H. Cohen Says Umpqua Turkeys Should Bear Distinctive Brand or Trademark

Umpqua Valley farmers have every reason to feel optimistic over prospects for the year's crops, according to Hyman Cohen, market editor for the Oregon Journal. Mr. Cohen is now on a coast tour investigating market conditions and securing material for articles on markets.

The Umpqua Valley, Mr. Cohen says, is particularly fortunate, in that it has bumper crops during a year of shortage in many other localities.

Prunes are generally short, while the same applies to peaches, apples, cherries and other fruits. "I am afraid that the extremely high price will have a disastrous effect upon next year's market," Mr. Cohen said. "It has been my experience in many years of market study, that when prices mount to unusually high peaks, a surplus is created, for it is the families of moderate income that form the bulk of the consumers, and when prices are too high they buy something else that is cheaper. With peaches bringing \$5 and \$6 per ton, I am afraid that the future market will be affected, but this year's market is certainly going to bring excellent returns to the growers."

Judging from my observations the turkey crop in the Pacific Northwest will be from 25 to 30 per cent larger this year than last.

ALVA MAUPIN TO BUILD DRIER AT GARDEN VALLEY

New Plant Will Be Used Exclusively for Custom Drying—1,000 Bushels Capacity.

A custom prune drier with a capacity of 1,000 bushels daily is to be installed at Garden Valley within the next few weeks. Alva Maupin, of Kellogg, has purchased the old Oregon Growers' warehouse and property from L. N. Miller, and has contracted with Leske and Boyers, Roseburg, implement dealers, for the large size Miller dehydrator, which is to be installed in the warehouse building. The warehouse is to be completely remodeled and a concrete floor built, and the entire structure arranged to handle prunes in an efficient manner.

The equipment will be of the latest improved type and will be able to turn out 1,000 bushels of dried prunes daily, being one of the largest plants in the county.

Mr. Maupin has had a great deal of experience in custom drying, having formerly operated, in connection with his brothers, a large custom plant in Oakland. This property was recently sold to an Oakland firm.

The deal for the Garden Valley property, together with the improvements to be made, represents an investment of more than \$12,000.

EX-POLICE CHIEF OF MARSHFIELD IS FORMER RESIDENT

MARSHFIELD, July 10.—Chief of Police Jack Carter, Indian fighter, cowboy, stage coach driver, and for the past 32 years head of the Marshfield police force, Monday night was retired and pensioned for the rest of his days by action of the city council. Chief Carter will receive \$100 a month.

"I'm going to stay here and take care of my brother," Carter said, when asked what he was going to do. His brother, Howard Carter, was brought here two months ago, a victim of paralysis.

Jack Carter was a member of Captain Dealey's volunteer company in the Snake and Bannock Indian war. He enlisted at Moscow, Idaho, in 1877, and took part in the historic chase and capture of Chief Joseph of the Nez Perce Indians.

Following the capture of the old chief, Carter bought the Pinto pony upon which the old fighter was captured and owned it for a number of years.

After the war Carter drove stage between Roseburg and Coos City and in California. Upon one occasion while crossing the Siskiyou two masked bandits robbed him.

Carter became chief of police here in December, 1897. He related that upon one occasion he attempted unsuccessfully to save the life of a negro who was accused of a morals crime.

"The crowd chased him down under a dock on the water front," he said, "I got a boat and rowed out into the bay with him, but about that time the bullets began hitting around the boat like hail and I had to come back to shore. The negro ran but was caught and hanged to a bridge by the crowd."

Carter was born in Eugene, December 13, 1857. His father came to Coos county Tuesday.

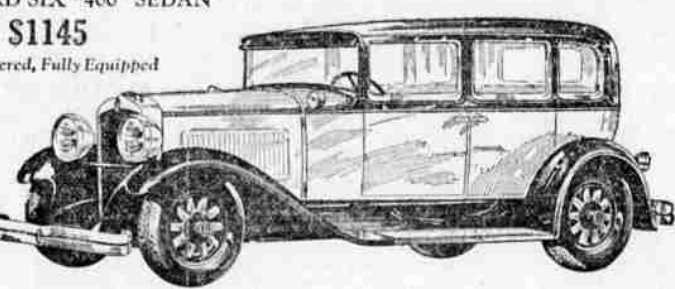
