WALTER WELKER IS WINNER OF FINE RADIO SET

Walter Welker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ora Welker of South Pine street in this city, was notified today that he has been selected from several hundred contestants in Oregon as the winner of an electric radio set, a prize recently offered by the Grigsby-Grumow company, manufacturers of Majestic radios. The prize was offered for the best musical program in a home, accompanied by an essay on music appreciation. A prize of one of the new model 181 Majestic radio sets was offered to the winner in each state.

GREATER CAUTION DRIVING PROGRAM

As a contribution towards greater safety and more pleasant driving conditions on the highways of the country this summer, the Ford Motor company has listed twelve rules as suggestions to motorists and has distributed them to dealers over the country.

Announcement of the suggestions was made today by C. A. Lockwood, Ford dealer in this city, who will display the list prominently in his place of business.

"These rules," said Mr. Lockwood, are merely common sense as applied to automobile driving. Every experienced motorist knows all of them. It is our hope, however, that by stating them concisely and posting them where they will come to the attention of a great many motorists we can make a real contribution towards greater highway safety.

The twelve rules are:

- 1—Courtesy comes first. Consider the rights and privileges of others.
- 2—Keep your mind on your driving, and anticipate sudden emergencies.
- 3—Learn the "feel" of having your car under control.
- 4—Obey all traffic and parking regulations.
- 5—Keep to the right, and comply with road markings and signs.
- 6—Signal for stops and turns—watch the car ahead.
- 7—Slow down at crossings, schools, dangerous places.
- 8—Never pass cars on hills, curves, crossings.
- 9—Adapt your driving to road conditions—rain, ice, soft spots and ruts.
- 10—It doesn't pay to take the "right of way" too seriously.
- 11—When you drive, remember the times when you're a pedestrian.
- 12—Know the law. It was passed for your protection.

"It is estimated that 25,000,000 persons will tour on American highways this summer," Mr. Lockwood continued. "Recognition of the rights of others will be essential. Many unpleasantities and accidents will be avoided if motorists, at times of close situations, will recall these rules and act accordingly."

Ohioans Still on Wing
CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 2.—Better flying weather than has been granted the endurance pilots, Irvan K. Newcomb and Roy L. Mitchell since they set out last Friday to break the world's record for sustained flight was forecast for the next 24 hours today as they passed the half way mark in the attempt.

They have almost three days to go to break the recognized mark of 175 hours, 32 minutes and one second.

With improved flying conditions, the spirits of the pilots rose, and in their notes they expressed confidence they will be able to remain aloft "for a long, long time."

Crash Blame Theory
ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., July 2.—The act of two passengers in bracing their feet against a rudder bar was blamed today for the fall of an airplane in which they and Wilmer Stultz, trans-Atlantic pilot, were killed.

With Edward Harwood and Pasquale Castelleto as passengers, Stultz, pilot of Miss Amelia Earhart's plane "Friendship," on his flight to Wales last summer, was stunting over Long Island yesterday when the plane fell. The passengers were killed instantly. Stultz died shortly after.

Investigators found the left shoes jammed under the rudder bar in the cockpit where the passengers were riding. This they said indicated that the controls of the dual control plane might have been "frozen" while Stultz was putting the machine through a series of stunts.

Reinhart Seeks Fame
SALEM, Ore., July 2.—R. B. (Okey) Reinhart, who with L. W. Mendell took off at Los Angeles Tuesday morning in an effort to lower the world endurance flight record, was connected with the state traffic department for several years, resigning last fall with the rating of sergeant. He learned to fly here and left for Texas to join his brother who is interested in an aviation transport company. Mrs. Reinhart arrived a few days ago from the south and is spending the summer with her mother here.

Pacific Hop Planned
SEATTLE, Wash., July 2.—The Seattle aerile of the Fraternal order of Eagles announced plans for a flight in August from Tokyo, across 4,500 miles of the Pacific ocean to Seattle. A monoplane, piloted by J. J. Smith and John R. Allen, World war aviators, will be used.

of the south for one thing—they were so barbaric they drove my parents to the north. If it hadn't been for that I wouldn't be in Congress today.

"I've been Jim Crowed, segregated, persecuted, and I think I know how best the negro can put a stop to being imposed upon. It is through the ballot, through organization, through fighting eternally for his rights."

De Priest's reference to "driving his parents to the north" brought back to his childhood in northern Alabama. There he witnessed the lynching of three negroes near his home, and after that his parents moved to Kansas and later to Chicago.

While the 2,000 persons in the hall where the congressman spoke cheered him loudly and long, another 1,000 stood outside, unable to gain admittance.

FORMER MISSIONARY TO SPETAK CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Miss Charlotte Hoff will speak Wednesday night at the First Christian church. Miss Hoff was for a number of years a missionary under the direction of the China Inland Mission. At the outbreak of the World war she was doing missionary work in Russia. She was accused of being a German spy, taken prisoner and sent to Siberia. She was kept in Siberia for eight years. She has a very interesting message of her experiences. Quite a crowd is expected to hear her tomorrow night, as some of the other churches are calling off their prayer meetings to attend. The public is most cordially invited to hear her.

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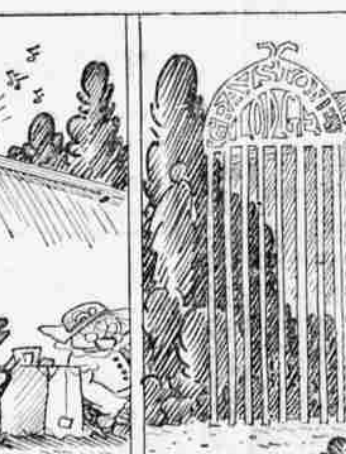
