GOVERNOR Kohler, of Wisconsin, charged with spending \$100,000 to secure his election when he is permitted by law to spend only \$4,000, issues a statement in answer to his critics in which he says:

"The people of Wisconsin know that my record is clear, and I do not intend to allow this latest move of my political opponents to interfere with the official business of the state."

If the people of Wisconsin know that the record of Governor Kohler is clear, that should end it. The people of Wisconsin are the ones to be satisfied.

In regard to spending money in campaigns, this writer has a notion that if the public really knows what is going on and still chooses to vote for the man who is doing the spending no great harm has been done.

That is to say, it is much more important to provide genuine and dependable publicity as to the amount of money that is being spent in campaigns than to try to invalidate the election of the successful candidate who did the spending.

In these days, there is very little actual buying of votes. The secret ballot system did away with that pretty effectively.

So it follows that money spent in campaigns is spent chiefly to get the spending candidate's name before the voters. If the voters, knowing what is being spent, still choose to cast their ballots for the spender, there isn't much that can be done about it.

Free government can never be very much better than the informed judgment of the voters.

Dr. W. F. Draper, of the U. S. public health service, joins the ranks of those who are doing battle for more sensible hot weather clothing for men.

"Men should follow the example set them by women," he told a reporter on a recent hot day in Washington. "Their present clothing, particularly in summer, is unsuitable, uncomfortable and unnecessary. Women are far ahead of men in the matter of sensible dress. They are RAPIDLY APPROACHING THE IDEAL."

PLEASE note the capitals in the foregoing sentence. They are significant.

If it is true, as Dr. Draper says, that women are "rapidly approaching the ideal," just what is the ideal? Suppose you answer that question. This writer is restrained by modesty.

JOHN D. Rockefeller, celebrating his nineteenth birthday anniversary at his home, gives out this statement:

"With perfect health, and full of hope and cheer for the future, I have nothing but kindness and good will for everybody."

Happy John D.: "Perfect health and a fullness of hope and cheer for the future." What better recipe for happiness, at any age, could one ask?

SPEAKING of health, a reasonably famous physician gave out a statement the other day that is unique, in that it was both silly and sensible.

The silliness came first, and was expressed something like this: "Kissing is a dangerous practice, because it spreads mouth infections. No one can hope to retain a healthy mouth who indulges extensively in kissing, with its inevitable transfer of germs."

Shucks! When human beings reach the stage of emotional stimulation that results in kissing, they are too far gone to be guided by considerations such as dental prophylaxis, which at the moment seem of trifling importance.

HERE is the sensible part of his statement:

"It isn't true that the teeth of the modern generation are deteriorating with dangerous rapidity because of soft foods. We are merely paying more attention to bad teeth. Formerly people didn't worry about bad teeth until compelled to by the pangs of toothache. Now a little cavity, quite properly, sends them to the dentist."

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NATIONS LOOSE PROTEST FLOOD ON TARIFF BILL

Over 50 Notes, From 25 Governments and Their Colonies, Confront Senate Board.

Record Breaking Volume of Complaint Shows Widespread Resentment Against Plan.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—A flood of protests against the pending tariff bill sent by foreign trade associations and governments, including one by Spain threatening to denounce the existing modus vivendi of most favored trade relations with the United States, were made public today by the senate finance committee.

The Spanish representation, signed by Marquis de Estella, Spanish minister for foreign affairs, and given to the American ambassador at Madrid, was submitted to the senate finance committee by Secretary Stimson bearing with it a letter of comment by Secretary Mellon.

"The Spanish government protested against the suggested increases of duty and sanitary regulations on cork, olives, grapes, onions, dried fruit and revolvers."

Wide Resentment Shown
The notes, couched in both emphatic and mild terms and expressing opinions on behalf of governments of Europe, South and Central America, and individual industries of those countries, were made public without comment. They will be considered by the committee on revision of the house tariff bill.

Chairman Smoot of the committee said the flood of communications was unprecedented and indicated universal resentment. There were more than fifty notes.

The governments and colonies represented in the mass of memoranda were England, Australia, India, British West Indies, Bahamas, Bermuda, Island of Dominica, Irish Free State, France, Italy, Spain, Belgium, Mexico, Austria, Turkey, Norway, Greece, Netherlands, Denmark, Switzerland, Persia, Uruguay, Dominican Republic, Guatemala, and Honduras.

McNary's Rosy Forecast
SALEM, Ore., July 10.—The American farmer, within the next five years, will have no surplus crop problem, Senator Charles L. McNary declared in an interview here.

The farmer will have the benefit of adequate farm legislation by congress that will give him the financial security that is given railroad, said the senator, and this will mean increased purchasing power for the farmer, higher values for his land and more orderly crop distribution and marketing.

McNary expressed the opinion that the increase in the wheat price in the last month is an indication of the stability accorded the farming industry by legislation in the recent session of congress.

NEXT ENVOY TO TURKEY. RUMOR IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The post of ambassador to Turkey, where the market for American automobiles is complicated by severe Italian competition, is expected by a number of Washington observers to be offered to John N. Willis, veteran Ohio automobile manufacturer.

Contrary to the report circulated in Wall street after it was learned that Willis was disposing of his industrial holdings that he was being considered for appointment to the diplomatic post at Paris, made vacant by the death of another Ohioan, Myron T. Herrick, the White House has disclosed that the president has another assignment in mind for the manufacturer.

What that assignment might be was not made known, but the president's choice for the Paris post is believed to have settled fairly definitely on Senator Edge of New Jersey. Furthermore, an offer of the Turkish post to Willis is regarded as fitting not only into the competitive trade situation there, but into the inauguration here of Joseph C. Grew, the present ambassador, is to be transferred to a Latin-American capital.

STATE LAND GRANT ASSOCIATION WILL DISBAND TONIGHT

Executive Committee to Hold Meeting to Complete Proportionment of Court Costs.

The executive committee of the Oregon Land Grant Counties Association will meet in Roseburg tonight to complete the association's work and disband the organization. This association was formed at the time the 18 land grant counties filed application with the government for O. and C. tax money. Representatives were sent to Washington, D. C., and succeeded in securing congressional action whereby the government paid the counties the amount of money that would have been received had the grant lands been left on the tax roll instead of being reverted in the government. The counties have since been paid each year an amount equivalent to the tax. The government will be reimbursed both principal and interest as the grant lands are sold. Original payment was in the sum of approximately six and a half million dollars, while annual payments since that time have added near two million dollars to the amount received.

Suit was later brought against the counties by the state, which sought to collect a part of the money in proportion to state tax paid by each county, but this suit was lost by the state. The counties agreed to pay the costs of the litigation on a pro-rata basis, and the executive committee at tonight's meeting will fix the fees to be paid the attorneys, John Carson, district attorney of Marion county, and (Continued on page 6)

MYSTERY MALADY TAKES FOURTH LIFE

SAFFORD, Ariz., July 10.—The four-year-old daughter of William Evans died here today, apparently the victim of a mysterious malady which already has taken the lives of three boys.

The boys who died from the illness, solution of which baffled every effort of physicians, were John Green, 16, Grover Stebbins, 16, and Ralph Kerby, 11.

Three other persons, the dead girl's father, an 11-year-old youth known as Powell and a man named "Frenchy" are in a critical condition. The cause of the deaths was diagnosed as ptomaine poisoning from drinking "home brew," but this was discounted with the death of the girl, who was known not to have consumed the beverage.

RUM BOATS AWAIT SIGNAL FOR DASH

VETERANS WILL CONVENE HERE FOR STATE MEET

Spanish War Organizations Expect Record Making Crowd for 3-Day Gathering.

Banquet and Reception to Feature Entertainment First Day; Parade Tuesday Night.

S. W. Starmer, commandant of the Oregon Soldiers' Home, a member of the executive committee arranging for the Spanish War Veterans' convention which is to be held here July 15, 16 and 17, has just returned from Portland where he met the department officers and completed arrangements for next week's assembly.

The veterans are looking forward to the largest and best convention they have ever held, every indication pointing to a record breaking attendance, both of the veterans and the auxiliary.

The convention Monday morning is to be given over to a joint program, which will feature the introduction of department officers of both the veterans' organization and the auxiliary, followed by addresses of welcome, responses, reports and introduction of visitors.

At 6:30 o'clock a banquet will be held at the Oregon Soldiers' Home, where a bonneted meal will be served in the grove adjoining the administration building.

A reception and ball will be held at the armory at 9 o'clock, and this will be open to veterans of all wars, and will not be confined alone to the Spanish war veterans and auxiliary.

Business meetings of the different orders will be held Tuesday morning and afternoon, and in the evening will be held the Grand Fair of the Military Order of the Serpent, together with the election and installation of officers. At 2 o'clock will be held the annual "crawl" of the fun organization.

This torchlight parade will be the only public feature of the convention. It will be led by the Umpqua Post American Legion drum corps.

INSURANCE ANGLE OF MURDER CAUSES ARREST OF 4 MEN

NORRISTOWN, Pa., July 10.—Four men were under arrest today in connection with the death of William Norman Helm, automobile salesman of Trappe, Pa., whose charred body was found beneath his wrecked automobile near Fort Washington on the night of June 21.

Robert M. Hallowell, Isaac E. Hallowell, Harry Hallowell and Charles Dull were taken into custody in the court room shortly before midnight, as the conclusion of the coroner's inquest.

The jury found Helm had not died by a blow on the head from an instrument in the hands of an unknown person.

Robert Hallowell is owner of a garage in Ambler, where Helm was last seen alive. Isaac is Robert's brother and lives near the garage; Harry is Isaac's son, employed as manager of the garage, and Dull was formerly a salesman for the Hallowells.

Helm was heavily insured in favor of Robert Hallowell. In the Hallowell garage police found blood stains. Stains on an automobile belonging to Isaac Hallowell were identified by the county chemist as having been those of human blood.

Robert Hallowell testified at the inquest that he had accounts in 11 banks and had discounted notes aggregating \$110,000.

Robert also testified that Helm owed the Hallowells money, and that it was to protect their interests that the insurance policy on Helm's life was taken out.

Mrs. Helm collapsed at the inquest.

Color Blind Boy Hires Another To Fake 'Exam'

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Two boys are being held by Washington police today because one of them waited to gain entrance to Annapolis naval academy but was found to be color blind.

Henry Sherwin Rupp, son of a Long Beach, Calif., business man, was named as a candidate for the academy after he passed examinations given by the U. S. naval reserve, of which he was a member from California.

He was given a high rating on his mental examination but "blunked out" on his physical examination at the academy two days ago. Color blindness was given as the cause.

Permission for re-examination was requested of the navy department and was granted. A youth representing himself as Rupp passed this test. Naval officers could not understand how a candidate admitted color blind 48 hours earlier could pass the examination, so they started questioning.

The boy who was not color blind, they said, readily admitted he was Paul Schuler of Washington, and told police he had been retained to take the examination for fifteen dollars.

Both boys are 19 years old and are being held pending investigation.

LETTERS INVOLVE EXILED PRINCE OF RUMANIA IN PLOT

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 10.—Documents allegedly confiscated by the government in its roundup of military conspirators against the present regime have definitely the present regime have definitely in a projected coup d'etat.

The documents comprised proclamations to the people and to the army, all bearing the signature, "In the name of his majesty, King Carol II." It was said that it appeared the exiled prince was fully aware of the preparations for the plot and gave his consent to it.

EASTERN HOT WAVE TAKES MORE LIVES

NEW YORK, July 10.—A mounting death toll today marked the continuation of the relentless heat under which much of the country has suffered since Sunday.

Added to deaths attributed directly to the heat were several drownings and scores of prostrations.

Four persons succumbed to the heat here yesterday and one death occurred at Wilmington, Del. Seven heat fatalities were previously reported.

Excessively high temperatures prevailed along the Atlantic coast and as far west as the Rocky mountains. Phoenix, Ariz., continued to hold its place as the hottest spot in the country, with a maximum of 110.

Washington and Baltimore had temperatures of 96. At Philadelphia it was 93. New York, with a maximum of 88, was one degree cooler than the previous day.

YOUTHS SUSPECTED OF SLAYING CHUM

A bullet had struck the youngster in the head. Police said there were no powder burns to indicate the shooting had been done at close range.

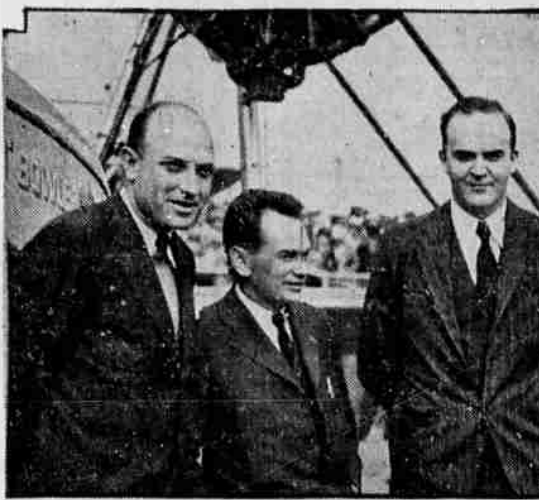
BLEACHERS AT FAIR COLLAPSE; 150 HURT

CHICAGO, July 10.—The Chicago Tribune's Berlin-bound amphibian the "Untin" Bowler, stood ready early today to take off from Port Burwell, a tiny settlement on Cape Chidley in Northern Labrador, for Mt. Evans, Greenland, 500 miles across Hudson and Davis straits.

The plane hugged its way into Port Burwell early yesterday after being marooned 50 miles away by fog Sunday. News of the "Untin" Bowler's arrival was the first definite word of its whereabouts received by the Tribune since it left Great White, on Hudson Bay, for Cape Chidley three days ago.

The "Untin" Bowler took off from Chicago last Wednesday.

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PATHFINDER REACHES ITS GOAL, ROME

SANTANDER, Spain, July 10.—Undated by fatigue and illness, the American aviator, Captain Lewis A. Vancey and Roger Q. Williams, set out to finish today what they could not quite conclude yesterday—their flight from Old Orchard, Me., to Rome.

Lifting their plane from the abandoned airfield at Albericia, near here, this morning, they dipped once in salute and headed due east along the 850-mile route to the Italian capital. They hoped to take less than ten hours for the trip, arriving at Campino airfield, south of the city, before dark.

They landed near here with empty fuel tanks.

They estimated their trip yesterday at having entailed 3,400 miles during 31 hours and 42 minutes flying time.

The aviators were acclaimed by thousands when they arrived at the air field this morning. Beautiful serenades were given by a few weeks ago greeted the French "Yellow Bird" aviators when they landed, three times at them, a real Spanish farewell. Civil Governor Saliquet and the English consul gave the official "adieu."

They said their plane was loaded only with 75 gallons of gasoline (Continued on page 6)

REINHART AND MENDELL PASS 196-HR. MARK

Fliers Show No Sign of Fatigue; State Motor Working Perfectly.

Probable Landing Long Way Off Is Belief; Feat to Be Rewarded With Public Fund.

CULVER CITY, Cal., July 10.—The 196th hour in the air was passed at 11:29 a. m., today by the endurance fliers, L. W. Mendell and R. B. Reinhart, who now have exceeded the former record by nearly 22 hours. The unparalleled voyage of the biplane Angeleno, on the ninth day of its refueling flight, was proceeding without any known difficulty.

The first message received from the fliers this morning, requesting more gasoline and oil, announced that the "motor" was functioning perfectly.

The terse statement, left the impression on ground officials that the probable landing of the plane was still many hours away.

The last message yesterday read: "If you think we are coming down tonight you are crazy."

No one would say today that they had thought so.

Men and Motor O. K.
No visible signs of faltering on the part of either motor or man could be detected by observers. The power unit of the plane, which had 750 flying hours to its credit before it was reconditioned and put into the present flight, dropped along without a misfire. The pilots also gave no complaint of growing weary.

In the nurse plane today sat D. Reinhart, aged father of one of the pilots, who was to go up with the (Continued on page 5)

TWO NAVAL FLIERS KILLED WHEN PLANE PLUNGES INTO BAY

QUINCY, Mass., July 10.—Second Lieutenant George B. Stephens, 24, U. S. marine corps, and Gunner Sergeant Ernest D. Jones, 31, were instantly killed here late yesterday when their plane plunged from an altitude of nearly 2,000 feet into the waters of Squantum bay, directly off the Squantum naval base. Both men were dead when extricated from the cockpit.

Many of their companions leaped into the water, swam to the wreckage and dived beneath it, time and time again in a vain attempt to free the victims before the crane pulled the smashed plane from the bay.

The two were flying the ship back from the Curtiss factory at Buffalo, N. Y.

Stephens came from San Diego, where he was a past commander of the American Legion post. He had served in the air forces in the World war. His wife and two young sons lived within a short distance of the Squantum base. They had been looking forward to his return from Buffalo.

Jones, unmarried, was a native of Maypearl, near Dallas, Texas. A court of inquiry has been called.

HONOLULU, July 10.—Lieutenant Clyde A. Kuntz and Private Don E. Moses were killed last night when their army plane fell on Ford island near this city and burst into flames. The motor in the bombing plane failed soon after they took off from Lake field.
