Here Yesterday—William Weekly, a logging operator of Marshfield and Edmund Weekly of Bridge were business visitors here yesterday.

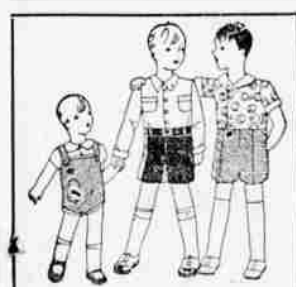

MAYOR REFUSES GIVE APPROVAL PAY WARRANTS

(Continued from page 1)

opinion from legal advice that I have secured that the courts will sustain my contention regarding this matter.

At the first meeting in June this year there was a big—supposed to be—surprise, that Geo. Frew was not or had not ever held the position of street commissioner. If this be the case why did you gentlemen of the city council not come out with the truth in the beginning and consent to the appointment of a street commissioner and not delay the proposition until your confirmed city attorney furnished you with a written opinion that, Mr. Frew could not hold his job, nor bring action against the city of Roseburg for services or labor performed for the city.

Resignation Requested
On the 19th day of April, 1929, Mr. Geo. Frew was given official notice to stop serving the city further as street commissioner, a copy of which is herein incorporated.

"To Geo. Frew, Roseburg, Ore.: Your term of office as street commissioner of the city of Roseburg Douglas county, Oregon, having expired on the first Monday in January, 1929, and you not having been re-appointed to that position by the present executive department of the city, you are hereby notified and requested to deliver to the executive department of the city of Roseburg, Oregon, all keys now held by you to city property and all equipment belonging to the said city which you now have in your possession and claim to exercise control over.

"You are further notified that the city of Roseburg, Oregon, and the executive department thereof will not be responsible to you for any salary or wages which you might claim for work or labor performed or services rendered to the city after this date.

"Dated at Roseburg, Oregon, this 19th day of April, 1929.

"E. V. Hoover, Mayor of the City of Roseburg." Gentlemen, you did not take of official notice or action upon this discharge of Frew, but kept him on the job and passed a resolution over my veto that he be paid back salary and kept on his job at a salary of \$125.00 per month. Why not let this order stand and get together on matters of much more importance to the citizens and taxpayers than to continue along the previous cycles of a pettyfogging system of doing business for the city of Roseburg?

The returning of warrant No. 10145 on city treasurer, amount \$15.00, H. Worthington, without my signature, is for the reason that the city attorney has held that Mr. Worthington is not a duly qualified officer of the city and is not the electrical inspector, his term of office having expired on the first of the year. I appointed W. R. Brown of the Willard Battery Station, who is a de facto officer to fill said position, and two months ago I instructed the city recorder of that fact. Mr. Brown has been at all times ready and willing to serve in said capacity and would have performed the duties of the office.

The turning back to the recorder warrant No. 10151 in the name of Miss Agnes Pitchford, has been a most lamentable duty for me to perform as mayor for the city of Roseburg. I favor strict enforcement of the moral, turpitude and

proper raising of the coming generation which is the basis for future preservation of morality and civic government. Miss Pitchford is an ideal matron and juvenile officer, in fact indispensable. My reason for not signing the warrant was that at this time she is a juvenile officer and matron for the county of Douglas and has her quarters at the courthouse in Douglas county. It seems like a small thing to quibble over such a small matter when so much good is accomplished. However, if the county of Douglas is not paying Miss Pitchford a sufficient salary that she may carry on the duties of the office I would suggest that the proposition be taken up with the county court and the incorporated towns of the county and advise that her salary be raised \$50 per month more than what she is now receiving and that the city of Roseburg pay its pro rata.

Appointment Not Regular
The council also heard an opinion prepared by City Attorney E. B. Eidle, in which it was declared that the appointment of Miss Agnes Pitchford as police matron was not regular. Mayor Hoover, when he took over the office as chief executive, abolished the position of juvenile officer. By a resolution recently adopted the council employed Miss Pitchford as police matron, making her a member of the police force.

Attorney Eidle, in his opinion, held that the council has no right to make such an appointment, as police officers can be named only by the mayor, subject to the council's approval.

No action was taken in connection with this matter.

Sign Causes Fight
A very heated argument occurred regarding the sign recently erected by the Lions club at the triangular parking in North Roseburg. This sign, which is placed where it will command attention of tourists passing along the highway, calls attention to the recreational advantages of the North Umpqua.

C. G. Ambrose, barber in the Creason building, and Mrs. H. J. Bonn, who operates the grocery store in the same building, objected to the present location of the sign, claiming that it shuts off a view of their places of business and is causing them a loss of trade.

Laverne Hawn, speaking on behalf of the Lions club, stated that he does not believe that the location of the sign in any way obstructs the view of the building, and called attention of the council to the fact that the sign is of great benefit in attracting attention of the tourists. Hawn stated, so that the tourists will see the virtues of the North Umpqua proclaimed from the time he enters the county until he leaves.

The matter was referred to the council as a whole, and a trip of inspection will be made Wednesday, July 10, to decide whether or not the sign should be moved.

A petition was received from Mrs. C. E. Fowler, asking for the removal of three garages on East Third street north, claiming that the buildings are unsightly. Mrs. Fowler states that she desires to improve her property, but that it is useless to do so as long as the garages are located as at present. The Fowlers are using one of the garages but are willing to remove the removal of the other two. An objection was received to the creation of a street in Haskell addition.

The action of the street committee in laying Second avenue south and Harvard avenue was ratified. A resolution was adopted authorizing the purchase of an asphalt mixer at a cost not to exceed \$2,000, and the street committee was also directed to purchase the necessary supplies and materials for repair work.
