ACCUSATION OF CAUSING WAR IS BRANDED "LIE"

"Lie" Proclaimed
German newspapers appeared with borders of heavy black mourning and one Berlin organ, Der Tag, surrounded scenes from Danzig, Posen, Kattowitz and Strauburg with borders of chains. A huge sky sign in the west end of Berlin adjured German citizens to unite in repudiation of the "war guilt lie".

There was a tenseness in the situation which led the government to request that its functionaries, high and low, refrain from joining in the public demonstration. President von Hindenburg himself refused numerous invitations to preside at meetings called to hold the "shameful treaty" up to obloquy.

Chancellor Mueller contributed an article to today's Vossische Zeitung relating his experiences as one of Germany's signatories in the treaty. He said the moments of signing were the most terrible of his life.

A great outdoor demonstration was planned for the Berlin stadium at 7:30 p. m. when the rebekahs will open its doors to a joint manifestation of German patriotic societies. One of these, the Kyffhauser Bund, containing 3,000,000 members and claiming to be the greatest association of ex-servicemen in the world, called upon the government to have the confession of war guilt in article 231 of the treaty eliminated, thereby paving the way for real reconciliation of the peoples.

Churches Participate
Bells tolling at 3 p. m. were the churches' reminders of the day of mourning. This demonstration was eliminated in the Rhineland, where the consistory decided to abandon the church program also after hearing of the Rhineland commission's prohibition. Afterward the Coblenz authorities consented to the church celebrations but it was too late for reinstatement of the program.

There was a double coincidence in the date which was little stressed, it being also the fifteenth anniversary of the assassination of the Austrian Archduke Ferdinand at Sarajevo, the spark which set off the European powder keg and brought on the World war.

SARAJEVO REMEMBERS

SARAJEVO, Yugoslavia, June 28.
Commemorative services today recalled the shots which just fifteen years ago led to the world war. Both those who fired the shots and the two they killed were honored.

Jugoslavians from all sections of the triune kingdom participated in a memorial service at the graves of the two Bosnian students who shot Archduke Ferdinand of Austria and his archduchess, avowedly to free Serbia from an Austrian yoke.

The bodies of the youths and 26 of their fellow conspirators lie in an unmarked stone vault on the outskirts of the city, most of them transferred there after death in Austrian prisons. Jugoslavians regard them as national heroes.

Commemorative services for the Archduke and his wife were arranged for a spot near the bridge over the placid Miljacka river where they were killed.

Plans are being made by the members of the South Methodist church for a basket dinner at the church Monday noon in honor of Bishop Sam R. 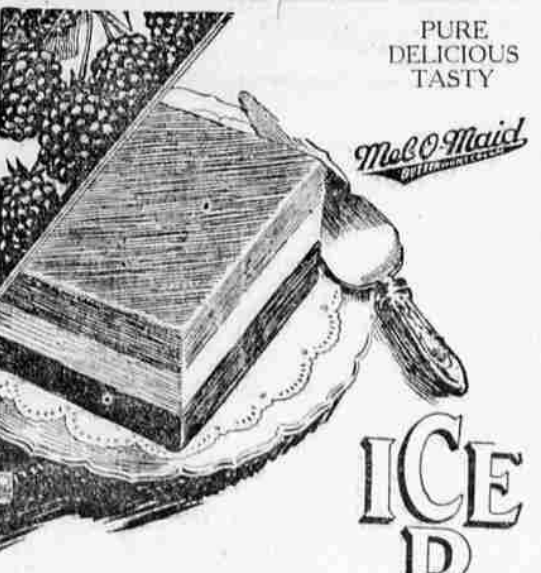
