking
The growing situation is very unusual this year. New orchards are bearing exceedingly heavy, while old orchards have a rather light crop. The county is also somewhat affected with regard to the prune yield, certain portions having a very heavy crop, while other sections are lighter. On the

whole, however, the yield, it is expected, will be considerably larger than in any previous season. In many orchards, particularly the younger ones on good soil, the trees are already breaking down under their loads.

County Agent Leedy is recommending spur pruning, which consists of cutting out the fruit spurs on the under side of the branches. The fruit on these spurs usually is small, and by removing them the trees will be lightened to their normal capacity, and bigger sizes will be assured. Many growers have already done this pruning, Mr. Leedy reports.

The huge crop is also going to necessitate the construction of many new driers, and several have already been ordered installed in various parts of the county.

William Hanson of Medford was fined \$25 by Justice of the Peace Hopkins yesterday after he had entered a plea of guilty over the telephone to exceeding the catch limit on Diamond lake. Fred Perry, deputy game warden at the lake, apprehended Hanson with fourteen fish, whereas the limit is five in any one day. Hanson who has been located at the lake for considerable time, entered a plea of guilty over the telephone and paid the amount of the fine, plus the costs of the case.

FOUR AIRPLANES ALOFF FOR NEW WORLD RECORDS

Minneapolis, piloted by Thorwald "Thunder" Johnson and Owen Haugland, early today flew through rain storms which had begun early in the night.

As the plane passed the 53-hour total this morning, officials observing the progress of the flight at Old Chamberlain airport here, reported the single motor appeared to be functioning perfectly.

Haugland and Johnson, it was indicated, decided to take advantage of all precautions against termination of the flight as the opportunity seemed to be the record of 173 hours, 32 minutes and one second, set recently at Fort Worth, Tex.

After last night's refueling, notes were dropped by Haugland and Johnson, each expressing confidence in their craft's performance. Johnson said the Miss Minneapolis was good for 200 hours more in the air. Another note informed the world that they would not be down "until July 4."

Hawks Again on Wing
ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 27.—Captain Frank M. Hawks took off this morning on a round trip flight to Los Angeles, where he expects to stop only long enough to refuel.

He hoped to establish three records, that for the round trip, for east to west and west to east. The non-stop record to the Pacific coast is 24 hours, 51 minutes, established by the late C. B. D. Collyer and Harry Tucker. The west to east record is 18 hours, 21 minutes, established by himself.

The plane carried 550 gallons of gasoline, an earlier plan of carrying 615 gallons being abandoned due to the additional weight making the plane too heavy. Captain Hawks said it would take him three hours to refuel and then would immediately take off again for the return trip. The plane's engine is capable of 185 miles an hour.

Making the flight alone means that he will have to let the plane fly itself fifteen minutes of every hour while he pumps fuel from the main tank in the fuselage up to the wing tanks from which it will feed the motor by gravity.

The takeoff of the plane was perfect and before his departure Captain Hawks was assured of excellent flying weather along the entire route except over Missouri, where thunder showers were reported. This, however, he said would not bother him.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 27.—Capt. Charles Kingsford Smith and his three companions took off in the Southern Cross from Derby, western Australia, today for Singapore, Straits Settlement, enroute

to England. The distance is about 1450 miles over the Indian ocean, Java, and the Java sea.

With Captain Kingsford Smith were C. T. Ulm, pilot; T. H. McWilliams, radio operator, and H. A. Litchfield, navigator.

The Southern Cross left here Tuesday, completing the first lap of its English flight to Derby Wednesday. It was hoped to better Bert Hinkler's record of 15 days.
