MARKETS
(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—There was a spread of 40 cents between the poorest and the best strawberries at the east side market today, with the fruit scarce even at those figures. The fall-end of the season is not far off. Black caps are beginning to arrive in larger quantities, although the price holds firm. Raspberries were finding ready demand without any recession in quotations. Producers sold at the following prices:

Strawberries \$1.50 to \$2; black caps \$2; loganberries \$1.25; raspberries \$1.75 to \$2; peaches \$1 to 50 cents; beans \$2 to 10 cents; new spuds 3 cents; carrots 25 cents; dozen bunches; onions 25 cents; dozen bunches; beets 25 cents; dozen bunches; turnips 50 cents to 65 cents; dozen bunches; celery 90 cents to \$1; dozen bunches; cauliflower \$1 crate; spinach 50 cents box.

In the absence of official quotations, which were formerly fixed by the Portland Dairy Exchange, the price of butter is in a somewhat uncertain state. The majority of creameries were quoting standards at 43, but there was a feeling in some quarters that there was an over-supply and that there was inclined to be a weaker tone to the market, especially with reference to grades under the 52 score. The cold storage movement has assumed proportions larger than at this time last year. Production has decreased, however, since the hot weather and this may have some influence on the prices as well as the storage movement.

Egg prices remain unchanged. The quality is said to show deterioration due to the warm weather and producers are being advised to keep their stock in cool places.

Poultry and country dressed meats were steady.

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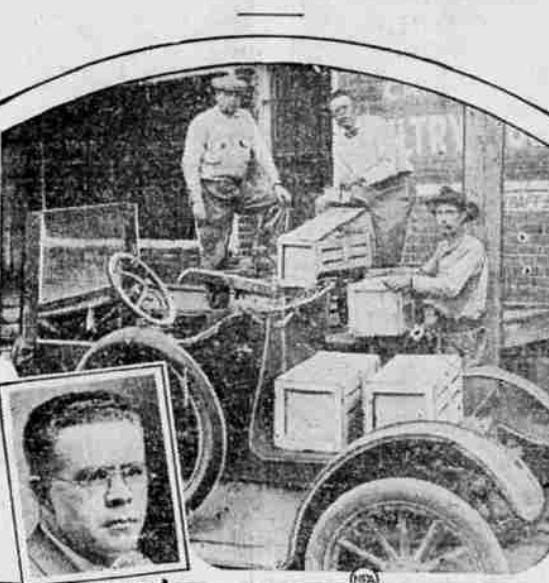

Camera Catches Thrilling Rescue From Burning Plane



This remarkable picture of an actual rescue from the blazing wreckage of an airplane shows how Henry R. Goldsmith, Freeport, Long Island, student flyer was dragged, fatally burned, from the flames that also killed Francis Phillips, wealthy son of the late John M. Phillips, "sewer pipe king" of New York. Goldsmith was thrown from the tiny Moth plane when it crashed and caught fire at Roosevelt Field, but landed in the wreckage and died later from burns received. Phillips, who was piloting the craft, was trapped by the flames and could not be reached by rescuers.

Cooperation Brings Wealth to Farmers and Businessmen

HENRYETTA, Okla., July 9.—While national legislators are fuming and sweating over some plan for farm relief, this city of 10,000 people has quietly and in a business-like manner added a million dollars a year to its income.

Five years ago Henryetta was a commercial town. Its mines, oil wells and building trades kept it going. Agriculture for city dwellers was just an industry that kept them supplied with food. The farmer was a minor problem in their life.

Now this is all changed. Business men of this community have been cooperating with farmers for four years. They have helped them market their crops, get expert advice on planting and certified seed, and have worked together in the purchase of improved machinery and the adoption of improved methods.

The movement for better farms and improved agriculture started here when business men found that farmers were not coming into town to buy, but because of indifference on the part of city folk, were selling their products and buying their necessities elsewhere.

Mohammed Goes to Mountain
Realizing that agriculture was a firm foundation on which to build a city, the business men got together and elected as secretary of their chamber of commerce George C. Gibbons, a Kansas State Agricultural College graduate, whose duty it was to spend most of his time with farmers, help them make more money and develop a closer relation between the city and country.

Gibbons didn't issue glowing bulletins inviting farmers to come in to town and meet the city folk.

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valuable way in the matter of market facilities.

Gibbons Shows How
Having acquainted the farmers with the business men, Gibbons' work had only started. His next step was to do overalls and give the farmers the benefit of scientific farming gleaned not only while he attended school, but from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and the state agricultural college.

He terraced, plowed, planted, advised. At community meetings he gave crop advice.

"Grow into your business—don't jump into it," Gibbons told farmers who contemplated a hurried switch from one crop to another. The idea was to try suggested crops and if they didn't prove successful to try another, always on a small scale at first.

Through Gibbons and the chamber of commerce, certified seed that had been tested and suggested as best for the Henryetta territory was bought in quantities. As a result seed merchants benefited through increased sales, and farmers through increased production.

Trading Area Enlarged
Not only has the cooperation of business men and farmers added financially to the town of Henryetta, but it has added miles to its surrounding. The trading area is enlarged. The influence of scientific farming methods has extended for miles around.

"The work of the chamber of commerce has just meant everything in the world to our farmers even though they live 35 miles away," W. W. Winston, a farmer merchant living 25 miles from Henryetta says. "They are paying

their bills and have money in the bank. I believe it has helped Henryetta, too, for our farmers ship their produce from there and stay over to make purchases."

In four years that the cooperation has been functioning, it has cost only \$5000. The value received has been many times multiplied.

Through this investment have come many improvements in community agriculture. It has been responsible for terracing, planting of shrubs and trees, encouraging poultry breeders, building of a four-mile road to open up a new trade outlet and organization of women's clubs and other rural organizations.
