## SHEEP SHEARERS OF FIVE WESTERN STATES COMPETE

(Associated Press Local Wire) GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 11.—Practiced shears, buzzing over 700 head of sheep, today were to determine the champion sheep shearer in five western states as the final event of a two-day contest is run off.

Yesterday an equal number of sheep lost their wool while seven contestants raced against time for prize money. The states of California, Utah, Washington, Idaho and Montana were represented. Charles Fuhrman of Lyle, Wash., finished his 100 sheep in four hours, three minutes and 55 seconds to set the pace. Stevens of Idaho Falls, Idaho, finished second, and T. H. Oviatt of Pocatello, Idaho, third.

Shevans made the fastest time on one sheep with a mark of one minute, 38.5 seconds. He won the twenty-sheep event in 46 minutes. Oviatt and Fuhrman tied in shearing sheep in an hour.
