At Steamboat Camp, On the North Umpqua, June 27, 1929.

SECOND PARLEY CALLED TO AID PROTESTANT CHURCHES

World War Leaves Poverty and Disorganization Among European Groups—Minister of Rapidly Growing Church Spurns Pay Boost—Russia Sticks to Ban on Religious Festivals.

(Associated Press Local Wire) BASEL, Switzerland, July 5.—A movement herein seven years ago for relief of Protestant churches of Europe will be advanced further at the second "Bethesda conference" here August 23-24.

Following the world conflict, Protestant churches of Europe were impoverished and disorganized. The Swiss Protestant federation, at the suggestion of the Federal Council of the Church of Christ in America, called a conference for their relief at the Bethesda house in Copenhagen.
