ORONITE CLEANING FLUID
CHEMISTS CLASSIFY STAINS,
REMOVAL METHODS

WHITE SAUCES—Cream Soups and Gravy.

These spots consist of milk, and butter, thickened with flour. The starch and gluten of the flour make spots of this kind particularly difficult to remove.

If the material is washable, soap and water is generally sufficient. If not washable, sponge carefully with hot water. When dry, place stained material face down on an absorbent pad and apply cleaning fluid to the reverse side, rubbing gently. In this manner the foreign substances are washed from the fibers without having to pass through the material.

CASTLE GREASE AND WAX.

Scrape off as much as possible with dull or blunt knife. Place white blotter under spot and apply a hot iron, changing blotter frequently. Should any trace of stain remain, sponge carefully with cleaning fluid and rub until dry.

IRONING.
If material is washable, soap and water will remove fresh stains. Unwashable materials may be sponged with wood or denatured alcohol.

If material is washable, first try sponging lightly with water.

GRASS, Fresh Green Potatoes.

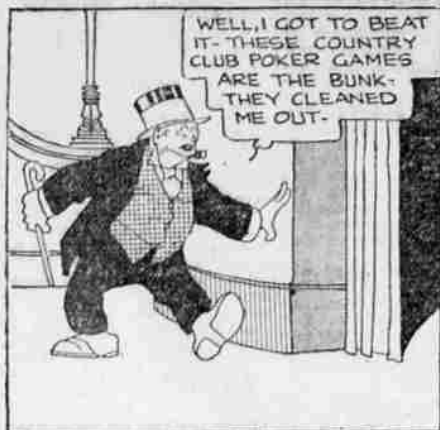
These stains are due to chlorophyll, the coloring matter present in green plants. If material is washable use hot water and soap, rubbing the stain vigorously. Re-washing traces may be bleached and rinsed out. If the material is not washable, sponge with cleaning fluid, sponge with cleaning fluid.

CHEMISTS' REMEDY.
Oronite cleaning fluid removes clothing stains from all fabrics, cloths, linens, etc. If spot has been marked on handkerchief, apply a small amount of cleaning fluid directly to the spot, allowing it to remain. Lift with a knife and remove remainder trace with a clean, dry cloth.

CANDY.
If material is washable, ordinary laundering is sufficient. If not washable, sponge carefully with wood or denatured alcohol.

GENEROUS DIET AIDS
IN RHEUMATIC CASES

Dr. Copeland Points Out That Restricted Feeding Often Leads to Anemia and Aggravation of "Arthritis Deformans" Condition.

INFLAMMATION of a joint is known as arthritis. There are several types of the disease. I want to speak particularly about "arthritis deformans." This is sometimes called "rheumatoid arthritis."

In this disease there is deformity and crippling of the joints. The fingers are twisted out of shape and other joints of the body may be stiff and deformed.

In general I am not much impressed by heredity as a factor in disease. The fact is, I don't want to believe that heredity is a matter of tremendous importance. My soul rebels against a man being crippled or fettered because his father was. It must be admitted, however, that this form of arthritis appears to run in families.

As we become more familiar with the chemistry of the body it is very likely we will know a lot more about the causes of disease than we do today. We will know why it is that there must be maintained in the body what we may call the chemical balance. The lime and phosphorus and iron are required in certain proportions in order that they may do their work in the body. Anything that interferes with the body chemistry lowers the vitality and leaves the individual the ready victim of disease.

Perhaps it will be found that the body laboratory of the son is apt to be like the body laboratory of the father. If this is the case of science will tell us something in the future how to correct the evil may be in this way. It may be in the genes or the predestinated effects of heredity.

Anything that lowers the vitality prepares the way for an inflammation of any part of the body. Physical or mental overwork is a factor. Working under conditions of bad sanitation cannot be disregarded.

We have the feeling that the man should carry the heavy burden of life. As a matter of fact they do not. This disease for instance, is not likely to attack women than it is men. It may be that frequent child-bearing is a factor.

Almost invariably a local center of infection is to be found somewhere in the body. It may be in the gums or in the teeth. It may be in the tonsils or in the gall bladder. Even with strict search, however, it is frequently difficult to locate the exact cause.

In the acute form it comes on something like rheumatism. There may be swelling, redness and pain in one or more joints. But almost always it is the small joints of the hands and sometimes of the neck or jaw which are affected.

The acute rheumatism disappears, but it will be discovered that there is stiffness and cracking of the joints on movement. Then comes the deformity which characterizes the disease.

The treatment of arthritis deformans is not satisfactory. I should like to leave that for you to decide with your physician.

There is a popular idea that in all rheumatic troubles the diet should be restricted in the eating of meat. I can see no advantage of any such restriction in arthritis deformans. As a matter of fact it is a mistake to restrict the diet so much as to impair

the strength and vigor. Many times it will be found the patient is actually anemic from lack of proper food. Generous feeding is more likely to be helpful than otherwise.

Answers to Health Queries

A. R. C. Q.—What do you advise for bladder trouble?

A.—Consult your doctor for the necessary treatment.

L. J. E. Q.—What causes ringing in the ears?

A.—This is often due to nasal catarrh which has extended to the middle ear.

A.—Plenty of good nourishing food, including milk, eggs, fresh fruits and vegetables. Exercise daily in the open air and practice deep breathing. Avoid over-eating. Take cod liver oil as a general tonic.

A. E. R. Q.—How much milk should one drink daily in order to gain weight?

A.—What exercises will develop the chest?

A.—At least eight glassfuls daily. 2.—Tennis, basketball and deep breathing exercises are all helpful.

A. S. Q.—With constant riding on a motorcycle be apt to affect the kidneys in any way?

A.—It might possibly, due to the constant jarring while riding.

Orange is lovely on a young girl, and very "graduation-y" or a soft crepe of some kind, or georgette or chiffon. And of course you should plan the type of dress so that your daughter will be able to wear it afterward for many occasions. Excerpts from "Oregon Geographic Names" by McArthur, which explain the origin of names of geographic landmarks throughout the state.

PILOT KNOB

PILOT KNOB, Jackson County—Pilot Knob is a prominent landmark in the Siskiyou mountains south of Ashland and east of the Pacific highway. It was so named in pioneer days because it served as a guide for travelers crossing the pass between Oregon and California. It has an elevation of 1015 feet. This rock is mentioned in Wilkes' Narrative. He named it Emmons Peak, after Lieut. George F. Emmons, U. S. N., of his expedition. Emmons saw the rock on Sept. 28, 1841. The name Emmons Peak has not persisted.

PIPLIL BUTTE

PIPLIL BUTTE, Deschutes County—Pi-plil Butte is in the Oregon part of the Pauas mountains. It bears the Algonkian word for red, because of its characteristic color.

Boost in Legal Age Ends
Warfare of Justices

Tennessee Maidens Must Be 21 for Independent Consent; State Purge Suffers.

CLARKSVILLE, Tenn., July 5.—A mountain feud in which the weapons were Holy Bibles and legal certificates to wed has been ended by a recent Tennessee law declaring that 21 years is the legal age for feminine discretion.

"Gretna Green" for ardent Kentucky lovers. That state denies a girl the right to marry without parental consent until she is 21 years old. So he Kentuckians flocked to Clarksville, just across the Tennessee line.

The feud between marrying magistrates started last Christmas. Squire J. H. Hartley, S. W. Kelly, W. H. Corlew and S. D. Tinsley, Clarksville answers to impatient Kentucky youth—grew weary of Squire W. H. Dean's invasions on their marriage market.

Squire Dean was a retired rural mail carrier and could play an advantageous open field in the bride parties outside the courthouse, while the other magistrates were kept busy within.

Reinforcement of the city magistrates took the form of a notice posted in the county clerk's office, which stated they would marry all comers free between the hours of 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. during Christmas time.

Squire Dean contended with the annoyance that he would marry all comers at all times free of charge for the county of Montgomery, and the scheme of Montgomery rates handed down their placard the next day. The marriage war reached an impasse, and only one couple was able to profit.

Now come's post-war economic depression, both for the magistrates and the scheme of Montgomery county, according to Clerk W. H. Crozier. He explains that Tennessee's raising of the age girls may be married without parental consent from 18 to 21 years will divert \$1,000 to \$2,000 in license fees a year from the state.

But even he seems to be glad the marriage war is over.
