HOT?

FOLKS who complain about the summer heat when our thermometer reaches 85 or 90 degrees in the afternoon should live for a while in a really torrid place if they think 90 is uncomfortable. Clear dry heat from the sun is the healthiest of all climatic factors and we are blessed with a goodly abundance of sunshine here in this beautiful Umpqua valley. In places where sunshine is really oppressive it is not so much the daytime heat as it is the heat after nightfall that brings discomfort. No matter how hot the days in this valley, the nights are always cool and comfortable. The night temperature is always 30 to 40 degrees lower than the heat of the day, in fact the minimum night temperature during these warm days is only about 20 degrees above freezing.

The acuteness of our automobile traffic situation is aptly shown by figures recently compiled by the New York state department of health.

These figures show that in New York City, in 1927, automobiles killed 18.3 persons per 100,000 population; in the rest of the state they killed 26.6 per 100,000.

Yet such a disease as typhoid fever, in the same area, caused a death rate of only 2 per 100,000. Measles, another dreaded malady, had a rate of only 7 per 100,000. And diphtheria's rate was only 13.6 per 100,000.

Ten times as deadly as typhoid fever—nearly twice as deadly as diphtheria—that is our automobile traffic! How much longer are we going to accept this state of affairs complacently, anyway? When will we be shocked into taking the drastic action that the situation demands?

HOT WEATHER BRINGS WORRIES TO MOTHERS

Digestive Troubles, Common with Infants in Summer, Can Be Avoided by Careful Attention to Food and Feeding, Says Dr. Copeland.

SO MANY mothers write me, saying they make use of my suggestions in caring for their babies, that I have a sense of responsibility regarding this advice.

To my mind the hardest but the best job in all the world is the bringing up of a little child. God is good in sending these blessed gifts. It is our joy to help them to health and vigor.

If I can lighten the burdens and anxieties of the mothers of tiny babies, I am fortunate, indeed. It is a rare privilege and I appreciate it. Hot weather brings many worries and responsibilities to the mothers. They must guard their own lives, but what means far more to these good women, is that they must guard these precious infants.

Summer time is trying to the baby. It brings conditions which are themselves depressing to the child, but also the heat is liable to damage the food. When this is the least bit contaminated, then there really is trouble.

Sometimes the term "intestinal indigestion," or "summer complaint," is given to one of the hot weather ailments of little babies. They may be very mild attacks hardly noticed perhaps, or they may be quite severe.

This is the reason when the frail baby has a hard time. It does not resist conditions which would not disturb a stronger child. Such a youngster must be given unusually watchful care.

Every precaution must be taken to keep the milk at low temperature. Any failure to refrigerate it properly will result in trouble.

It is surprising how rapidly the germs of bacteria in milk will multiply in any temperature above fifty degrees. That is the limit of safety.

Make sure that the milk comes from a well-known and approved source. Prepare the feedings with the greatest of care. Keep all the surplus food at low temperature.

Overfeeding of an infant is just as bad for a baby as it is for an adult. Indeed, it is worse, because the tiny baby cannot handle doubtful food as the grown-up can.

Almost invariably digestive disorders in babies can be traced directly to the food. It is the doubtful quality of the food or the manner of feeding that is responsible for the disagreeable symptoms.

You have been taught how to prepare the feedings, how to keep them and just how frequently they should be given. I beg of you not to deviate one bit from instructions.
