per cent of the public and private income was spent for education, while crime costs accounted for nearly nine per cent. The more spent on education, he said, meant that much less expended to detect, apprehend and punish criminals. William F. Hassell, dean of Teachers' college, Columbia university, New York, declared that the United States would find itself in "danger of bureaucracy shaping the education of its children if it yields to the pressure being made to bring about federal control of schools." He said physical equipment and financial aid should be provided by federal and state educational authorities.

who were the gods of the republic party last year and who made the republican fight in the great agricultural district, and who won the doubtful farm states for the president, now favored the debenture because they said the promises they then made experts of the agriculture delusions of their printed speeches, could only thus be redeemed. "It is equally notable that every senator from the great farming states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa, Oklahoma and Montana was earnestly and enthusiastically for the debenture.

"It is equally notable that the experts of the agriculture department to whom the president referred the agricultural committee of the senate, by their testimony persuaded the committee of the feasibility of the plan. "The house, however, could not be persuaded, and the bill finally was passed with substantial unanimity in its original form. None objected to these provisions. We sought in the senate merely to provide an additional optional remedy."

BOSTON, June 25.—The Commercial Bulletin says today: "There has been rather more business in fine wools this week, especially of the 12 months Texas type at around 90 cents, clean basis. Medium wools are less active with prices barely steady. In the west buying is moderate with a tendency for growers to make consignments.

"In the manufacturing end of the market, worsteds have the call, although new business is not being placed in a large way.

"Foreign markets are generally quiet and barely firm, except that Japan paid good prices for wools in Brisbane this week.

"Mohair is rather quiet with steady rates."

ed at 31 to 32c. The outlook is that watermelons will be cheaper and more plentiful than in many years. Strawberries were also lower because of their rapid ripening. The best brought \$1.35 Monday. Loganberries are arriving at \$2 a crate. Red currants are selling at 12c.

Tomatoes were down to 33.75 to \$4. Green peas are swamping the market at 3 cents a pound. Beans were abundant at 8 and 10 cents. Cantaloupes are still high and will remain so until after the fourth. Lemons were scarce than ever with another increase promised before the fourth.

WHAT A JOY FLAVOR BRINGS

Foods can be bland, tasteless and unappetizing, or they can be so good that everyone at the table, both children and adults, will be tempted to eat enough of them. Add a little sugar to the vegetables while they are cooking.

Try these Glazed Onions recommended by one of the experts. Peel enough medium-size silver-skin onions to make a quart. Prick onions through centers to prevent breaking while cooking. Place in boiling salted water to which a tablespoon of sugar per quart has been added. Simmer until tender and brown. Melt two tablespoons of butter in a pan. Add a dash of granulated sugar. Cook to the bubbling stage. Add the onions and stir until well glazed.

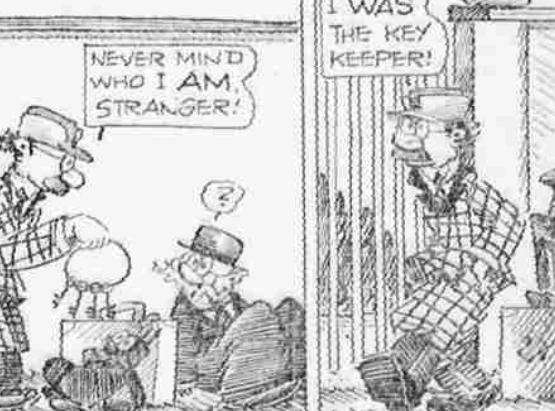
