SCHOONER STICKS ON SAND BAR OFF POINT ARGUELLO

SAN PEDRO, Calif., July 3.—Aground and helpless, the lumber schooner Annie Hanity was stuck on a sand bar off Point Arguello early today, awaiting the arrival of the coast guard Algonquin, which left the harbor here last night on a rescue mission. It was not believed the vessel was in immediate danger.
Standing by the stricken vessel was the General Petroleum tanker Los Alamos, ready to remove the crew to break up in the heavy seas. The vessel went aground in a heavy fog, which resulted in the collision of the Standard Oil tanker District of Columbia and the Dimon line freighter Pacific Oak, near the same point. S. P. WILL SPEND \$750,000 IN EUGENE AND SPRINGFIELD
