Right from Texas for Eugene Pioneer Event

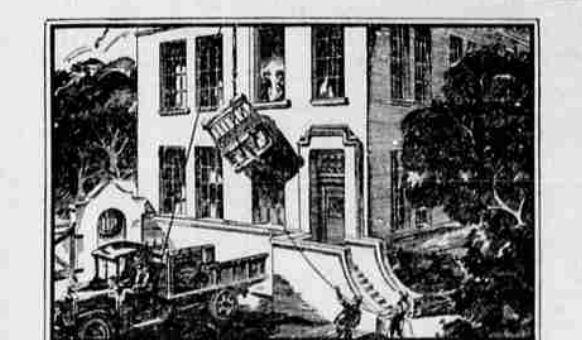

The federal reclamation projects are consumers of wheat which is the chief export cereal. "The records disclose that for each bushel of wheat produced two bushels are consumed on the projects. Other products show a diminishing percentage of export for the period from 1920 to 1927. This decrease is in face of substantial increases in total production on the irrigation projects. The increase in population which continues at the rate of 1,500,000 per year will cause further reduction in the percentage of export surpluses. "Theorists in government employ will do well to leave the reclamation to those who are advised concerning this subject."
