

Glide Community Objects To Proposed Road Relocation

WANT HIGHWAY TO FOLLOW RIVER BANK ON PRESENT ROUTE

Proposal Has Been Made to Establish New Road in Order to Gain Alignment.

SCENERY IS STRESSED

County Court Also Asked to Make Improvements at Little River Bridge Approach.

GLIDE, June 29.—The Glide community through petitions and resolutions are presenting several important matters before the county court. At the present time there is a petition in circulation remonstrating against the proposed road change between Glide and Lone Rock. It has been suggested that the road be located along the base of the hill instead of following the river, in order to get a perfectly straight road. It is going to be necessary in the near future to replace the present Little River bridge, and when that is done the new bridge will probably be built a short distance downstream from the present location, giving a straight connection with the Glide road. The proposal has now been made that a direct line be followed from Glide to Lone Rock, which the community feels is not necessary. The river is quite beautiful along the road, and as that section is to be a part of the Umpqua highway, it is felt that the road should be kept along the river bank. It is also felt that the expense of securing right of way, some of which would be through valuable orchard, is too great to justify the change.

Want Approach Improved

In connection with the approach of the Little River bridge, the grange, at its last session, introduced and passed the following resolution by unanimous vote:

Whereas, there is a particularly dangerous stretch of road at the south approach of the East Umpqua bridge at Glide, and

Whereas, two of the Glide school buses must make daily round trips over this road during the school year, endangering the lives of the school children at each passage,

Therefore be it resolved by Glide Grange No. 462, in regular session June 22, 1929,

That the county court of Douglas county be requested to take steps to make this stretch of road safe at the earliest possible date.

The grange also adopted the following resolution regarding county fair funds:

Whereas, there was an unusual balance of \$730 remaining from the funds allotted to Douglas county by the state for fair purposes in the year 1928, which reverted to the general road fund, and

Whereas, it was the clear intention of the appropriating law that all moneys so allotted should be used for fair purposes whenever practicable, and

Whereas, there is a demand from several sections of the county for funds to be used in district fairs, and

Whereas, it is the firm belief of the members of this grange that the above mentioned sum will be of far greater benefit to the county as a whole if put to its intended use than if it were left in the general road fund, therefore,

Be it resolved by Glide Grange, No. 462, in regular session June 22, 1929,

That the county court of Douglas county be requested to appropriate from any available fund an amount of \$730 to be used for fair purposes during the year 1929, and

That the said sum be turned over to the county fair board for distribution.

BANFIELD MINE TO START SHIPPING ORE WITHIN MONTH

Daily Output of Seventy-Five Tons Is Planned, According to Statement of Manager.

Will Work 24-Hour Shifts After New Concentration Plant Is Installed at Property.

MYRTLE CREEK, June 29.—Seventy-five tons of raw ore, reduced to approximately 10 tons of concentrates, will be the daily output of the Banfield copper mine within a month from this date when the new concentration plant is in operation 24 hours daily and with a full crew at work in the mine, says W. F. Henderson, manager of the property, who was in Canyonville and Riddle Tuesday, looking after the unloading and moving of equipment from railroad to mining property.

Mr. Henderson says it is the company's plan to increase capacity of the concentration plant later on, and to install the flotation process. A road grader also is being added to the equipment. A 45-horse power diesel engine arrived at Riddle early this week. This, Mr. Henderson says, will provide power required at the start, but later the power plant will be built up to 100-horse power.

The Banfield Mining company, as now organized, and F. J. and W. F. Henderson, father and son, of Spokane, as principal stockholders, has been in possession of the Banfield property about three years. During that time a great deal of preliminary work has been done, including erection of a mill building. About a year ago a car of ore was mined and hauled to the railroad as an experiment, but on account of the long haul it required the concentration plant to make the project practical and profitable.

Besides multiplying the value of copper the concentration process will recover the gold and silver values which are too small in the raw ore to be taken into account by the smelter company, but when concentrated will add an appreciable percentage to return. A ton of ore of concentration, Mr. Henderson estimates, will represent a value of \$3500 to \$4000.

Because of rough country surrounding the mine location it is necessary to haul the ore or concentrate out to drive, a distance of between four and five miles, on a trailer drawn by a caterpillar tractor. Hauling by truck from Riddle to Riddle will quite probably be done by contract. All told, the company expects to employ a crew of about 15 men when work is in full swing.
