Six permits for residential construction have been granted during the first half of 1929, aggregating \$17,500. None of the permits are for large amounts but indicate the trend activities are taking. With the exception of two of the residences, the owners are erecting the structures for the purpose of renting them. Those already built were rented immediately. A. S. Coen constructed such a building on Jackson and Roberts street. Mrs. A. Denton is building a duplex house in Laurelwood. Fred Bowen erected a residence on East boulevard street and M. E. Ritter has just started a house on Oak street.

Of the two residences to be occupied by the owners, one is being built by Chester Morgan in Laurelwood and the other by Harris Ellisworth, who is rebuilding a house recently purchased on Winchester street.
