**Reinhart Still Going**  
**CULVER CITY, Calif.**, July 3.—Gasoline lowered to their biplane "Angelo" in five gallon cans enabled L. W. Mendell and R. R. Reinhart to continue their attempt to better the refueling endurance record here this morning.

Fog had delayed a refueling contact and when the fliers dropped a message saying they were nearly out of gas the refueling plane refused to start. An emergency plane was used and three five-gallon cans of gasoline were lowered to the Angelo with a rope. This carried the biplane on until 7:20 a. m. when the bulky refueling ship was started and 50 additional gallons were given the Angelo.

Mendell and Reinhart had completed 48 hours in the air, having taken off here yesterday at 7:20 a. m., seeking to exceed the 172 hours record established by Reginald Robbins and James Kelly in the "Fort Worth".

**Chicago to Berlin**  
**CHICAGO, July 3.**—The Chicago Tribune amphibian, "Curtin Bowler," lifted its wings from the waters of Lake Michigan at 8:48 a. m. today and sailed northward on the first leg of a flight to Berlin. Its first stop was scheduled at Milwaukee.

Aboard the craft as it started its air journey across the northwestern states to Europe were two pilots, Robert H. Gast of Kentucky and Parker Cramer of Clarion, Pa., and Robert Wood, aviation editor of the Tribune.

Today's objective was Great White, 1,000 miles north in the Hudson Bay country, or Rupert House, 200 miles nearer, if the first goal proves too great a jump for the day.

**Zeppelin to Tour World**  
**BERLIN, July 3.**—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible Graf Zeppelin, said here today that when the big airship takes off for America, probably on August 10, the voyage would be regarded as the first lap of a flight around the world.

Preparations have been made for landings at Lakehurst, N. J., in California and in Tokyo.

**Anzacs Forced Down**  
**ALLAHABAD, British India**, July 3.—The airplane Southern Cross, with Captain Charles Kingsford Smith and three companions aboard, was forced to land here today when a magneto failed. They hoped to be able to proceed tonight on their Sydney, N. S. W., to London flight.

The aviators left Calcutta for Karachi this morning, a distance of about 1,300 miles, of which they have still about 900 miles to go.

**CAPTAIN OF LOST SHIP LAUREL FACES TRIAL**

**PORTLAND, Ore.**, July 2.—Captain Louis Johnson, master of the ill-fated steamship Laurel which went aground on Peacock Spit, near the mouth of the Columbia river, two weeks ago, pleaded not guilty to a charge of negligence when he went to trial before Federal steamboat inspectors today.

Inspectors Edhofer and Wynn charged that Johnson went to sea with a steering gear out of commission in the face of a southwest wind and a strong ebbing tide.

A decision in the case will not be reached for a week, the inspectors said.

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
