

ENTIRE COUNTY IS RESPONDING TO CLEANUP PROGRAM

**Maurice Newland, Back
From Trip, Says Other
Towns Are Show-
ing Interest.**

**Editors of County Papers to
Give Publicity, While
Merchants Promise
to Paint Fronts.**

The aim of the city and county clean up and paint up campaign is to enable the people to direct tourists anywhere in the valley and have them admire the beauty and thriftiness that may be found in Roseburg. Chamber of Commerce is spending hundreds of dollars preparing literature on the Umpqua valley, which is to be sent over all the nation and distributed to tourists and information seekers.

In order to get the most good from this investment in literature the valley must be greatly improved as to the looks of its business houses, homes and farms. A great amount of literature is being distributed from the Los Angeles branch of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, at \$5 per cent of the out-of-state cars are said to come from California. These people are accustomed to seeing well-kept places, and it behooves Umpqua valley to be as presentable as possible.

After visiting Elkton, Drain, Yoncalla, Oakland and Sutherlin late last week Maurice Newland reports that the editors and business men he contacted are very much interested in the clean up and paint up campaign for the county, and in every instance belief was expressed that those places would cooperate in the movement.

Orville Beckley and Hoover Brown of Elkton stated that in order to get things done a start must be made and that merchants would be benefited by the improved appearance of their places. H. R. Young, editor of the Drain Enterprise, said he could see much good to come from the movement for all parts of the county. Frank Hollwell of Boswell Springs said no place could thrive unless it was advertised, and that Umpqua valley certainly needed advertising.

Clyde S. Shaw, editor of the Oakland Tribune, says he once lived in California and that the people there feel it is well worth while to spend thousands of dollars in making it beautiful. In places trees have been planted and are kept up by huge water trucks hauling water to get them to grow and beautify the highway. California is perhaps the most advertised state in the United States and believes in making an impression on tourists. Oregon's possibilities aren't even touched. In fact, the natural beauty does not need a great deal of enhancement.

It needs preservation. Homes and establishments should not mar the beauty of the valley. W. J. Hayner, editor of the Sutherlin Sun, thinks the movement highly commendable. Sutherlin has in the past conducted such a campaign, and he believes that the people will undoubtedly get behind the movement and help make the Umpqua valley literature and other advertising count.

It is the hope of these people that leaning buildings will be straightened up and brightened with a coat of paint, that useless shacks will be removed, that fences will be repaired and made to look clean and serviceable, that flowers and lawns will be planted where possible around homes, that barnyards will be cleaned up and sheds built to house machinery. In short, that an atmosphere of thriftiness will prevail.

Beautification work cannot be forced by law. It is not the purpose of the campaign to force cooperation, but to look for it and to get people to look at places through the eyes of tourists. It is hoped to stimulate competition in satisfying a natural longing for improvement in achieving safety, beauty and cleanliness.

POMONA GRANGE SETS DATE FOR ANNUAL PICNIC

The Douglas County Pomona Grange held a well-attended meeting last Saturday at Wigwam Tavern, nearly every Grange in the county being represented. Reports from the subcommittees showed that all were in good financial condition and making gains in membership, although this is the busy season on the farms. Two resolutions were adopted, one from Glisde Grange urging the county committee to appropriate from any available fund the \$230 returned from the fair fund last year and placed in the general fund. The other resolution was in endorsing the stand of the recent state Grange in instructing the executive committee of the State Grange to place an injunction on the salary of John H. Carlin as a member of the new State Tax commission provided the State Grange officers believed Mr. Carlin was serving illegally and after legal advice had been secured. Twenty candidates were given the fifth degree, and Friday, July 26, was set for the joint picnic be-

tween the Grangers of the county and the Roseburg Kiwanis club. The lecturer of the Pomona, Dr. C. H. Bailey, will have charge of the program, which will consist of musical numbers from South Deer Creek, Glisde, Melrose and Evergreen Granges, and readings or recitations from Rescue, Riddle, Myrtle Creek, Oakland, Coles Valley and Drain Granges. One speaker, to make the main address of the day, will be secured.

After dinner, served in the beautiful oak grove surrounding the Wigwam, Dr. C. H. Bailey, the lecturer, presented the following program: South Deer Creek Grange, violin selections by Miss Helen and Ivan Branton, accompanied by Miss Josephine Cachelin at the piano; Mrs. Myrtle Creek Grange, readings, Mrs. Alice Dyer and Mrs. E. Endicott; Glisde Grange, vocal solo, Mrs. Francis Wilson, accompanied by Miss Paula Wilson, and recitation by Miss Florence Everts; Melrose Grange, readings, Miss Elsie Busenbark and Miss Katherine Busenbark; Riddle Grange, recitation, Miss Melba Wilson. The main address of the day was made by L. R. Brethaupt, of the Oregon Agricultural Extension service, who spoke on the value of market reports to producers and the necessity for organized marketing to combat the menace of corporation farming. The meeting place of the Pomona, which will be held August 31, was left to the executive committee to decide not later than August 1.

LONDON JOYOUS AS KING, LONG SICK, RIDES IN PUBLIC

LONDON, July 1.—King George, his face shining with happiness and radiant health, came home to Buckingham palace at noon today to the acclaim of one of the greatest popular demonstrations of his reign.

Leaving Windsor castle, the royal pair rode between throngs of applauding thousands who cheered them to the echo.

His majesty appeared thin in the face but looked well. The number of Americans among the crowds was a notable feature of the great celebration. They were largely in evidence in the throngs which lined the pavements, while particularly numerous groups of them were noted in front of Buckingham palace. Their keen interest in the king's reappearance on his restoration to the throne was evident as they appeared generally as eager as the British demonstrators to join in cheering the king's homecoming.

So thick were the throngs along some parts of the route that many people were overcome.

JAPAN'S CABINET FORCED TO RESIGN

TOKYO, July 1.—The Japanese government will fall probably tomorrow with resignation of Premier Baron Tanaka and his cabinet. The action was decided upon this morning at an urgently summoned cabinet meeting after a crisis precipitated by handling of the Kellogg anti-war pact and the investigation of the assassination of Marshal Chang Tso-Lin at Mukden last year.

It was believed Yugo Hamaguchi, leader of the Minseito or opposition liberal party and home minister in the 1925 government, would be requested by Emperor Hirohito to form a cabinet with Baron Kijuro Shidehara—Japanese ambassador at Washington in 1922—as foreign minister.

The cabinet crisis is the outgrowth of the assassination of Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, defeated northern China war lord, last year at Mukden while in territory over which Japan acted as protector. Investigation of the assassination absolved Japanese military officers of blame, it was understood, but punishment was insisted upon for certain officers for failure to notify the home office of withdrawal of their supervision on the night of Chang's arrival.

The minister of war, General Hoshino, Shirakawa, protested that he was understood to have maintained an intransigent attitude which precluded further cooperation with either him or any other officer of the army, which backed him.

Vivid and thrilling stories were told by the missionaries of the miracle-working power of God in heathen lands and of the disasters which are being visited upon various parts of the earth in famines, earthquakes and pestilences.

Resolutions were adopted by the congregation expressing appreciation to the chamber of commerce for their courtesies and liberalities, also to the newspaper for the space given in announcing meetings from day to day. The grounds are silent tonight as all the campers have left. Inasmuch as the general conference of Seventh-day Adventists will be held in San Francisco next May, it is planned not to have an annual camp meeting in the conference next year.

Some poor fielding and loose playing did not give Nelson the support he should have had. He was relieved in the 5th inning by Roberts who had 8 strikeouts to his credit. Paige for Glendale started out with a 2 base hit on which he scored. Then McGee for Canyonville made a base hit and so did Angst, bringing McGee home. J. Over-Governed Australia Desires More States

Leads World in Ruling Bodies of Population, Basis and Would Increase Them.

SYDNEY, July 1.—(A. P.)—Australia is the world's most-governed country. But notwithstanding that it already has more parliaments and governors in proportion to its population than any other country in the world, agitators backed by no influential person, as Dr. Earle Page, federal treasurer and leader of the country party section of the coalition government of the commonwealth, spring up from time to time in different parts of the country, having for their object the creation of yet more states, together with state parliaments.

There are at present six states in Australia irrespective of territory. Each state has its own parliament, the members of which are highly paid, and in each state there also is a highly paid governor—the direct representative of the king, invariably sent out from England and generally either a knight or a peer.

Besides all these, there is a federal parliament and a governor general, also sent out from England. All these legislative bodies—seven parliaments, six governors and one government general, are deemed necessary to look after the affairs of 6,000,000 people. The expense, of course, is that Australia, having an area as great as that of the United States, is too vast to be controlled by a smaller number of legislatures, and that is the argument used in agitating for yet more.

School Board Bans Stir Teacher's Union

Federation Will Hear Protests on Skirts, Cigarettes, Bridge, Dancing and Curfew.

CHICAGO, July 1.—(A. P.)—The right of school boards to prescribe a curfew for teachers, determine the length of their skirts, ban cigarettes, bridge and dancing, will be argued lustily at the convention of the American Federation of Teachers in Chicago July 16. Delegates likewise will attack the policy of school trustees to separate women from the payroll when they acquire a wedding ring. "It certainly is a joke that women employed in the very profession that seeks to dispel ignorance, prejudice and raise life's standards should need emancipating," observed Mrs. Florence Curtis, national executive secretary, "but they certainly do."

"Chambers of Commerce don't prattle that marriage lessens the civil stenographer's proficiency when it's Mrs. instead of Miss. Why then the attitude that matrimony decreases a woman's value as a teacher?"

Many of this year's resolutions will deal with the principles of "academic freedom," an outgrowth of the query, "Are teachers people?" propounded by the federation. These resolutions will tell the world and school boards that a teacher ought to be permitted to stay up as late as she likes, write fan letters to movie heroes, wear unfashioned gaudies and get married if she wants to.

Mrs. Hanson said it is expected that the Brookwood Labor college of Kendon, N. Y., which was denounced by the American Federation of Labor as a radical school for spreading communist propaganda, will be discussed. Teachers at the Brookwood college are members of the teachers' federation, and the federation is a member of the American Federation of Labor.
