

CAMPFIRE GIRLS COMPLETE PLANS FOR SUMMER CAMP

Plans for the annual Camp Fire Girls camp at the Boy Scout site on Wolf Creek are rapidly nearing completion. The girls will leave for camp on the morning of August 5th in the cars which will bring the Boy Scouts home and their season will last until August 15th. Everything points to a splendid camp this year. Mrs. H. E. Cully, who has been director for the past three years, has consented to come back and take charge once more. That in itself assures a good time from the moment the bed rolls are dumped on the banks of Little river until the last ceremonial fire is dead. She will be assisted by an able corps of counselors. Miss McMillin from Powers, whom the girls know as "Burro," has written that she will be on hand and will bring with her Mrs. Ben Crawford another Powers guardian. Several local guardians including Mrs. E. S. Hall and Miss Maud McGaughey expect to assist at camp.

Mrs. Cully hopes to bring a friend from Portland, who will teach archery and other interesting subjects. Of course there will be a swimming instructor and life guard but she has not yet been selected. Mrs. C. M. Page and her mother, Mrs. Smith, will rule over the cook shack and provide the three "squares" a day. Within the next few days letters with application blanks attached will be sent to each girl and registrations for camp can then be made.

TRUCK OPERATORS MAY TEST OREGON LOAD LIMIT LAW

SALISBURY, Ore., July 5.—Operators of motor trucks, trailers and semi-trailers are threatening a suit to restrain the state from enforcing an act of the 1929 legislature which reduces the maximum weight of combined vehicle and load on Oregon highways.

Prior to the establishment of the new regulation the maximum weight allowed for a four-wheel truck and trailer was 40,000 pounds or 20,000 pounds for each vehicle, and 44,000 pounds for a six-wheel truck and six-wheel trailer, or 22,000 pounds for each.

The new law, which became effective June 4, reduces the maximum weight for any combination of vehicles to 34,000 pounds. A number of operators contend that since, at the first of the year and before the legislature met, they took out their licenses on fire-width basis with the expectation of hauling the loads heretofore allowed they are now being deprived of a privilege for which they paid. Several have violated the new law and have been taken into court by the state traffic department.

Secretary of State Hoss asked an opinion from Attorney General Van Winkle who has replied that the state has a right to enforce the new law under the police power, since it is a measure for the protection of highways.

Not satisfied, the operators talk of a test case in court. They take the stand that because they have equipped themselves with vehicles capable of carrying the heavier loads the law is confiscatory.

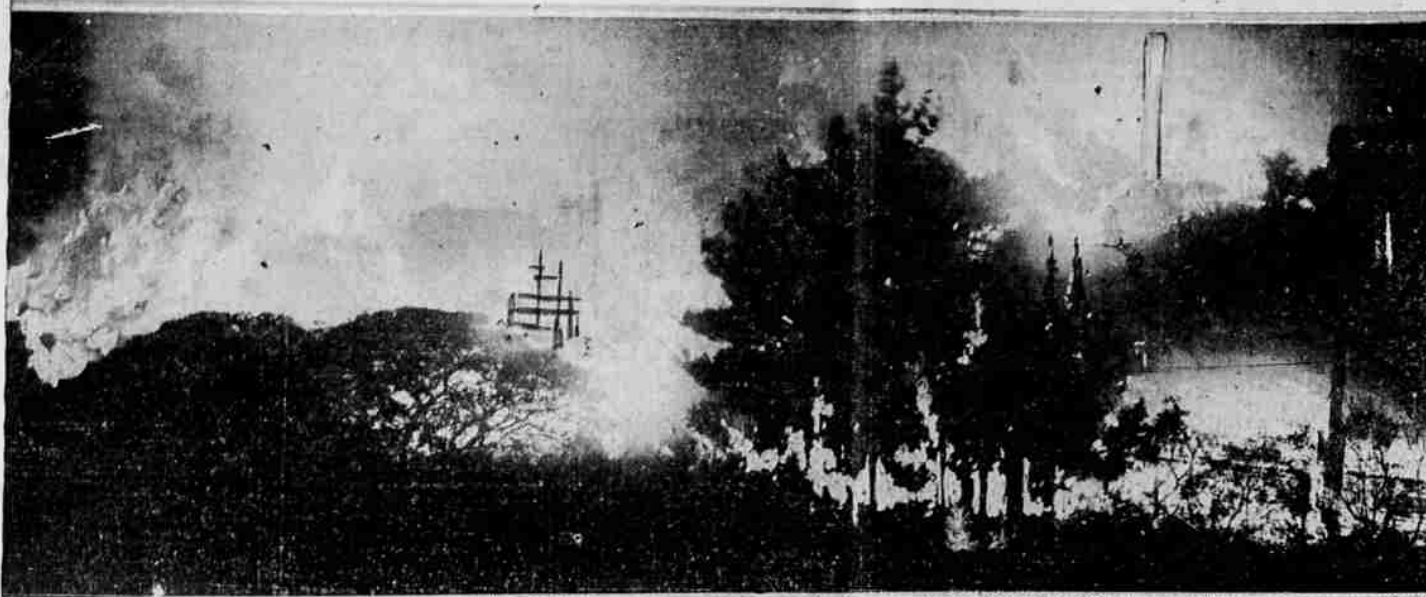

Scenes At \$1,250,000 Fire At Mill Valley



Red destruction—blackened wastes—lost homes—life dreams broken and only smoking, ashen slopes where once were shaded glades beloved of San Francisco's hundreds of thousands of outing enthusiasts. A tiny spark from a hiker's cigarette? A match tossed carelessly? Sunshine through a bit of broken bottles which focused the rays to white heat? Its source is a mystery, but it leaped from the slopes of famed Mount Tamalpais with such fury that man's efforts were futile. The shift in the wind late Tuesday was the only thing that saved the main section of Mill Valley, Cal., at the foot of Blythe-dale canyon. From 75 to 100 homes were reduced to ashes. The financial loss is placed at \$1,250,000.

Pitiful scenes filled the streets of Mill Valley, Cal., as hundreds whose homes were wiped out or were in dire peril flocked to temporary Red Cross headquarters near the Northwestern Pacific railway station. Some carried a few most precious belongings, some had not even time for that. At right, little Barbara Puccinella, "The old fire won't get you anyway," she assured her pet canary, "Flit-Flit," as she carried him to safety.
