Atmosphere of Dixieland Made Real and Poignant in New All-Talking Film

"Hearts in Dixie," Reproduces Settings for Which the Section Is Noted—Favorite Old Tunes Are Played and Sung in Talkie at Antlers Thurs., Fri., Sat.

A love down the Mississippi. Everybody waiting for the Nelly Bly to dock. A few straggling passengers preparing to go aboard. High-stepping, full-blooded horses, hooded and blanketed, about to go on a trip. Cargo of all sorts lying around—crates of chickens, furniture.

Excited spectators on hand to see the sights and perhaps welcome new arrivals. Strains of "Ezekiel Saw de Wheel" with the voices blending in the sweetest harmony.
