STRIKE MARKED BY EXPLOSION AND BURNINGS

(Continued from page 1) were held today on the special train outside the city. Gas Bombs Futile Vexed at losing the out-of-town carnage, the crowd attacked the Canal street barn in the early hours of the morning and after stoning the buildings and parked street cars, started the fire. The police sought vainly to break up the crowds with tear gas bombs but they would only scatter and then reassemble. Firemen tried to prevent dynamite thrown into the Poland barn from exploding by drenching it with water, but it went off, doing little damage. All up and down Canal street the tracks were blocked and torn up and several hours' labor will be required to clear the way before cars can be operated. The city commission council let stand its order to the Public Services, Inc., to postpone further efforts to operate cars and the police today were making some headway in breaking up crowds. Strike May Extend The city council had before it today threats to call out the building and metal trades council members in sympathy with car strikers. We are not going to stand for public service interrupting strike breakers," declared William Rife, president of the Trades Union Council, in his challenge to the city council. The strike of 1500 workers started July 1, over renewal of a contract and grew to menacing proportions with an attempt by public service to operate armed street cars with crews of outsiders. The union claimed the contract denied it a voice in arbitration of suspensions and dismissals.
