

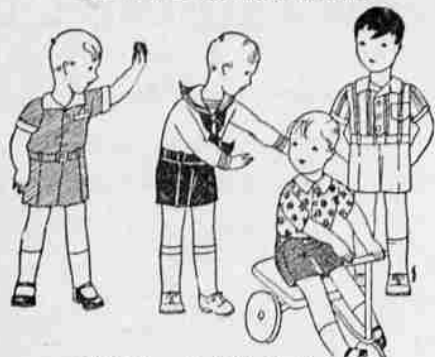

bell." Later they sent down word that they were ready for the refueling contact, which was completed without mishap.

A battered fuselage from bags lowered by the refueling plane gave the endurance fliers apprehension today.

"Our fuselage is beaten up pretty badly from the heavy bags and we do not wish to refuel any more than we have to to the rough part of the day," a message said.

Reinhart Still Afloat

CULVER CITY, Cal., July 5.—Still dodging in and out of fog banks, L. W. Mendell and R. B. Reinhart this morning approached their fourth day in the air as they plotted their biplane "Angelina" nearer the endurance record of 172 hours 32 minutes 1 second, which they seek to better.

At midnight the Buell air sedan, in which the fliers took off at 7:29:30 a. m., Tuesday, had passed the 64½ hour mark. To equal the existing record set by Redwald Robbins and James Kelly at Fort Worth, the plane must remain in the air until 12:02:01 p. m., next Tuesday.

The pilots were in excellent spirits, notes drafted as they circled overhead, indicated. The seemingly perfect action of the 220-horsepower motor put a tone of optimism in their messages.

"Utin Bowler" Lost

OTTAWA, Ont., July 5.—Radio stations in northwestern Canada have sought in vain for the Chicago-Berlin plane, "Utin Bowler," last reported at Rupert House, a trading post on the lower extremity of James bay.

Signals from the plane picked up yesterday by the radio station at Hope's Advance on Hudson straits indicated that the plane was again in the air after its flight from Rupert House. Later the department of marine received a radio message saying the plane had taken off from Rupert House but was putting back because of low visibility.
