Mount Hermon Suffers
Fire which had destroyed about 60 houses and 16,000 acres of grass, brush and timber in the Santa Cruz mountains was held in check yesterday by 600 men. Estimated loss ran as high as \$500,000.

The blaze, which threatened to sweep Mount Hermon, in the Santa Cruz mountain district, was extinguished through the efforts of 1,000 men. Eight houses in Mount Hermon were destroyed. Several ranch homes also were reported to have been burned in the Alma district near Holy City.

A new fire broke out yesterday near Kaiser station, Fresno county. It was curbed after it had covered about 200 acres.

\$20,000 Loss at Kalama
LONGVIEW, Wash., July 5.—Seven homes burned at Kalama, Wash., near here, yesterday entailing a loss of \$20,000. The flames, fanned by a high wind, quickly spread to nearby dwellings as it started in the first one of a row. The origin is undetermined.
Klamath Mill Burned
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 5.—The Klamath Pine Lumber company's plant was destroyed last night, entailing a loss of \$100,000 when fire of undetermined origin swept the plant.
