

SCHMELING WINS FROM UZCUDUN IN 15-ROUND BATTLE

NEW YORK, June 28.—Just before the start of the fifteenth and last round of the slugfest between Max Schmeling and Paulino Uzcudun, Referee Arthur Donovan looked anxiously at the bloody, battered face of the Spaniard and asked:

"Are you all right, can you go on?"

Paulino snarled between brutal and swollen features, shook his head in a vigorous nod and leaped back into the fray, much as a gored bull toward the matador.

Last night, Schmeling, the sharp-shooter of Berlin, was the matador, spearing and wounding the Spaniard. After a slow beginning, with eight of nine mauling monotonous rounds that drew continual derision from a crowd of 45,000 spectators, Schmeling opened a slashing attack that shook the celebrated oak of the Pyrenees, even though it failed to cut him down.

Paulino's head was bloody but unbowled, right up to the final charge, but he was thoroughly beaten nevertheless under the German's cutting uppercuts and jabs.

Schmeling received the unanimous decision of Referee Arthur Donovan and the two judges.

Southern Cross Ends Lap

Hawks on Wing Again
METROPOLITAN AIRPORT
Los Angeles, June 28.—Less than eight hours after establishing a new east-west trans-continental non-stop flight record, Captain Frank Hawks took off today seeking to lower his own mark of 18 hours, 21 minutes, 59 seconds from here to New York.

Hawks clipped five hours, 40 minutes, 28 seconds from the previous mark when he landed his Lockheed monoplane last night, 19 hours, 10 minutes, 32 seconds after he took off. The record had been held by Captain C. B. D. Collyer and Harry Tucker. A series of mishaps which held him here more than seven hours instead of an hour and a half as he planned, made it impossible for him to reach Roosevelt field on the Atlantic seaboard within the thirty-six hour limit he had previously set for himself.

The flier announced before he left that he hoped to reach New York within 14 hours.

A cracked streamline cowling on his plane's stabilizer and a leaky carburetor kept him impatiently waiting for the return flight which he expected would take him across the continental divide for the second time in less than forty hours.

He took off into a heavy coastal fog, which made the airport ceiling only approximately 700 feet, but expressed his intentions of rising above the clouds.

"I'm out for speed," he said. "I'm going to fly high and give her all she's got. My course will be the same as the westward flight."

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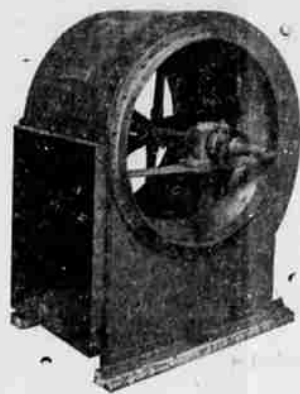
HIT-AND-RUN DRIVER PLEADS LAW IGNORANCE

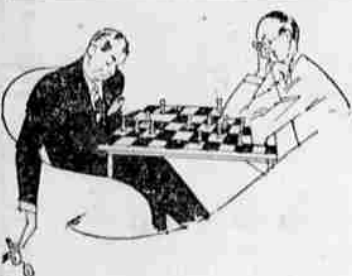
